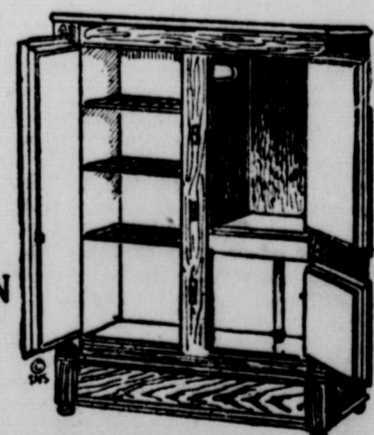

WHAT'S DOING IN WEST TEXAS

That De Leon shipped a car load of Shorthorn junior and senior calves to Lake Charles, La., is an indication of what that territory is concentrating on. J. Ross Miller, Jr., and C. M. Carraway shipped the car consisting of 29 bull calves to Henry Gray, a breeder of Shorthorns in that state. The animals were all fine registered stock and represented a considerable value.

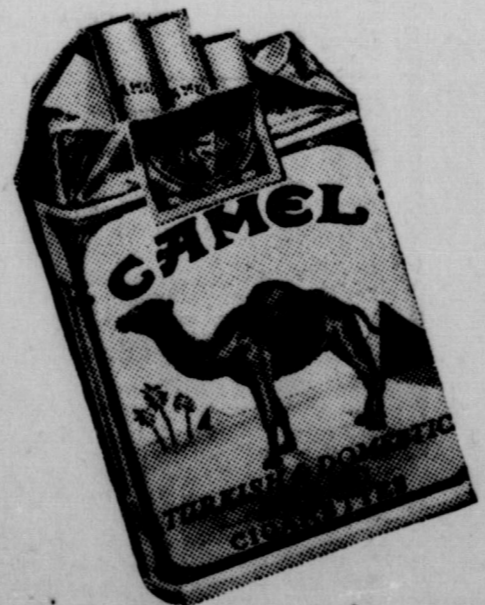

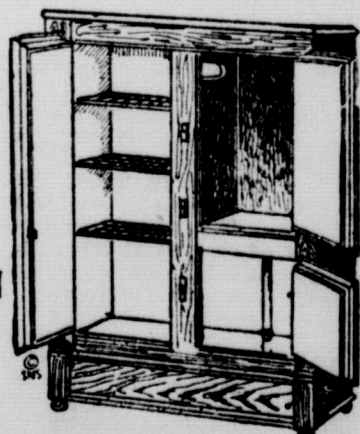

The town lacked the staying power of the gushers, however, and its population disappeared almost as rapidly as it had appeared.

"A \$20,000 brick theater was almost completed when the receding tide of population swept out from under the town. Today it is deserted,

the oil men, bootleggers and other camp followers who inhabit boom towns are gone and the ripple of the Pecos river, flowing by the town, is the only sound to be heard.

"George Thompson, who owns the land, obtained a court decree last week recovering the property and all buildings on it not covered by mortgages. He is the only sheepman who can herd his flock in a \$20,000 theater."

**Farm Loan Association Secretaries to Meet**

Information has been received by J. C. Thompson, secretary-treasurer of the local Farm Loan Association, that the Federal Land Bank of Houston has called a conference of all secretary-treasurers and their local boards in this immediate section of the state. The meeting for this section has been called for May 28th at Vernon. This is one of the 14 sectional meetings that are being held throughout the state during the months of May and June.

These annual conferences of the officials of the Federal Land Bank and the National Farm Loan Associations are in the form of get-together meetings to review the record of service of the associations and bank and to work out plans by which the organization can be of still greater service to the rural sections of the state. One of the outstanding accomplishments of the Federal Land Bank system, from the standpoint of public service, has been their terracing program.

The Federal Land Bank of Houston is the first financial organization in the United States to put its efforts and money into such a campaign. It is also the first financial organization to actively and continuously cooperate with A. & M. College through the county agents in a state-wide program of soil and moisture conservation. The cooperation of these agencies the past two years, has created more sentiment for terracing and there has been more terracing done in the state than in all previous time. Fred Rennels, county agent, stated that more than 15,000 acres have been terraced in Foard County in the last 2 years.

The conservation program is already being reflected in increased yields on the farms throughout this section and will be felt further in increased business throughout the state.
