John Connally, Texas gubernatorial candidate who led the ticket in the May 5 Democratic Primary Election, will make a personal appearance Friday, May 18 (today) in Baird, it was reported by his campaign headquarters this week.

Baird has been included in Mr. Connally's "Whistle Stop" campaign which will begin at Texarkana on Thursday and end at El Paso Saturday. He is scheduled to arrive in Baird at the Texas & Pacific Railway station at 1:00 p. m., where he will make a short talk and visit with the people.

Following is the Treasurer's report: Seal Sale expense, \$320.93; Administration, \$80.00; Research (medical and social) \$140.34; case finding, (patch test program and x-rays) \$393.87; health education, \$213.96; other activities, \$50.00; State and National participation, \$196.47. Total, \$1395.57. Seal Sale returns amounted to \$1035.92.

The citizens of Callahan County have expressed their confidence in their Tuberculosis Association by their continued voluntary support, and each member of the Board of Directors and Executive Committee feel responsible for the wise expenditure of the Association's funds according to the approved principles for programs of voluntary associations.

This association will continue in its program of seeking to motivate the public to the end that tuberculosis be prevented, that adequate provision be made for the diagnosis, treatment and rehabilitation of the tuberculous and that similar appropriate measures be taken with reference to other respiratory diseases.

SS Benefits Increase Over Last Year

Callahan County showed an increase of 16.1% in number and 20% in amount of monthly social security checks from December, 1960, to December, 1961, according to figures just received by R. R. Tuley, Jr., district manager for the Social Security Administration in Abilene.

688 persons received \$43,118 in retirement checks for December 1961, and 32 persons received \$2,717 in disability payments.

246 wives and dependent husbands received \$7,548 in retirement claims and 11 others received \$310 from disability claims.

117 children received \$4,995 from claims on a retired or deceased parent, and 17 children were paid \$443 from claims on a disabled parent. 132 widows, dependent widowers, and parents received \$7,140.

At the present time, social security benefits total over a billion dollars a month to just over seventeen million beneficiaries. Tuley gave these reasons for the rise in beneficiaries: (1) more persons in the age group, (2) age qualifications now 62 instead of 65, and (3) less social security credit now needed for eligibility to retirement or survivors benefits.

Miss John Gilliland, Former Baird Postmaster, Dies Thursday

Miss John Gilliland, former postmaster at Baird and member of a pioneer Callahan County family, died Thursday at 8:45 a. m. in Callahan County Hospital. She had been a patient for two days, but had had a lengthy illness.

Miss Gilliland was born July 8, 1885, in Tecumseh, the daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. W. E. Gilliland. Her parents came to the county in 1874. She was the granddaughter of the late Dr. J. D. Windham, first doctor in the county.

The retired Civil Service employee worked in the Ranger post office for several years before becoming postmaster in Baird in 1935. She retired in 1953, after 42 years with the Post Office Department. Except for the time she spent in Ranger, she lived all of her life in Callahan County.

County Agent By TRAVIS ALLEN

The brucellosis program is still making good progress, as of Friday, May 11th, Herds containing 10,693 head of cattle have been tested. At present the rate of infection is running at a low enough level that the requirements for certification of the county will be made the first test, if the percentage of infection stays on the low percentage now being found.

Bleeders are working in the Putnam, Cross Plains, Dudley and Clyde areas. It is hoped the Putnam area will be finished this week, with the exception of a few herds which will be tested a little later. Another bleeder has started to work in the Cross Plains area and this now put one full time and one part time bleeder in the area.

If you have cattle in one of the areas now being tested and they haven't been tested, contact one of the line-up men for your area and be sure they are tested now. It will make the program go faster and be much easier for you to get tested than waiting until the bleeder has

moved to another area.

Livestock owners are urged to be on the look-out for screw-worms. If you have a case, send 10 worms from the wound to Box 609, Mission, Texas. Containers are available from the County Agent's office.

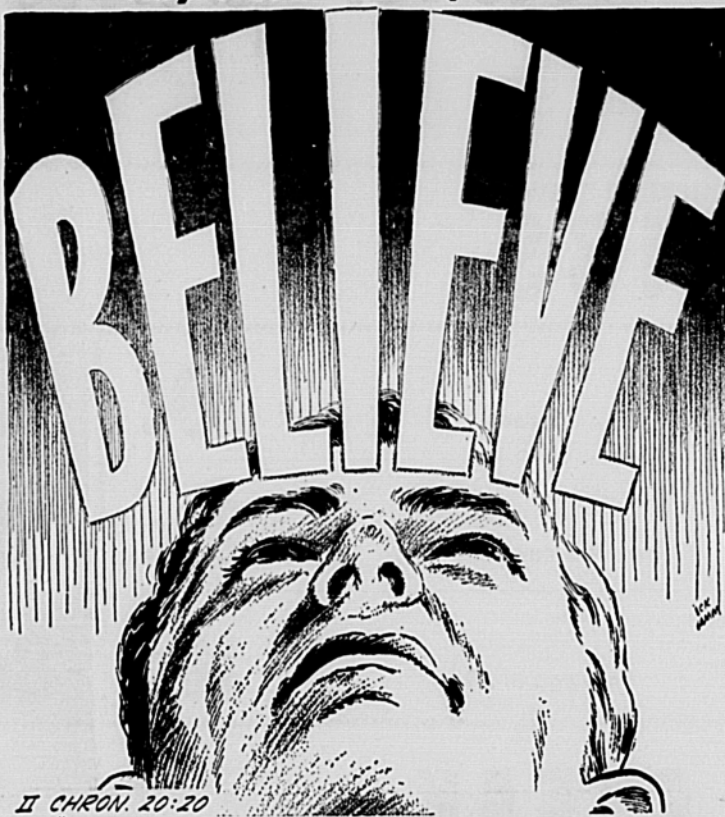

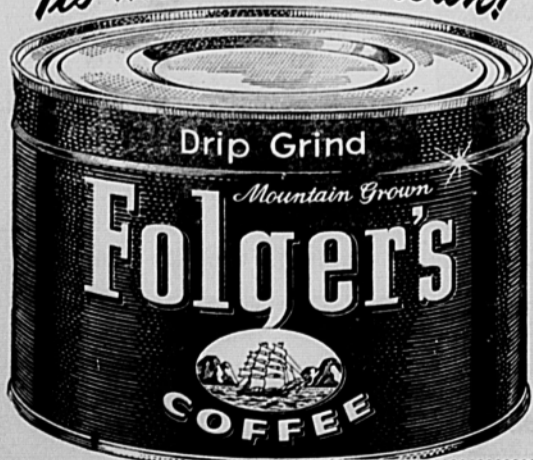
