Stock Sanitary Commission, has issued warning that every precaution be roses. immediately taken to eradicate the disease, announcement being made that the situation is growing serious. The affected area in Texas, according to Dr. Cloud, includes Orange, Hardin, Jefferson and Liberty Counties, all of which is under quarantine.

State makes it dangerous for the entire State as this disease, which is at present taking a heavy toll of human and animal life in Arkansas Tennessee and Mississippi, spreads rapidly. Every effort to eradicate the disease before it reaches epidemic form is being taken by Texas authorities. Dr. Cloud said.

To summarize, this receiver in its present location will successfully receive any signal which is not drowned by static; the sensitiveness being such that this unusual limitation is the only one imposed on reception.

I shall send you copies of telegram interchanged between myself and the officials of the Oakland, California station, indicating the nature of the reception obtained.

I hope this information will be of interest to you and that you will not hesitate to call on me at any time to furnish technical or other relevant information.
