BURGLARS ENTER MARGARET STORE

On last Friday morning about 2:30 o'clock the store of the J. W. Allison Mercantile Company at Margaret was entered by two burglars, who was supposed to have intended robbing the safe but were foiled in their efforts.

M. B. Clark, who runs a res-

taurant and who was sleeping in a room in Mr. Middlebrook's house near the Allison store, awoke at 2:30 and discovered a light in the store. He believed there was something wrong, so he fired a shot, which frightened the burglars away. They left their soap in pan ready prepared for sealing the door when the nito-glycerine was applied for blowing the safe. No goods were missed from the store.

A search was made Friday but no clew was found as to their whereabouts. The burglars entered the building by cutting out a panel of the rear door.

Commercializing Rabbits

Austin, Texas, April 14.-Carrying out his plans of commercializing the Texas jack rabbit, Commissioner of Agriculture Fred W. Davis has sent experts to the western portion of the state to teach farmers how to can rabbits for shipment to the eastern and northern markets.

Among those sent is Mrs. E. M. Barnett, head of the economics bureau of the department. She is teaching the farmers and others engaged in killing rabbits as an occupation, several different methods of canning the rabbit meat, including potted rabbit, stew, sausages and sweet

Mrs. Barret has advised the department here that she and the others in the field are making a success of the work, and that it will not be long before carloads of rabbit meat will be shipped out of state markets.







Making a Victoria Cross.

Effects of Arsenic.

"Arsenic, as science has long told us, is an accumulative poison," said a druggist. "When one takes it either by prescription for the upbuilding of an appetite or for the bleaching of the skin he does not feel any ill effects for several years. The effect of the drug is bracing and makes a person feel like eating. It also aids the digestion. The average user of the poison takes it in such small quantities that he does not realize how much of it will accumulate in his system in the course of four or five years.

"Being an accumulative poison, it often takes that length of time to see the results of the drug. Then the user may complain of not being able to control his fingers or toes. Subsequently he loses control of his hands and arms. Paralysis, superinduced by arsenical poisoning, is the fearful result."
