According to the Quanah Tribunehief, Dr. Atticus Webb, who spoke it the Quanah churches last Sunday claims prohibition to have been a great success. Dr. Webb is in posi-tion to know more about the results of the prohibition law perhaps than any other Texan, as he is a leader of he anti-Saloon League of Texas.

Statements and statistics he gave in his addresses are interesting. The Tribune-Chief reports him to have successfully met the argument that prohibition in the United States is not enforced; that prohibition can not be enforced; that the people do not want prohibition.

He cited New York, the wettest city in the Union, where the people did not want prohibition. The speaker said the record shows that against every hundred drunken men before the Eighteenth Amendment there are now 33. For every hundred drunken women there are now 19. For every hundred fights caused by liquor there are now five.

He further said, as reported by the Tribune-Chief, "that we had bootleggers long before we got rid of the saloons. At one time when Dallas was running over with saloons Comp troller Terrell closed up more blind tigers than there were saloons.

"At present statistics show that 300,000 people, who would have died every year if we had had saloons, did


