SCHOOL BONDS ELECTION SET FOR SATURDAY, OCTOBER 31

BAIRD — On Saturday, Oct. 31, citizens of the Baird Independent School District will go to the polls to vote on school bonds consisting of two issues - one totaling \$125,000 to cover the elementary library, elementary science laboratory and classroom, physical education dressing facilities, vocational building, and improvement to existing facilities; and one issue for \$110,000 for a new physical education building.

In March, 1970, the Texas Education Agency made an accreditation survey of the Baird Schools. A number of deficiencies were observed, and the school was advised that steps

must be taken to correct them if accreditation standards were to be met.

An accreditation visit to the Baird Schools (by the Texas Education Agency) is tentatively scheduled for the spring of 1972. Prior to that time, the school must periodically file progress reports advising the agency of steps taken by the school to correct the deficiencies noted in 1970.

The proposed facilities in the bond issues were specifically mentioned in the Texas Education Agency's survey report. The board decided after consultation with numerous architects, builders, and Texas Education Officials that it would be much more feasible to include a new gymnasium at the same time the new dressing facilities are being planned, for the following reasons:

1. Our present gymnasium was built in 1937, and is not adequate in size and design for current physical education needs.

2. Several competent architects have advised that a minimum 10% cost increase per year on construction is assured, thus making a \$100,000 gymnasium cost \$150,000 or more in five years.

3. Water is seeping into gymnasium dressing rooms, and sewage often backs up into the dressing rooms, hampering their use. Building specialists have said that building new facilities is the practical solution.

Both bond issues, totaling \$235,000 can be paid for in 22 years at an approximate increased cost of 21c per \$100.00 valuation. For example, if your present yearly school taxes are \$15.50, there will be an increase of \$2.10 per year.

The bond election will be held at the American Legion Hall October 31, from 7 a. m. to 7 p. m. Jon Hardwick will serve as election judge.

Mrs. Margaret Gilliland reports that 17 absentee ballots have been sent out for the school bond election.

Seven Constitutional Amendments To Be Voted On November 3rd

Many politicians have been campaigning across the state these last few weeks before the Nov. 3 General Election, discussing the problems that are important to all Texans.

One of the important things discussed the problems that are the proposed 7 Constitutional Amendments. Following is a list of the proposed amendment:

No. 1 - The constitutional amendment relating to the removal, retirement, or censure of Justices, Judges, or Justices of the Peace under prescribed circumstances.

No. 2 - Repeal of the prohibition against open saloons found in Section 20, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

No. 3 - The amendment to authorize the Legislature to provide by law for the establishment of a uniform method of assessment of ranch, farm, and forest lands which, shall be based upon the capability of such lands to support the raising of livestock and/or to produce farm and forest crops.

No. 4 - The constitutional amendment reconstituting the State Building Commission as a three-member appointive commission.

No. 5 - The constitutional amendment authorizing any county, on the vote of a majority of its qualified property taxing electors, to issue road bonds in an amount not to exceed one-fourth of the assessed valuation of the real property in the county.

No. 6 - The constitutional amendment increasing the value of the homestead which is exempt from forced sale.

No. 7 - The amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for consolidating governmental offices and functions and allowing political subdivisions to contract for performance of governmental functions in any county.
