The President's message was given to congress today.

Washington D. C., Dec. 3.—The opening work of the session in the house promises to be crowded with stirring events. At the very threshold of the session will come the contest over the admission of Representative Roberts of Utah, and later in the week the house will plunge into a lengthy and possibly a protracted debate upon the financial bill, which was pre-empted by the republican leaders last spring at Atlantic City. The Roberts case has attracted the attention of the whole country. The republican leaders have adopted a plan of procedure which is designed to prevent Mr. Roberts from taking the oath of office until after the charges in connection with his alleged polygamous practices have been investigated by a special committee.

BILL NUMBER 33.

An ordinance concerning the Judge of the Corporation Court, and the manner of collecting Fines and Costs in the Corporation Court.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Amarillo, Texas as follows:

Section 1. The Judge of the Corporation Court, shall keep a docket in which he shall enter every case commenced before him, and the proceedings therein. He shall enter in his said docket the name of the complainant, the nature and character of the offense, the date of trial, the names of all witnesses sworn and examined, the findings of the Court or Jury, the judgment of the Court therein, the amount of fine and costs, the date of payment if any, the day of issuing commitment if any, and all other facts necessary to show full proceedings of the case.

Section 2. The Judge of the Corporation Court, shall perform all duties imposed on him by law, and the ordinances of this City; he shall be a conservator of the peace, shall have power to administer oaths, and may fine and imprison for contempt offered him while hold-

ing court, in the same manner, and to the same extent, as is now provided by law in Justice Courts of this State. He shall be diligent, and use all lawful means to enforce obedience to, and compliance with all orders, rules, judgments and sentences by him made.

Section 3. If any defendant plead, or be found guilty, the Judge of the Corporation Court, shall declare and assess the punishment prescribed by ordinances according to his findings, or the verdict of the Jury, and to render judgment accordingly, and for costs of suit; and it shall be a part of said judgment, that the defendant stand committed until judgment is complied with, and it shall be deemed a part of the judgment and sentence of the Court that such defendant shall work upon the public streets, highways, alleys or other public works of the City, as required by law, until the judgment of the Court shall have been complied with.

Section 4. All such defendants, as provided for in the preceding sections, shall be committed to the custody of the City Marshal, and it shall be his duty to see that the judgment of the Court is fully carried out as provided herein, and it shall be his duty to render a statement under oath at each regular meeting of the City Council, of the disposition of each and every defendant committed to his custody, as to the manner in which said fines and costs have been paid; and all defendants who shall have been committed to his custody, and who is default of the payment of fine and costs, shall be required to work on the public streets, alleys, &c., as herein provided, shall be under the immediate control of the Marshal or his legal deputy, by the advice and direction of the Street and Alley committee.

Section 5. All defendants who by the provisions of the preceding sections shall be enforced to work on the Streets, alleys, or any public works, shall be allowed the sum of \$1.00 per day for each days labor performed as herein provided, and a strict account of such labor shall be kept by the Marshal, or his legally authorized deputy.

Section 6. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent with this ordinance, are hereby repealed.

Section 7. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and approval.

What Single Taxers Propose.

The single tax theorists, who worship at the shrine of Henry George, have gained some notable converts in Massachusetts, among the number Col. A. A. Pope, the bicycle manufacturer, and William Lloyd Garrison. At a banquet held in the Hotel Vendome, Boston, last evening, Chairman Fillebrown outlined the plans of the single tax league as follows:

"We propose to shift a heavy burden from the animate sensitive shoulders of labor to the broad inanimate shoulders of land, to shoulders so broad that the heavier the burden the more easily it is carried. We propose to assess all taxes upon the land, because they are spent upon the land whose value is maintained in no other way. Instead of distribution of wealth according to special privilege, and taxation according to ability, we propose distribution of wealth according to ability and taxation according to special privilege."—Holyoke [Mass.] "Telegram," April 6.
