Bears Win Fifth Straight Game By Large Score Over Cross Plains Buffs

BAIRD — The undefeated Bears put win No. 5 on the record books Friday night, by a large score over the Cross Plains Buffaloes 61-6. The game was the last pre-district game of the season for the Bears.

The first touchdown was in the last second of the 1st quarter when Gary Goble hit halfback David Strickland with a 51 yard pass play. Place kicker Jay Reeves added a one.

Cecil Faircloth, the Bears fullback, made a 7 yard run up the middle for the second, and Reeves kicked the extra point. Faircloth hit pay dirt again on a one yard run and Reeves kicked the 3rd extra point of the game.

The Bears continued to put forth strength throughout the remaining minutes of the game. Four touchdowns came in the 3rd period: 17 yard run by Goble, 34 yarder by Faircloth, Strickland succeeded after 20 yards and Efrim Rodriguez on a play covering 33 yards. Jay Reeves continued adding ones to sixes, successfully kicking all conversions.

The final quarter, Reeves and halfback Terry Bates com-

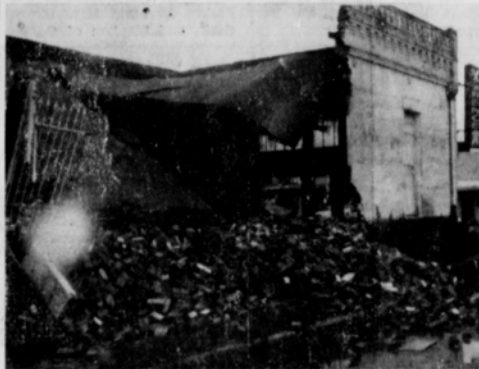
bined talents and scored on a 50 yard pass play. The final TD was 235 pounds of Butch Barron racing up the center from the quarterback position for a 47 yard score.

The Buffaloes only score was by linebacker Jackie Thomas on a Baird fumble in the end zone.

The Bears will begin district play Friday, October 15, in the Roscoe Ploowby Stadium. Kick-off time is 7:30 p. m.

The Bear coaching staff are very pleased with the team and progress in pre-district games. The team has scored 189 points and had only 27 scored against them. Cecil Faircloth continues to increase his scoring lead in District 7-A. David Strickland is second and Gary Goble in fifth place.

The Bears and coaches are looking forward to the district race. Coach Bo Wilson stated this week that the team will begin the important games now and the coaches and players would like to express their thanks for the fine support given them by the fans. He also states, "It is great to go to the enemies field and find that your are backed by so many loyal fans and supporters."

B. F. Russell, Former Co. Attorney, Dies Wednesday, Oct 6, in Menard

BAIRD — Funeral services for Benjamin F. Russell, 81, were held Saturday, Oct. 9, at 2 p. m. in Godfrey Funeral Chapel. Officiating was Rev. Delton Fisher, pastor of Baird First United Methodist Church, and Rev. Steve Russell, Methodist minister of Baird, New Mexico, a great nephew of Mr. Russell. Burial was in Ross Cemetery.

Mr. Russell died Oct. 6, at 2:35 p. m. in Menard Hospital following a lengthy illness.

Born Dec. 23, 1889 in Sipe Springs, he married Ruby Gibbs of Rowden at Baird, April 8, 1924.

He was a veteran of WWI, serving with the 36th Division in France. He was a Callahan County attorney for six years, and was a Baird City Councilman for six years. He was a retired attorney for the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers in Dallas. He was a Mason and a member of the Methodist Church.

Mr. Russell studied at Texas A&M, the University of Texas and the Sorbonne in Paris. He was a reporter for the Austin American-Statesman, and The Tribune from 1913-1916. During WWII, he worked as an attorney and assistant chief of the acquisition branch, Southwestern Division, U. S. Army Corps of Engineers. He retired in 1958 and he and Mrs. Russell moved to Menard.

Survivors include his wife; a daughter, Renee Harold of Staten Island, N. Y.; three sisters, Mrs. Felix Mitchell of Baird, Mrs. C. W. Richey of Tulsa and

Mrs. Grady Coats of Salem, Ore.; one brother, W. J. Russell of Hatch, N. M.; three granddaughters; several nieces and nephews.

UNDERSTANDING THE SCRIPTURES

(continued from last week)

In the article last week we studied Ephesians 5:17 in which we are taught that we should understand what the will of the Lord is. Jesus said those who "do the will of my Father which is in heaven" shall enter into the kingdom of heaven. (Matt. 7:21). The will of the Father is revealed to us through Jesus (John 14:6, Heb. 1:1). So, we must understand the scriptures (the words and teachings of Jesus and His apostles) before we can be saved.

"But," many people say, "we do not all understand it alike." This unscrupulous idea of Satan is the very reason that many people make little or no attempt to know what the scriptures teach. More people could and would understand the scriptures if they could rid themselves of this erroneous idea.

If we understand a scripture at all, it will be ALIKE. Facts and commands cannot be understood in different ways! We either understand, or we misunderstand. If we understand, we understand alike. There may be differences in concept of what is meant by a certain statement or a certain teaching. But, one or both of the concepts as to the meaning is wrong. Both cannot be right.

When Jesus says, "He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved. He that believeth not shall be damned", it cannot mean one thing to one man, and something else to another and both of them be right. Whatever is its true meaning is its meaning to all men, not just to some. What God says to one, he says to all. He does not have one standard for one man and another standard for another man. We either understand it, or we misunderstand it.

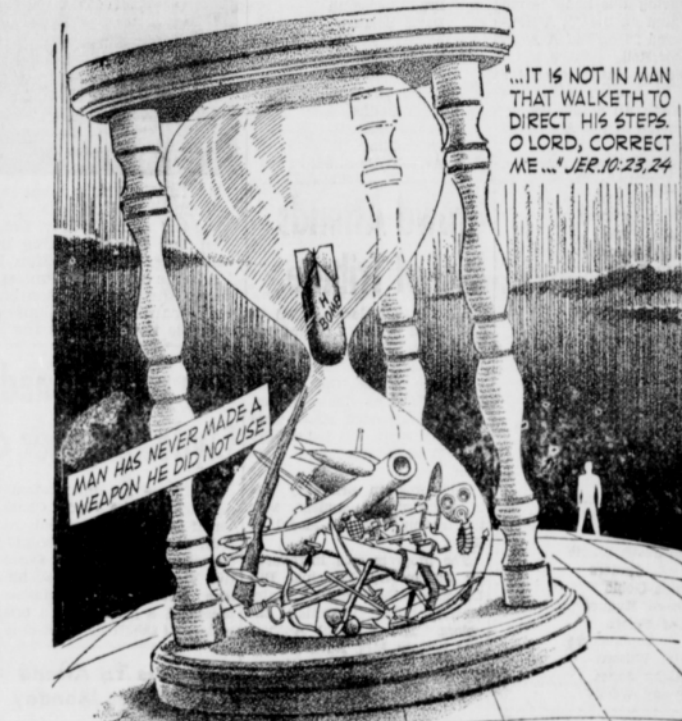

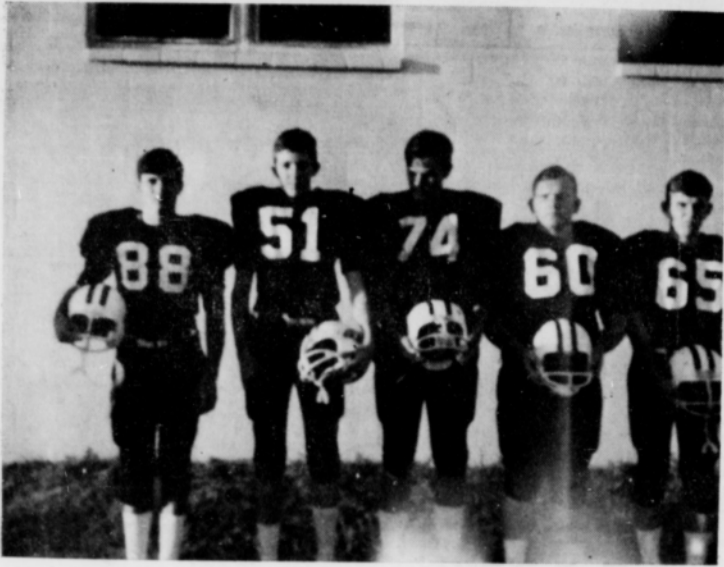
