

## PAY TELEVISION

in regards to pay television, it is my belief that it is impossible to be for both sides, because there can be no coexistence between pay television and free television. The position of Dr. Frank Stanton, president of the Columbia Broadcasting System, should meet with the approval of every TV owner in Foard County. The Federal Communications Commission has authorized tests of the pay-television system; but the result of that test will be doubtful, under the law, even to authorized tests, since one must assume they would be conducted on existing facilities licensed to broadcast under the free system. The cost to the American people will be enormous. Each family would have to buy or rent a decoder costing between \$40.00 and \$85.00. On top of that will be the charges for programs. To watch pay television for two-thirds of the number of hours that it now actually watches free television, the average family would have to pay \$473 a year. It is true that with pay television, actors would receive more pay for their services, and pay television would be with less advertising while giving better performances; but what would become of those who could not pay for top performances? They could not see any major performance, such as world series, rose bowl, or any top or high class performances. Again it will place a direct control high class performances. Again it will place a direct control over what one class of people should see, and what another class should not see. This encroachment by our Federal Authorities will eventually do away with free breathing if we don't write our Congressmen and Senators, and advise them how we stand. Friends, this is your Country and my Country; it makes no difference if you are Democratic, Republican, Socialist or what-not, White, Black, Red or Yellow. Think and act now. Write your leaders and let them know where you stand.


