## FOARD COUNTY WHEAT HARVEST IN FULL SWING

Harvesting of Foard County's 1958 bumper wheat crop got started last Wednesday afternoon when the first of this year's crop was brought to local elevators. By Friday, the harvest was in full swing with every available combine and truck working. Trucks were lined up on the highway waiting to unload at the elevators. Friday afternoon, and a line of waiting trucks has continued practically all day every day since then, with Sunday afternoon's line backed up to the square. The grain elevators of Foard County had received around 700,000 bushels of wheat and from 50,000 to 75,000 bushels of oats and barley each up to noon Wednesday. At that time harvesting of the Foard County grain crop was in full swing.

The hot dry weather has ripened the grain rapidly, and the harvest was going full-blast from practically the time when the first wheat arrived. In previous years, the harvest has started rather slowly and built up gradually to the big rush. Elevator men reported that on Saturday, well over 100,000 bushels of wheat were received at the county's elevators. Most of the grain received here is being loaded into trucks and railroad cars for shipment elsewhere.

From all reports, yield-per-acre is the best in Foard County that it has been since 1951. Yields of up to 47 bushels per acre have been reported, with the majority of the fields from 25 to 35. Weight of the grain is also running higher than usual, with some of the wheat weighing 65 pounds per bushel, and the majority brought in weighing 60 pounds or more. The first loads of the 1958 crop were brought to the elevators just after the News was placed in the mails last Wednesday afternoon. First load at the Foard County Mill was brought in by Russell Brothers & Gafford from a farm south of Crowell. The load contained 161 bushels, weighed 60 pounds and had a moisture content of 14.25. First load at the Farmers Co-Op. Elevator was brought in by J. M. Barker. It contained 278 bushels, tested 58 pounds, with a moisture content of 14.96. The oats harvest in Foard County is also in full swing with extra large yields being reported. Test weight of the oats is also running above average, and yields of up to 60 bushels per acre is not unusual this year.

According to ASC office figures, there are about 60,000 acres of wheat in Foard County this year. With the yields reported thus far, the county should make well over one million bushels.

### 4-H Clubbers to Go to Texas A&M Roundup June 10-12

This recreational and educational tour is sponsored by the Producers Grain Corporation and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

## Foard Man Builds Soil Saving Dam

If you have ever tried to stop a gully that was eating its way up a draw in one of your fields, you know the problems. A. J. Morris of the Riverside community was confronted with. About 50 acres of watershed contributed to an active gully that was cutting a path across the middle of the farm that he rents from George Mainard of Vernon.

The only sure way of controlling a gully is by controlling the water that makes it. This was impossible for him to do because there was no possible way of diverting the water from the gully. Mr. Morris knew that dumping trash in a gully doesn't stop it; the water cuts around and under it. Paving the sides and bottom of the gully was impossible because of the enormous amount of water that kept it clean of vegetation.

There was but one alternative that he could try. That was to use an earth fill or gully plug to stabilize the grade in the gully, to provide detention storage in case of big rains, and to provide safe spillway discharge for occasional overflow. Mr. Morris installed this practice in March of this year. As a means of water retention on the watershed, he has constructed about two miles of terraces, improved cropping system by including Chinese red peas in rotation with cotton, and used terraces as guide lines for farming on contour. By applying these practices it will enable more water to penetrate into the soil, hence, less water will go into the natural drain.

Sediment retention dams are one of the many practices on which farmers can draw cost-free assistance through the Great Plains Conservation program. Contact your Soil Conservation Service office in Crowell if you are interested in this erosion control practice.

#### Boys, Read This: Help to Protect Young Wildlife

Don't molest nesting wildlife. This is the warning from the director of Law Enforcement of the Game and Fish Commission. Teachers and parents should explain to boys who are venturing into the woods with .22 rifles, air guns, and sling shots that nesting birds and young animals should not be harmed.

The same is true on the coast, the director said. Millions of shore birds are nesting along the shore line and islands. These birds are protected under the laws.

"If nests are robbed or the parent birds otherwise disturbed, it will mean a loss in population of the birds," the director said. "Sometimes people are thoughtless and throw rocks at these birds or destroy the nests. Wardens over

the state are doing a fine educational job, especially among Scouts and organized groups teaching them the value of protecting wildlife. We hope it be protected."

## TO THE VOTERS OF THE 46TH JUDICIAL DISTRICT:



During my tenure of office as District Judge, only twenty-seven civil cases have been appealed to the higher courts. Seventeen were affirmed, eight reversed and rendered and two appeals dismissed. None were sent back for a re-trial.

Retired judges are subject to assignment upon call to any district in the State and it shall be such judges' duty to serve in such district, unless for good cause presented by him in writing.

Every judge in the State contributes 5 per cent of his salary to assist in carrying out the provisions of the Judicial Retirement. The amount deducted remains in the State General Fund and is subject to appropriation by the Legislature, as other moneys. The Legislature appropriates such sums of money as may be necessary to carry out the retirement. The amount of retirement pay shall in no case be more than 50 per cent of a judge's salary at the time he retires.

If you believe my record is worthy of consideration, I hope that you will vote for my re-election at the Democratic Primary July 26, 1958.

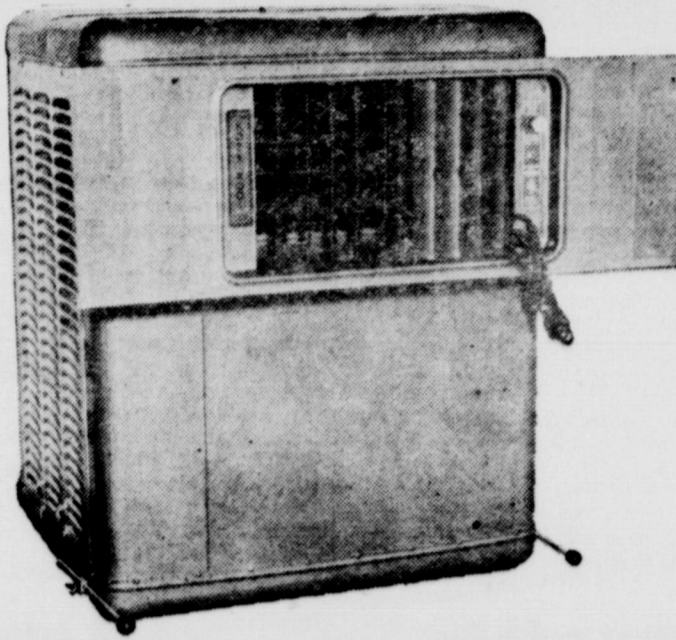

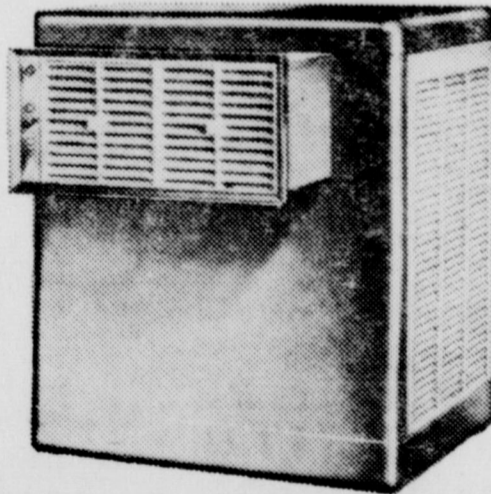
