

A very small number of services and commodities have not changed in cost since the pre-World War II era. Fire insurance is on that limited list.

The price of \$1,000 worth of fire insurance on an average home in a typical location in the United States is now about the same as in 1940. In the intervening years, real estate values have almost doubled. A home which cost \$5,-000 in 1940 is worth around \$9,-950 today, and prudent policyholders have naturally increased their insurance coverage accord-

However, in terms of wages and commodities, the real cost of fire insurance on this home which has doubled in value is down, not up. The average factory worker, for example, needs 16 per cent less hours of work to insure his \$9,-950 home today that he did to protect his \$5,000 home in 1940. In 1940, to take still another example, the wheat farmer had to grow and sell 13 bushels of wheat to pay for his policy. Now he can buy his protection for the value of only eight bushels.






