Dear Mr. Deutsch:

I take great pleasure in sending you, under separate cover, with my compliments a map of the United States showing stations heard on the Radiola Super-Heterodyne installed in a Brunswick Console phonograph.

The exact circumstances of the case are as follows: All of these stations were heard in a New York apartment in the heart of the city, the building being of steel construction. No antenna or ground was used in any case but only a 14-inch enclosed loop. The majority of the stations were heard through the powerful transmission of New York's local stations WJY-WJZ of the Radio Corporation of America two miles away, and WEAF four miles away. The usual dry battery tubes UV-199 were used throughout. In every case reception was on the loud speaker and of such loudness that there was no strain on the listener. In fact, the speech and music would have been comfortably audible at a distance of at least fifteen feet in every case. For example, the reception from Oakland, California, and from Fort Worth was of such intensity and clarity that Mrs. Goldsmith listened to it across two rooms at a distance of nearly fifty feet.

To summarize, this receiver in its present location will successfully receive any signal which is not drowned by static; the sensitiveness being such that this unusual limitation is the only one imposed on reception.

I shall send you copies of telegram interchanged between myself and the officials of the Oakland, California station, indicating the nature of the reception obtained.

I hope this information will be of interest to you and that you will not hesitate to call on me at any time to furnish technical or other relevant information.

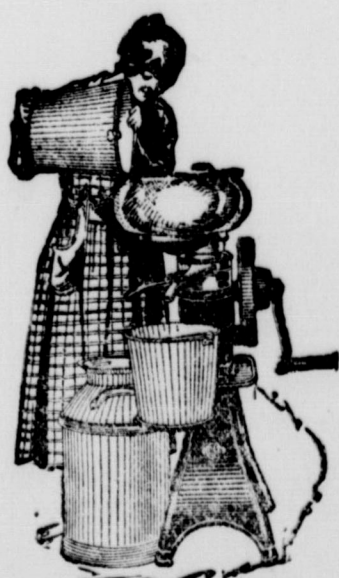

The primary is again over and many of the nominees have been selected. In some races the final contest is yet to come in the run-off. It seems that in the case of the Governor's race it will be between Felix D. Robertson and Mrs. Ferguson. It is doubtful if Lynch Davidson can overcome the lead of about 3,000 which Mrs. Ferguson has been holding over him for the last few days. So that is the situation the voters of Texas face. In some respects the situation today is very much like that in the senatorial race two years ago. It looks like a majority of the voters are going to be forced to cast their votes for a candidate that is not their choice. Robertson is the choice of the klan, Ferguson is the choice of the Ferguson element, which as a whole represents the anti-prohibition forces, and neither of these elements represents a majority of the voters of Texas. Therefore with Robertson and Mrs. Ferguson in the run-off we are forced to accept a candidate for Governor that is the choice of a minority of the voters. That is clearly minority rule. Nothing has done more to force that situation, in our judgment, than the ku klux klan. But Texas must accept the fruits of her folly in the matter. When one hugs a serpent to his bosom sooner or later it is liable to plant its fangs in his flesh and inject deadly poison into the body. That is what has happened to Texas democracy. But happily there are indications of recovery from the poisonous wounds inflicted. Only in the case of the Governor has the klan shown superior strength, and possibly that is because of some remaining indifference on the part of the Democrats in many localities. In several of the other state offices the anti-klan forces have piled up huge pluralities. This is especially noticeable in the race for attorney general, in which Dan Moody seems to have run away with the thing, and Barry Miller of Dallas is far ahead in the race for Lieutenant Governor. In a number of counties the klan was made the leading issue and in most, if not all of them, the anti-klan won signal victories. Even if the Governorship is lost to the klan, it looks like the Democrats are coming back with the determination to take politics into their own hands and some day the klan will be buried so deep it will never stick its head up again. But the klan candidate is not yet in the Governor's chair. We may yet see the Ferguson come back, and if it should turn out that the klan is beaten by Ferguson, it will be the hardest hit it ever received or ever could get.

Mother's Cook Book

SEASONABLE FOODS

DURING the summer days cooling dishes, not too rich, are most appetizing.

Jellied Bouillon.

Soak one tablespoonful of gelatin in three tablespoonfuls of cold water for five minutes, then add two cupfuls of hot, well-seasoned bouillon; stir until well dissolved. Chill when thick and serve gently stirred with a fork to break into small pieces. Serve in bouillon cups.

Fruit Soup.

Pick over, wash, wash a quart of raspberries or strawberries. Add two cupfuls of sugar and let stand an hour. Press through a double thickness of cheesecloth. Add two cupfuls of cold water and bring quickly to the boiling point. Add a tablespoonful of gelatin softened in three tablespoonfuls of cold water. Add the juice of half a lemon, turn into a shallow bowl and serve cut into small cubes, in sherbet cups.

Jellied Tomato Bouillon.

Cook one quart of tomatoes for one-half hour in a covered dish, with one minced onion, three cloves, two teaspoonfuls of salt, a little pepper, a bit of bay leaf and a teaspoonful of sugar, with a little minced parsley. Strain through a double cheesecloth; add three tablespoonfuls of gelatin softened in one-half cupful of cold water. Stir until the gelatin is dissolved. Set aside to become firm. Break with a fork and serve with salted waters.

Chicken Pudding.

Butter a baking dish or casserole, put in two cupfuls of leftover chicken and pour over the following: Two eggs beaten and added to two cupfuls of milk, one can of corn, one teaspoonful of salt and a few dashes of pepper. Put into a pan of hot water and bake in a hot oven until firm in the center.

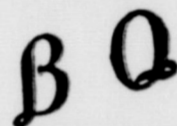

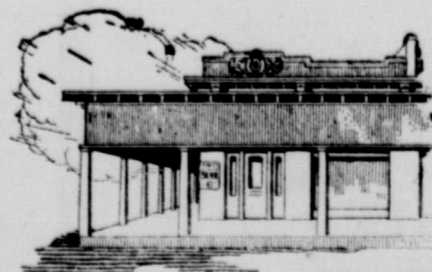

 An Ordinance ordering a public hearing and that notice thereof be given to property owners and others interested in street improvement ordered to be constructed on the streets hereinafter named, approving plans and statement of the consulting engineer of the City of Crowell, F. E. Devlin, and estimates of special assessments to be made and levied, and for other purposes.  
 I, J. Edgar Kimsey, city secretary of the City of Crowell, Texas, in pursuance of the hereinafter resolution, do hereby give notice of the publication of the same, of the matters and things therein contained, which resolution is as follows, to-wit:  
 Resolution of the City Council of the City of Crowell, Texas, determining the necessity of levying an assessment against the property and the owners thereof, abutting upon the streets hereinafter named, for a part of the cost of improving said streets, fixing the time for the hearing of the owners of said property concerning the same, and directing the City Secretary to give notice of the said hearing, as required by section 8 of chapter 11 of title 22 of the revised statutes of Texas as passed by the 31st Legislature.

WHEREAS, the City Council has heretofore, by resolution, ordered the improvement of Main Street between the south line of Donnell Street and the north line of Austin Street; Commerce street between the east line of Main street and the west line of Houston street, same to be paved with 2-inch Amesite on 5-inch concrete base, and the building of curbs and gutters on said streets, and doing such other work as may be found necessary for the proper performance of this improvement, in accordance with the plans and specifications now on file in the office of the city clerk.  
 WHEREAS, in accordance with section 2 of resolution entitled a resolution to carry into effect chapter 11, title 22 of the revised statutes of the State of Texas, authorizing cities and towns which have accepted the benefits thereof to improve the streets, highways and public places thereof after advertising for bids for said work of improving said streets between the points above named, has been let to Jordan Construction Co., and  
 WHEREAS, a contract has been entered into between the said City and the said Jordan Construction Co. on the 9th day of May, 1924, for the performance of said work, and  
 WHEREAS, the said Jordan Construction Co. has duly given bond for the performance of said work, and for the maintenance of same, and the consulting engineer of Crowell, F. E. Devlin, has, in accordance with section 2 of said resolution, filed his report with the City Council as to the cost of said improvements, and as to other matters by the City Council.  
 NOW THEREFORE, be it resolved by the City Council of the City of Crowell, Texas, that the report or statement filed by the consulting engineer, having been duly examined, is hereby, in all things approved, and  
 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that part of the cost of the said improvements shall be assessed against the abutting property upon the streets so to be improved and the owners thereof, and that the total cost of said improvements shall be paid and defrayed as follows:  
 (a) The City of Crowell shall pay an amount only, equal to one-fourth of the amount of the total cost of paving, exclusive of sidewalks and curbs, and that part of storm sewers directly serving the paving district, together with catch basins and man-holes, and engineering and incidental fees.  
 (b) After deducting the City's proportion of one-fourth of the cost, and engineering and incidental fees, the total remaining cost of such improvements shall be paid by owners of property abutting upon the streets heretofore named.  
 An amount equal to three-fourths of the whole cost of said improvements and total cost of sidewalks and curbs shall be paid by said property owners and shall be assessed against them and their respective parcels of land abutting upon said streets, and said streets to be improved and their property in accordance with Article 1011, Revised Statutes of Texas, and the ordinances of the City of Crowell, after the hearing herein mentioned, and  
 That the said cost which may be assessed against said property and its owners shall be in accordance with the front foot plan in proportion as the frontage of said property is to the total frontage of the property on said street to be improved, but that no assessment shall be made against any of said property or its owners in excess of special benefit in enhanced values of said property caused by said improvements, nor until after the hearing herein mentioned.  
 That the part of said cost to be paid by said property owners and assessed against them and their property abutting upon the said streets shall be paid in six equal installments, the first installment due and payable within 30 days from the completion of each district, with interest thereon from date until paid at the rate of 8 per cent, per annum, and one payment on the first day of September of each consecutive year thereafter until said 6 installments are paid in full, together with the interest thereon due, provided, however, that any property owners may, before maturity pay one or more installments thereof, by paying the principal and interest up to the date of such payment.

WHEREAS, according to the report or statement of said consulting engineer hereby approved by the City Council, the total estimate cost of such improvements is \$51,213.37 and the proportion and amount to be assessed against abutting property and its owners is as follows:

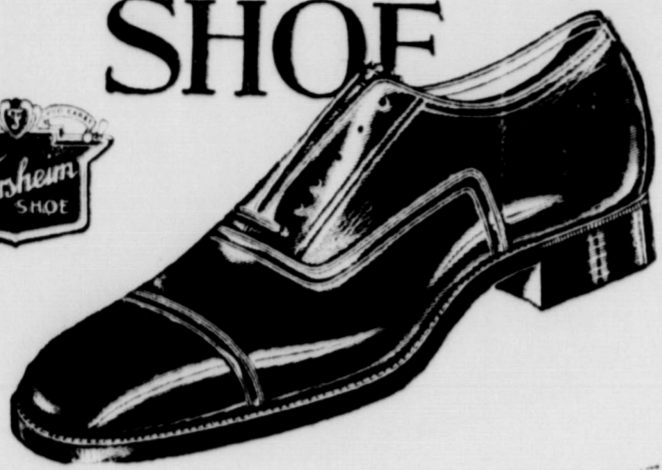
