In answer to a political advertisement which was published in this paper two weeks ago, I wish to make the following statement:

Do not let the pension talk mislead you. Regardless of whether I am elected or not, your taxes, so far as the pension referred to, will not he raised or lowered.

The ad with reference to the amount contributed by retired judges is misleading, in that it fails to show the amount contributed by judges who have not retired. As a matter of fact, 5 per cent of the salaries of the nine Judges on the Supreme Court, per year, is \$9,000.00; 5 per cent of the salaries of the five Judges on the Court of Criminal Appeals, per year, is \$5,000.00; 5 per cent of the salaries of the 33 Judges on the Courts of Civil Appeals, per year, is \$26,400.00; and 5 per cent of the salaries of the 153 District Judges, per year, is \$91,800.00, making a total of \$132,-200.00 that judges contribute each year to the Judicial retirement fund and all judges have contributed 5 per cent of their salaries each year since the Judicial Retirement Act was passed in 1949. On this basis contributions made by the judges amounts to approximately one million

The difference between the amount that the judges contribute to the retirement fund and the amount that is required to carry out the retirement plan does not come out of your county taxes; it comes from the general revenue of the State, appropriated by the Legislature. Surely this difference has not amounted to a great deal of taxes, because the first complaint heard of is the complaint made in my opponent's political advertisement.

All State employees have retirement; teachers have retirement, all Federal employees including the Army and Navy, as well as Federal Judges. Is my opponent opposed to this retirement, and will he be opposed to retirement if and when he gets on the State payroll?

As a matter of fact, all the lawyers voted in favor of the legislature submitting the Retirement Amendment. The records disclose that a unanimous bar endorsement was sent to our reprsentative requesting him to support the resolution when it was pending before the House.

Four Years District Attorney.

To vote against me because I am approaching retirement, both in age and time of service. will not raise or lower your taxes. Neither will it repeal the retirement law. The state tax rate is frozen at 42c and cannot be changed, only by a vote of the people.

On November 2, 1948, the people voted in

favor of the Constitutional Amendment, authorizing the Legislature to provide for Judicial Retirement, and on May 2, 1949, the Legislature passed the present Retirement Law. I was appointed District Judge in August, 1949. The law had already been passed. The salary was \$9,000.00 per year, which remained the same until October 1, 1957, at which time it was raised to \$12,000.00 per year. At the time I was appointed District Judge, my opponent was then serving as County Attorney, and has remained in that position ever since at a salary of approximately \$5,300.00 per year, paid out of Wilbarger County taxes. The District Judge's salary is paid by the State of Texas. Therefore, his services as County Attorney has cost the taxpayers of Wilbarger County more County taxes than the District Judge's service has cost the taxpayers, since Wilbarger County pays only a small per cent of the State

Of course the increase in the salary and the retirement plan is attractive to me, but that is not the only reason I have asked the people for re-election. I think that the record I have made as a trial judge justifies consideration, and I am quite confident that the increase in the salary and the retirement plan encouraged my opponent to make the race for District Judge. I wonder if he voted against Judicial Retirement in 1948, the amendment was sponsored by the lawyers and was adopted by a majority vote of the people.


