Clark said the woman, attired in expensive looking clothing, approached him, asking for the residence of a "Mr. Jones."

Clark said as he was standing before the woman, she suddenly grabbed at his pants legs, then

"You'll be well. You're not sick now," Clark quoted the woman as saying. With these words, she climbed back in the car, and the couple backed the car from the yard and sped away.

Astonished by the woman's actions, Clark said he just stood motionless for a "few minutes." He found he had been robbed of two one hundred dollar bills upon inspecting his billfold.

Clark said his pocketbook, carried in his left pocket, was worn and tattered. He had two more one hundred dollar bills, besides the two he lost to the woman, in the purse.



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

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

Macaroni Loaf with **Creamed Tuna** Broadcast: March 3, 1951

Grease well, then dust with flour a qt. ring mold or loaf pan. Mix egg, milk, ring mold or loaf pan. Mix egg, milk, water, onion, salt, pepper, macaroni and shortening. Put into mold or pan. Set in pan holding ½ in. hot water. Bake in moderately slow oven (350) 45 min., or until firm. Remove from oven; loosen sides of loaf with knife. Let stand 5 min. Mix and heat until steaming hot mushroom soup and flaked tuna. Turn out loaf. Serve with creamed tuna in ring or around loaf. Makes 4 servings.
