### Race war in mining town.

What has proven to be a race war of intense bitterness has broken out in Cananea, a mining town in Mexico, thirty miles from line of Arizona. The population of the town is 23,000 of whom about one third are Americans. The trouble had its apparent beginning by a refusal of higher wages to the Mexican laborers, by the American owners of the mines and town. The Governor of the State of Sonora in which Cananea is situated called upon troops from Arizona to help quell the disturbance, and it is said he will be deposed and punished for calling for foreign troops, and it is charged that the trouble is revolutionary and was fomented by the machinations of a group of Americans in St. Louis Mo. About fifty Americans and twice the number of Mexicans have met death in the riot so far.

The Texas Railway Commission  
 has ordered passengers fare on  
 the Houston and Texas Central  
 reduced from 3 cts. to 2 1/2 cts.  
 for adults and from 2 cts. to 1 1/2  
 cts. for children. This will  
 force competing roads to come to  
 the same rates in order to get their  
 share of the traffic. The Hous-  
 ton and Texas Central will likely  
 enjoy the commission from mak-  
 ing the reduction, in which it  
 will be supported by all other  
 Texas roads.

That the officials of that road have in view the immediate extension of the road from Vernon west is beyond doubt and the practicability of the scheme coupled with the great prosperity of Foard county and the country through which the route would lay, will no doubt act as an incentive to early action.

**Not Necessary That Democratic County Executive Committee Meet So and Monday in June.**

Austin, Texas, June 5.—Hon. Frank Andrews, chairman of the State Democratic Executive Committee, today telephoned Assistant Attorney General Pollard, saying that he had received a number of letters asking him about the dates for meetings of the County Executive Committees. These inquiries, he said, grew out of the fact that there is a conflict in the election law. He requested Judge Pollard to subject a opinion upon the subject.

Sec. 3 of the election law provides that a meeting of the county Executive Committee shall be held on the third Monday in June for the purpose of deciding by lot the order in which the names of the candidates shall appear on the primary ballot, to provide for the expenses of the primary election, etc. Sec. 113, in prescribing who shall constitute the county convention, declares that it shall be composed of delegates elected in the manner prescribed by the county executive committee at its meeting on the second Monday in June.

Judge Pollard says the use of the term "second" in this said last connection was unquestionably a clerical error, and that it surely was the intention to write "third" Monday.

He says it is not necessary for Democratic county executive committees to hold any meetings for any purpose on the second Monday in June, and he requests The News to publish this statement.

**St. Louis is interested.**

At a dinner given yesterday to President Stilwell, of the Kansas City, Mexico & Orient, by the Orient Pillar Society, of St. Louis, at the Nooney Club, Mr. Stilwell said that the Gould lines will form the St. Louis connections for the road. George J. Gould is one of the directors in Mr. Stilwell's company and according to Mr. Stilwell's statements, the Iron Mountain and the Texas & Pacific will co-operate with the Orient line for a St. Louis-Mexican Pacific service.

About forty St. Louis capitalists are interested in Mr. Stilwell's project, and they have invested about \$1,000,000.

The Mexican government has granted the company a subsidy of \$5,500,000.

Mr. Stilwell said yesterday that his road was the shortest from St. Louis and Kansas City to the Pacific coast. The road will be 1,650 miles long from Kansas City to the port of Topolobampo. This port is 200 miles east Salt Lake City and 1,900 miles east of San Francisco. The Hamburg-American Steamship Company has agreed, he said, to make Topolobampo its only port on the American Pacific Coast, and to operate a steamship line via the Panama Canal, to Topolobampo.

Mr. Stilwell said that 670 miles of the road are completed and in operation. By January, 1,000 miles will be in operation.
