

Elliott in County Jail Under Murder Charge; \$100,000 Bond Set

BAIRD — Daniel Maurice Elliott, 43 has been charged with murder with malice in connection with the beating death of Elicney (Bud) Jenkins, 71. Elliott remained in Callahan County Jail under \$100,000 bond.

Elliott was charged with murder after Sheriff's Deputies Bill Wright and Luke Taylor had answered a call to the area concerning a drunk pedestrian. The two law officials found in the possession of Elliott, a wallet belonging to Mr. Jenkins.

The two deputies went to Jenkins apartment and were unable to get a response from inside. The front door was locked, however entrance was gained through an open door in the rear of the apartment. They found Jenkins lying face down on the bedroom floor, fully clothed and beaten severely about the face.

Justice of the Peace Garvin Jones was called to the scene and pronounced Jenkins dead and ordered an autopsy. Other law officials called in on the case were Sheriff Grayson Miller, Special Investigator Frank Roach of the Abilene District Attorney's office, and Texas Ranger Sid Merchant.

Further investigation revealed that Mr. Jenkins and Raymond Cruzanger had made a trip to Abilene earlier in the day Wednesday. Returning to Baird on Interstate 20, they stopped near Old Abilene Town and picked up Elliott who said he was hitchhiking to Ft. Worth.

The trio proceeded to Baird where Jenkins and Elliott went to Jenkin's apartment and Cruzanger went to his home, located in the same area in the Housing Authority, in north Baird.

Elliott's last address was Big Spring State Hospital where he committed himself for alcoholism. He was born in Minnesota, and had been in prison in Wyoming, Tennessee and Minnesota.

Elliott had in his possession a pair of boots, letters, watch, clothes and a suitcase, all belonging to the dead man. The arrest was made at 8:30 p. m. Wednesday, Nov. 1. Final charges were made by Judge Jones investigations were completed by local and area officials.

Elliott was returned to the Jenkins' apartment and admitted to officers that he had been in the room, watched television, drank wine, but did not remember being in the bedroom where the body was found.

This project will complete the paving from this point to connect with Farm to Market Road 2287. The project calls for construction of grading, structures, and surfacing. The surfacing will be twenty feet in width.

The other project is scheduled to begin approximately nine miles south of Putnam at Farm to Market Road 880 and traverse east for a distance of 2.9 miles. This project will provide for grading, structures, and surfacing. The surfacing will be twenty feet in width.

The County will provide the right of way on both projects. The work authorized for this county is part of a \$20.4 million program for the development of 438 miles of secondary roads in the State.

The new program includes 335.7 miles of new construction. Of that total, 321.7 miles are new roads being added to the FM system. Other mileage was designated earlier and is being constructed in incremental stages.

Of the new roads being added to the system, 248.7 miles, or 77 percent, are school bus routes. And 201.1 miles, or 85 percent, are for rural mail delivery routes.

Originally intended to get the Texas farmer or rancher out of the mud and to provide for movement of agricultural products to market, the FM system now affords tourists and travelers access to hundreds of new lakes and recreational areas of the State.

In addition, the FM system supports the movement of goods and workers to the many new industries now operating in smaller cities and towns in Texas.

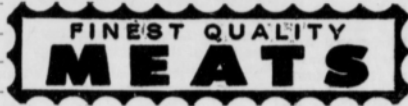
