Morris M. Edwards, Area Rancher, Dies Saturday in Abilene Hospital

ABILENE — Morris M. Edwards, of 1902 River Oaks Road, a prominent area rancher, died at 2:45 a. m. Saturday at Hendrick Memorial Hospital, following a three-day illness. Funeral services were held at 3 p. m. Sunday in the First United Methodist Church in Clyde.

Rev. Joe Temple, of the Bible Center in Abilene, and Rev. Chris Diebel of the First Christian Church of Abilene, officiated. Burial was in Clyde Cemetery under the direction of Bailey Funeral Home.

Mr. Edwards, son of the late Mr. and Mrs. J. P. Edwards, married Hattie Suggs on Dec. 2, 1916 in Clyde. She died in 1952. He married Johnny Bartlett Porter on March 19, 1957 in Abilene.

Mr. Edwards had ranching interests in Callahan, Kent and Dickens Counties, and was

a member of the Registered Hereford Breeders Assn. He bought his first land in 1925, an 80-acre tract in Callahan County.

In 1937 he bought a 5,200-acre ranch and operated several leases in the area. In 1943, he purchased a 12,419-acre ranch near Spur. His holdings in Kent County include a 41-section spread of land for keeping steers.

Mr. Edwards moved to Abilene in 1957 and was one of the organizers and builders of Abilene Livestock & Builders Auction Co. He had been in the farm implement business in Anson and Spur.

He was an active supporter of the West Texas Rehabilitation Center, and was a member of the First Christian Church in Abilene.

Survivors are his wife; a son, Weldon of Clyde; a daughter, Mrs. Harry (LaVerne) Howard of Abilene; a brother, Robert of San Angelo; two sisters, Mrs. Lottie King and Mrs. Annie Tyler, both of Abilene; three grandchildren and one great-granddaughter.

At 6:02 in the 2nd period, the Bears went over for 6 points after 80 yards, 12 plays and a penalty. Quarterback Jay Mike Reeves went over from one yard. Reeves powerful boot was no good, however the Bears were up in the lights with 6. Wayne Fielder caught two passes in the drive for 26 and 16 yards.

Baird put up 7 more when Reeves hurled a 39-yarder down field and Fielder made a diving catch in the end zone. The drive went 76 yards and Reeves boot was good for a 13-0 half-time score.

The Bears got right to it in the 3rd quarter when 125-lb. Danny Vestal intercepted an Albany pass and traveled 57 yards to set up the next tally. Reeves went over the right side for the third touchdown with 2:40 in the 3rd quarter. Reeves sailed the pigskin over the goalpost and the Bears pranced up field leading 20-0.

A moment of hope for the Albany Lions came with 2:26 left in the 3rd when Richard Wilson returned a kick-off 76 yards for the Lions only touchdown of the game. Mike Johnson added the boot and the score was 20-7.

With 1:17 left in the 3rd period, the Bears took the kick-off and covered 65 yards in 3 plays. Reeves hit Billy Charles Hatchett for 26 yards, Bill Windham made 3, and Reeves found Mitchell Atkinson open downfield for a 21 yard catch for the final six of the game. Reeves added his one and the final score for the Bears was 27.

The Lions added two more points as Mike Parsons blocked a Reeves punt and James Halbert covered the ball after it had rolled into the endzone, making a two-point safety for Albany.

It was a great night for the Bears, one we will always remember. From the humble prayer by a Baird Junior girl to the finishing touches of a powerful and deserving bunch of boys, it was indeed, a good time for all.
