Animal Products Shortage Told

Critical shortages in animal by-products during World War II were recalled today by Jim McDonald, general manager of Central Hide and Rendering Company in a letter to the Baird Star. During those troublous times, according to McDonald, the farmers and stockmen of this area aided materially in supplying needed greases, animal hides and protein concentrates used in vast quantities to further the defense effort. They did so by promptly reporting the presence of dead or crippled stock on their farms and in their feed lots to Central Hide & Rendering Company, which is the largest concern of its kind offering free removal service in Callahan County.

"The current re-armament program is again creating serious shortages in these commodities," McDonald said. Manufacture of such items as gun powder, medicine, plastics, soaps and shoes for the armed services, and of vitamin enriched stock and poultry feeds for the farmers and stockmen at home, account largely for current shortages," he explained.

Stock raisers can now contribute materially to the re-armament program, and benefit themselves at the same time by promptly reporting all dead stock. Farms, pastures and feed lots can in this way be kept clean and free of dead animals, he said.

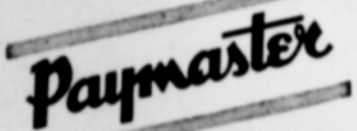

When a man has lived as long in one place as B. L. Boydston has lived in Baird, adding daily to his list of friends, we do not wonder why so many people attended his birthday party last Sunday. When he landed here in 1889 Mr. Boydston began his personal campaign to boost Baird and to make it a better town. There is no wonder why he is identified today as one of Baird's most civic minded citizens.

Mr. Boydston was 80 years old on Saturday, but to make it more convenient for everyone concerned, the Boydston home was open to his friends on Sunday afternoon. A continuous flow of old friends and new ones, too, came and went between three and five o'clock. They came from many places to participate in the observance of this cheerful event. As he clasped the hands of so many of his friends to greet them to his birthday party, he was in a joyful mood. Now and then, while talking and laughing with the crowd, he would brush away a tear.

Monday afternoon Mr. Boydston was down town, telling about the grand time he had at his party. He did have a good time, but he saw to it, with the able help of his family, that everyone else had a good time. As usual, Mr. Boydston was thinking more of the pleasure of his friends than of his own. Even while he talked to folks down town, he was patting them on the back, telling them how he appreciated them and their good works.

Identified with Baird's progress for the past 62 years, Mr. Boydston has not only been a booster for the town, but has stood for all worthwhile civic undertakings. It has been his philosophy to take a stand for things, and not against. He seems to be able to see the good there is in an undertaking, and doesn't spend much time trying to find its bad points. By his cheerful disposition and good works, Baird has surely been made a better town than it might otherwise have been. In genuine respect we salute you, Mr. Boydston, and wish for you many more useful, happy years.

### WOMEN OUTNUMBER MEN, CENSUS SHOWS

WASHINGTON — For the first time in U. S. census history, women outnumbered men in last spring's big head count. The ratio: 1,000 women to 981 men.

This was one of the points in a report on the 1950 census made public Saturday night by the Census Bureau. Among the others:

The number of children under 10 years old increased 40 per cent between 1940 and 1950.

In the same decade, the number of persons over 65 increased 37 per cent.

Two out of every three Americans over 14 are married.

During the 12 months which preceded the census, about one-sixth of the population moved from one house to another.

## 'Convicted' Stars Ford - Crawford

The powerful story of what happens to a man in prison is told in Columbia's "Convicted" which opens Tuesday at the Plaza Theatre. The cast is headed by Glenn Ford and Broderick Crawford, the Academy Award winner. Millard Mitchell has the principal supporting role while other featured players include Dorothy Malone, Carl Benton Reid, Frank Faylen and Will Geer.

Advance reports indicate that "Convicted," while biting commentary on conditions in a modern penitentiary, tells its story in essentially human terms. It relates, in scorching style, the harsh story of how Ford, a decent person who accidentally murders a man in a brawl, is sentenced to a State prison. There, he is slowly ground down by the grim prison conditions until he becomes thoroughly indoctrinated with the convict's code. The conflict between Ford and Crawford starts when the latter, as district attorney, convicts Ford and reaches its blistering climax when Crawford becomes warden of Ford's prison. Ford is faced with the tough choice of upholding the convict's code—which means concealing the identity of a murderer—or violating it to win the daughter of the warden and regain his former freedom.

It's all there in "Convicted;" the prison break which ends in disaster; the dread punishment of 'solitary,' which drives strong men to the breaking point; the lineup of prisoners in the yard as Crawford, a fearless warden, walks alone into the mass of hostile men, many of whom he personally sent to the Big House; and the nerve-shattering climax of relentless convict vengeance. "Convicted," according to all who should know, rings with grim authenticity. The background scenes of the stark drama were photographed in California's largest prison, San Quentin, and interiors are said to be duplicates of several other well-known U. S. prisons.

In addition to Ford and Crawford, the other leading players include Mitchell, as the prison's toughest inmate out to 'get' a guard; Miss Malone, as the warden's daughter in love with Ford; Reid, as a brutal prison guard; Faylen, as a stool pigeon, and Geer, as a tragic prisoner.

AUSTIN — A 92-year-old replica of the Great Seal of Texas can now be seen in the office of John Ben Shepperd, secretary of state, at the Capitol.

This seal was removed from the Chamber of the House of Representatives in Washington when that edifice was renovated in 1949. With the seals of other states, it formed a sky-light.

The seal is 20 inches across, painted on glass in a cast iron frame. The gold star which forms its center is on a gray background, surrounded by a green oak and olive branch wreath, further adorned with a bluebonnet, and tied with a dark rose ribbon.

The official seal of Texas, which is kept by the secretary of state, was designed when this was a republic. According to legend, Provisional Governor Henry Smith fashioned it by making an imprint with a large brass button from his overcoat. On the button was a five-pointed star surrounded by oak leaves. The olive branch and other ornaments were added later.

Cut expenses for higher education? "No!" says a college teacher who addresses his remarks by letter to "Congressman" John L. Crosthwait of Dallas.

The professor, who says he has two degrees, should know that a member of the Texas House of Representatives is called Representative, not Congressman. A Congressman is a member of the United States Congress.

He should also look up in the dictionary that word he misspelled in his letter. Representative Crosthwait might get to thinking that higher education is not all it's supposed to be.

The correspondent says that Texas is losing money by investing only two per cent of its wealth on education. (The figure is his.) He thinks the state might spend five per cent on college and university students.

Other opponents of cutting higher education costs reason that state colleges and universities will lose the cream of their teaching staffs unless higher salaries are paid.

And a close observer of affairs here says the many workers in the various state departments will quit unless they get salary raises to meet higher costs of living.

A third of clerical, administrative, accounting, and technical employees will seek jobs elsewhere if recommendations of the Board of Control and Legislative Budget Board — carrying no salary increases — are followed by the Legislature, this observer believes.

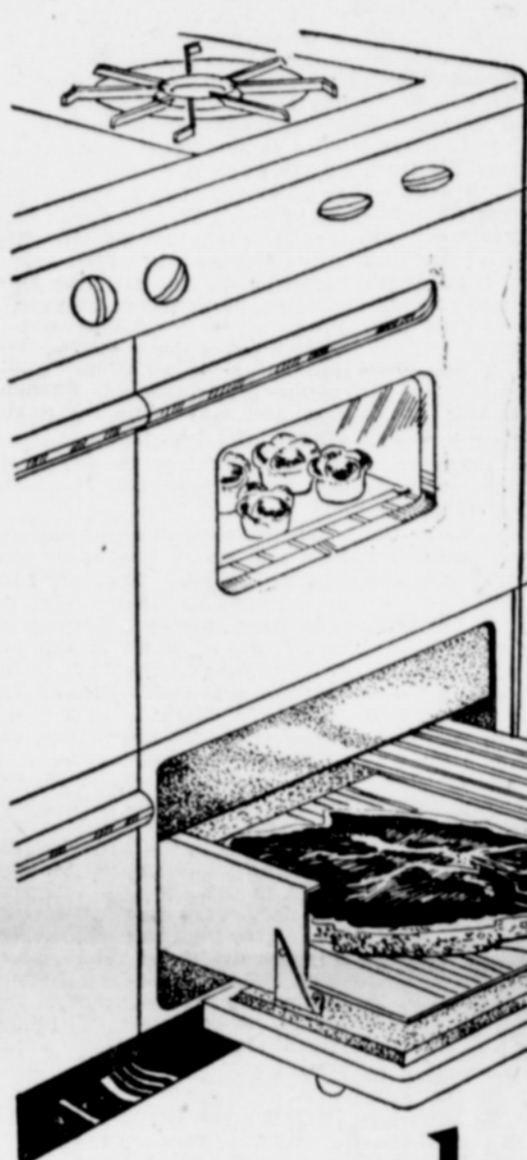

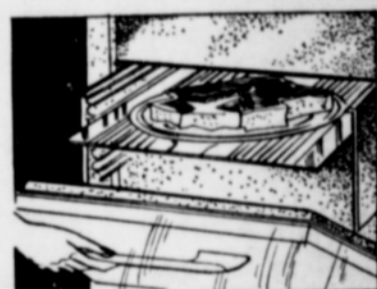

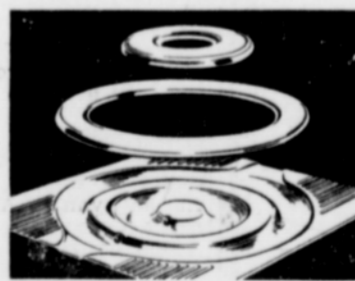

**Macaroni Loaf with Creamed Tuna**

Broadcast: March 3, 1951

1 slightly beaten egg 2 1/2 cups cooked macaroni  
1/2 cup Fat Milk 4 teaspoons melted shortening  
3 tablespoons water 1 can condensed cream of mushroom soup  
4 teaspoons grated onion 7-oz. can tuna  
1/4 teaspoon salt few grains pepper

Grease well, then dust with flour a qt. ring mold or loaf pan. Mix egg, milk, water, onion, salt, pepper, macaroni and shortening. Put into mold or pan. Set in pan holding 1/2 in. hot water. Bake in moderately slow oven (350) 45 min., or until firm. Remove from oven; loosen sides of loaf with knife. Let stand 5 min. Mix and heat until steaming hot mushroom soup and flaked tuna. Turn out loaf. Serve with creamed tuna in ring or around loaf. Makes 4 servings.

Note: If creamed tuna is too thick, add 2 tablesp. water.
