SECOND TRAGEDY HITS CROSS PLAINS ELEMENTARY SCHOOL

CROSS PLAINS — The fire which swept through the Cross Plains Elementary last Wednesday night caused an estimated loss in excess of \$250,000. The building was termed a total loss from the fire which roared into an inferno through the 46-year old school.

Of unknown origin, the fire was reported at 11 p. m. Wednesday night, and burned until 4 a. m. Thursday morning, with firemen still on the scene at 6 a. m., and throughout the day.

The Cross Plains School Board have held several night sessions in order to hasten plans to re-

place the facilities as soon as possible, however, a building cannot be erected by the time classes resume next fall.

A quick bond election is expected in the town of Cross Plains to finance this now needed building, and reports were given that each citizen would probably be in favor of the bonds, which in small communities is about the only solution in raising the large amounts of funds needed in times such as this.

The insurance on the destroyed building would cover approximately \$70,000, falling short of the \$190,000 believed sufficient to rebuild class rooms and other needed facilities.

The loss of the school was the second tragedy to hit the Cross Plains school in a week. The unexpected death of Grade School Principal Jack Watkins, who had been associated with the school for 17 years. Principal Watkins died suddenly at his home east of Cross Cut. He was in his 15th year as Principal.

Supt. Wayne Ford stated that the school had settled back into normal routine after the death of Mr. Watkins, when the second loss came from the fire. Supt. Ford and High School Principal Scot Edington are doubling up to carry out the grade school principal's duties until a replacement is found.

BAIRD — At the regular City Council meeting Tuesday night, three interested Baird citizens, Mrs. Marshall Newcomb, Mrs. Robert Chandler and Eddie Brumbaugh, met with the Council to discuss the problems of animals running loose in town and what could be done in regards to helping with these problems. Each visitor gave their views about the animals, and asked the Council to work with them in seeking a solution.

Complaints plague the city councilmen quite often due to freedom of animals. If an animal is properly cared for, it should be vaccinated against the possibility of rabies, and kept inside your own yard. This is to prevent trouble for your or anyone else.

Dogs of sorts seem to have freedom in some parts of the city. Some are not harmful, while other seem to be trouble makers, chasing cars, overturning trash cans, etc. Would you, as a citizen of Baird, investigate your animals and make sure that they are not bothering your neighbor?

Dogs are reported to be running in packs, and have proven dangerous to property and offer a real threat to small children. The female dogs, during

mating, cause numbers of dogs to form a group and roam about the city. Will you co-operate in volunteering your time to help with this problem. Lots of things can be done, and if you are interesting in helping with this problem?

Be sure your animals are cared for and remember that you may love your dog, but the neighbor may want his freedom from all animals. Some action must be taken to limit the number of animals running loose in the city, and interested citizens will be working with the City Council to work out some sort of solution. 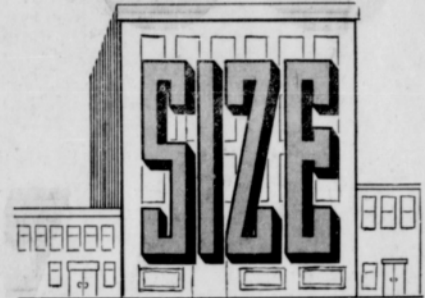

AUSTIN — Another federal court ruling -- voiding the new political filing fee law -- jarred state officials and posed the possibility of an emergency special legislative session soon.

While an earlier decision invalidating the old filing fee law was still on appeal to the U. S. Supreme Court, three judges in Dallas knocked out a back-up statute passed last year.

If rulings stand, Texas will be without any method of financing its May and June party primary elections. The filing deadline is February 7.

In the original 1970 decision on the lod law, fees were declared unconstitutional because they were used for revenue-collecting and were an absolute requirement to get on the ballot.

Legislators in 1971 passed a law effective January 1, 1972, setting maximum filing fees amounting to four per cent of a candidate's term salary. Another provision provided for getting on the ballot by pauper's affidavits of inability to pay, together with a petition signed by 10 per cent of area voters. This, too, was invalidated by a federal court last Thursday.

State is now enjoined from implementing any fee system for financing the primaries.

Gov. Preston Smith and Secretary of State Bob Bullock have expressed hope courts will stay the latest order until the Supreme Court rules on the first case.

Circuit Judge Homer Thornberry advised party county and state executive committees to make new rules for carrying out the latest ruling.

Since there is no authority for state financing of the primaries, a special legislative session apparently would be necessary to provide for that before May. One suggested alternative is voluntary contributions to pay the election bill -- an estimated \$1.5 million statewide.

OIL ALLOWABLE DELAYED — Texas Railroad Commission decided to delay setting the February oil allowable pending further study.

Major purchasers, the commission explained, report inventories are higher than needs, although crude stocks are at a four-year low mark.

Seven of 14 major crude oil purchasers requested a larger oil allowable actor for February. Two requested a small one, and five proposed to keep the January factor of 67.5 per cent of potential. The U. S. Bureau of Mines predicted demand in February would be 3,350,000 barrels a day, or 10,000 less than January.

MARIJUANA PENALTY DROP SUGGESTED — Two Texas task officers looking into problems of children and youth in preparation for a White House conference recommended the penalty for first offense possession of limited amounts of marijuana

should be reduced. The groups advised Gov. Preston Smith the penalty should be lowered from felony to misdemeanor status.

A total of 264 recommendations were made to Smith covering 16 areas of exploration by the steering committee.

Other proposals included: Mandatory sex education in public schools as early as possible.

Opposition to capital punishment.

Repeal of abortion laws. State funds for low cost housing.

Drug education starting with kindergarten or at first grade level.

AG OPINIONS — Texans can claim refunds on part of car sales taxes paid between August 15 and December 10, Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin held.

Those who get refunds of the federal excise taxes (repealed August 16) can also put in for refunds of the state tax (calculated on the total amount paid for a car) averaging about \$8.

In another recent opinion, Martin concluded:

The Board of Pardons and Paroles has authority to hire two deputy rules-reviewing deputy compact administrators at \$600 a year.

COURTS SPEAK — Court of Criminal Appeals upheld state marijuana laws against attack that they are unconstitutionally vague.

State Supreme Court found The University of Texas at Austin used "undue influence" on a 90-year old retired professor to get him to leave valuable property to the institution. The decision determined the old professor's home should go to an attorney who signed a \$35,000 purchase contract for it, and that his other property, on his death, should go to a nephew.

A February 16 hearing was set by the Supreme Court on a Houston barber's damage suit which involves a claim that freon cans should contain printed warnings they may blow up if attached to the wrong part of an auto air conditioner. The barber was injured when a can exploded as he was attempting to "recharge" his air conditioner.

SHORT SNORTS Harlandale (San Antonio), Houston and Fort Worth school districts will receive \$574,186 to finance extensive research and development projects in career education.

Beer drinkers consumed the equivalent of 2147 gallons for every man, woman and child in Texas last year, according to Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission figures.

R. G. (Randy) Pendleton, formerly of Andrews, resigned as director of the office of state-federal relations in Washington to run for state comptroller.

District two - Callahan, Coleman, Nolan, Coke, Taylor, Runnels, Tom Green, Concho, Sterling, Irion, Scurry, Mitchell. District three - Val Verde, Edwards, Kinney, Real. District four - Blanco, Travis, Kerr, Kendall, Comal, Hayes, Caldwell, Bandera, Bexar, Williamson, Llano, Gillespie, Mason, Guadalupe, Medina, Uvalde. District five - Schleicher, Menard, Sutton, Kimble, McCulloch. District six - Stephens, Young, Clay, Jack, Palo Pinto, Burnet, Parker, Hood, Somervell, Eastland, Erath, Comanche, Hamilton, Bosque, Brown, Mills, Coryell, McLennan, San Saba, Lampasas and Bell.

The referendum and election will be held by mail ballot which will be provided to all eligible voters not later than 15 days prior to the election. Ballots must be mailed to the polling place at Box 1486, San Angelo, Texas 76901 before midnight on the date of the election.

Any person within this area engaged in the business of producing or causing to be produced sheep or goats for commercial purposes is eligible to vote, including owners of ranches and their tenants and shareholders. If such person would be required to pay the assessment proposed.

Any person qualified to vote at the referendum may place his name in nomination for membership on the proposed commodity producers board as a representative of the district in which he resides or as a director at large by application to the above organization signed by himself and at least ten other persons eligible to vote in the referendum.
