Teeth Should Be Examined at Regular Intervals by Dentist

Austin.—"In spite of the great advances that have been made in dental instruments, local anaesthesia and operative methods, there yet are many persons who entertain an unjustified fear of the dental chair. Unfortunately, this attitude influences thousands to postpone the visit to the dentist until there is actual pain or until an accident to tooth structure occurs. Such a fear complex not only is foolish but often produces real suffering, the possible loss of one or more teeth, an unnecessary expenditure of money and even serious illness," states Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

"It is true that some discomfort is connected with dental corrections, though it is more likely to be fear of pain rather than the pain itself. However, in view of the actual damage that can result because of delay, temporary inconvenience deserves to be considered whatsoever in a wise and economical dental program.

"Common sense suggests that early discovered conditions are more readily and painlessly corrected than those that are permitted to become aggravated and for which a cure is sought as a last resort. The time to ferret out dental trouble, therefore, is before one is even aware that trouble exists.

"For that reason, it is excellent practice to adopt a regular six-month schedule as the minimum number of visits that should be made to the family dentist. Naturally, if in the meantime the necessity of dental attention arises, it is wise to make an immediate appointment. Postponing a consultation on the fear theory increases the probability of real discomfort, not to mention serious complications.

"In short, what one should fear is not the slight discomfort of the dentist's office when the visits are placed on a routine basis, but the fear of pain, illness and unnecessary loss of money and time because of a fear-postponing attitude."

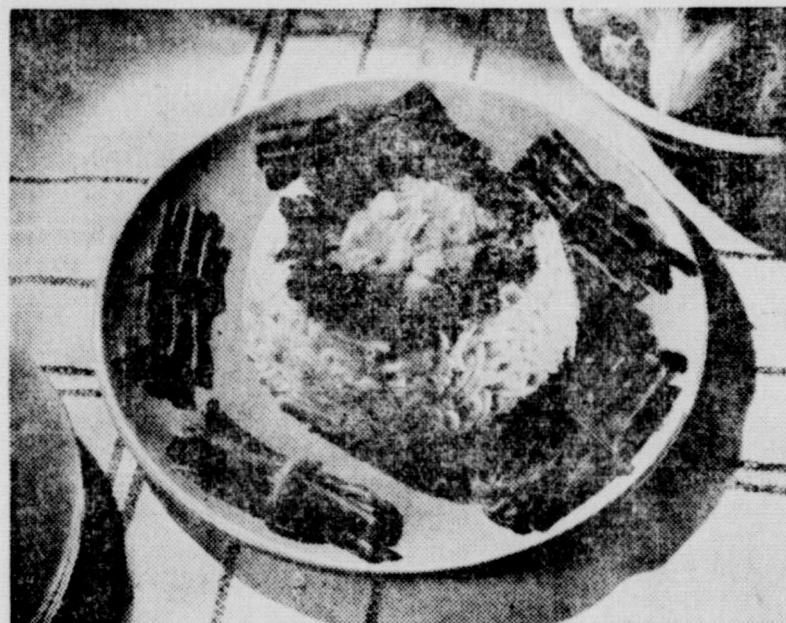
Gingerbread Goes to the Party!

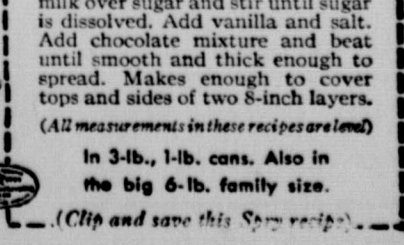
- 1/2 cup Spry 2 cups sifted flour (cake flour preferred)

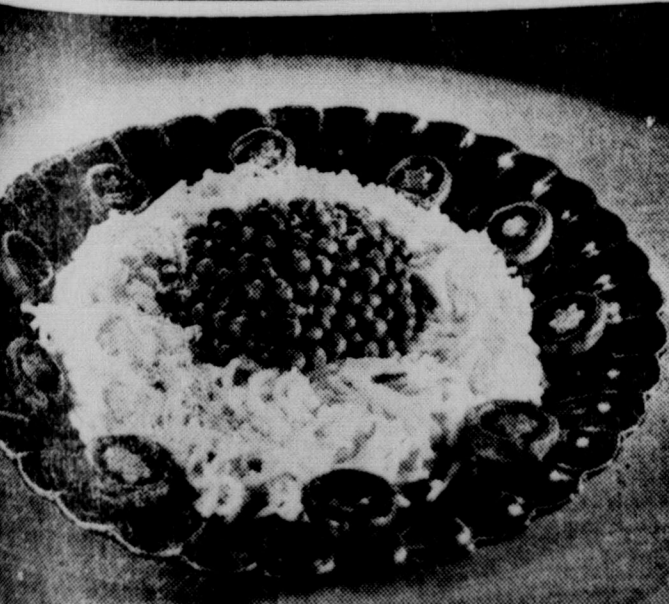

Pellagra Is Caused by Lack of Proper Foods, Dr. Cox Says

Austin. — "Pellagra, while not communicable disease is of concern to the State Department of Health since many people die of it each year in Texas. Pellagra is a disease that is caused by the lack of proper foods. It comes on slowly and may not be recognized until the victim begins to have a sore mouth, stomach trouble, and reddening and scaling of the skin. When these symptoms appear, the disease has been present for some time," stated Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

The longer a person has pellagra the harder it is to cure, so one should be on the lookout for the early symptoms, such as nervousness, indigestion, and burning of the feet and hands. The disease may become so severe as to affect the mind. Pellagra is not contagious. As long as a person eats enough of the right kind of food and is not otherwise diseased, he is in no danger even if he lives with a pellagra patient.

The prevention of pellagra depends upon eating the right kind of food at all times. To make sure that the diet is right, it should always include plenty of milk daily, some fresh meat, and as many fresh vegetables as possible. Tomatoes, wheat products, salmou, brewer's yeast, and fresh fruits are especially valuable. Having provided these essentials of a proper diet, the rest may be arranged according to family and personal likes. In this way pellagra may be avoided.

The Real Love of Sir Thomas Lipton's Life



When Sir Thomas Lipton died at his home in Osidge, London, on October 2, 1931, newspapers throughout the world carried the famous picture of Sir Thomas in his yachting cap and gave their readers the story of his life.

Up to the time of Lipton's entry into the tea business, most of the tea in the world came from China. The island of Ceylon was known as a great coffee-growing country. There was not a tea plant on the island. But in 1870, Ceylon was visited by a blight that snuffed out the life of every single coffee plant, and promised to spell economic disaster for Ceylon.

Even the New York State Department of Labor, working out a minimum budget for women who work, allowed 20 pairs of stockings a year—a new pair every two and a half weeks.

Making even a 4-thread stocking last that long is a problem for some girls. Frequent runs are the most common complaint.

Secret of longer wear Two girls may start with the very same stockings, yet one will often get twice as long wear.

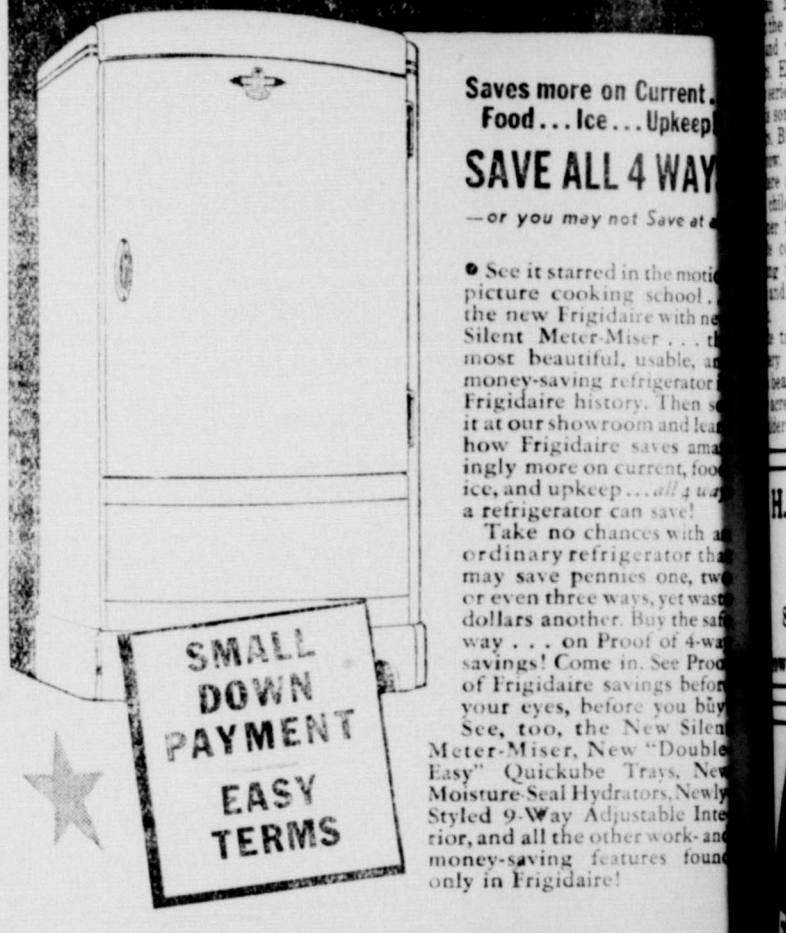
Two Minute Sermon (By Thomas Hastwell)

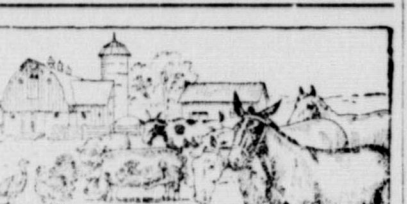

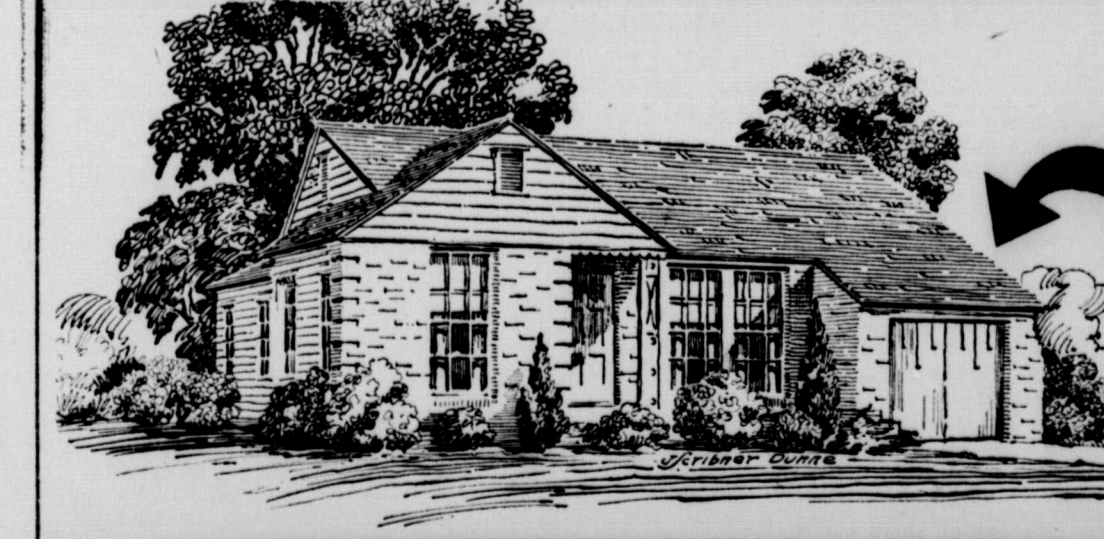

Austin.—The raising of tax money to pay increased pension benefits to aged persons, and to provide the State's share of other phases of the social security program, including aid for dependent children, needy blind persons and teachers' pensions, will constitute the No. 1 problem of the new legislature. It doubtless will consume most of the time of the four months' regular session.

Next will come governmental economy, and then will follow the introduction of hundreds of bills, some embodying the ideas of large groups, others those of a single individual member of House or Senate. A few of these, usually those backed by a substantial bloc of public opinion, will be enacted, while the great majority will be good for a line or two in the newspapers for a day, and then die by the wayside, either in committee or on the calendar.

Truck Problem Looms

The tax program, of course, will depend largely upon the recommendations and plans of the new Governor, as embodied in his first message. O'Daniel has been giving concentrated study at his Fort

Worth headquarters to this and other administrative matters, but has been keeping his own counsel upon details of what he will recommend. Whatever plan he suggests, will naturally encounter study opposition from the group or groups which he proposes to tax.

A determined effort will be made in the new Legislature to enact legislation regulating the use of motor trucks upon the highways and increasing the present limit of 7,000 pounds of net load that a truck may carry. Persistent efforts have been made to raise this load limit, which was enacted back when trucks used solid rubber tires, on the theory that heavy loads would damage the highways. Modernization of motor truck manufacture, together with universal use of scientifically designed pneumatic tires, have largely removed this objection, and the railroad lobby, which has battled bitterly and successfully to curtail truck operations, has relaxed largely during recent years upon the argument that large loads mean larger trucks and that a resulting traffic hazard follows. The truck people, who have carried on a vigorous campaign, have answered this argument rather patly by showing that the larger truck load, the fewer the number of trucks necessary to move traffic, and that the fewer trucks that are operated on the highways, the lower the traffic hazard. It is ideally the same argument the railroads have used in opposing laws to limit the length of freight trains.

Valley Senator Is Sponsor

Another important phase of the truck problem is the fact that the privately owned motor trucks are largely unregulated, because the Supreme Court has held that under the present law, most of them are technically common carriers under the law. The impossibility of applying the common carrier law's provision to the thousands of private trucks was so manifest that the Railroad Commission, by unwritten agreement with the truck owners, is simply ignoring the Supreme Court decision until the Legislature can enact a law to regulate private trucks.

Rogers Kelley, Senator-elect from the Valley district, has declared he will push for enactment of truck legislation—because his Valley district moves millions of tons of fruit and vegetables to markets by truck each season—and Kelley, known in his district as an aggressive and able leader—probably will get results.

Economy Program

A Senate subcommittee of five members has been working for nearly two years on the problem of reducing the overhead of State departments, and out of their efforts will doubtless come some improvement. Their goal is a \$5,000,000 to \$6,000,000 cut in departmental expenditures. They hope to consolidate and abolish some bureaus and commissions, which is a difficult task, at best, because very little department has its bloc of supporters in the Legislature, whose loyalty is held by giving jobs to friends and relatives of the legislators. One improvement upon which everybody seems agreed, however, is the appointment of the State Auditor by a Legislative Committee, instead of by the Governor, as at present, and the probable creation of a modernized budgeting set-up. Many legislators have come to see the fallacy of asking the Board of Control, the largest single spending unit in the Government, to make the budget, as it now does.

Along with the plan for better auditing and budgeting will go plans for abolishing some of the 102 special funds in the State Treasury, so that officials can more nearly get an actual picture of the State's real financial condition from periodic statements by the Treasurer and Comptroller.

Fair Trade Act

The last gubernatorial race brought out what was apparently a widespread agreement that some

carried the ball to the Iowa Park 35 by the end of the quarter. In the opening minutes of the second frame, a penalty and a loss had set the Wildcats back on the Hawk's 45 when the Crowell boys uncorked a spectacular pass play which netted them their first career. Big Bernice Fitzgerald faded back from his end position and shot a long pass which Wayne Canup took over his shoulder on a dead run on his 10-yard stripe. His momentum carried him over the pay line. B. Fitzgerald shot another pass to Canup for the extra point. The touchdown came at the end of a 68-yard drive.

Meason Tallies Twice

The Hawks took the kickoff on their own 32-yard line and punted to go for a first down. Crowell took the punt on their own 14-yard marker and made a 59-yard drive for the second touchdown. With the exception of a short pass by Joy to Canup, and a 4-yard gain by Owens, Joy and Meason carried the ball all of the way, with Meason going over on the third down from the 9-yard line. Joy's pass for the extra point was incomplete.

The remainder of the second period consisted of an exchange of punts with the quarter ending with Iowa Park in possession of the ball on their own 43.

Coach Grady Graves sprinkled his line up with second string players and that combination clicked to hold the Hawks on about even terms, although the Iowa Park boys pushed the ball inside of Crowell's 30-yard stripe for the first time. Late in the period a Crowell punt was blocked and the Hawks took the ball on the Wildcats' 45. A long pass carried the ball to the Crowell 28, but a 15-yard penalty stopped the touchdown drive. Most of the play took place in the middle of the field.

Wards Off Score

With the opening of the final period, the Hawks advanced back to the Crowell 26 with a pass, but were forced to punt and the ball rolled over the goal line. Crowell took the ball on its own 20-yard line, but was able to make only 2 yards in 3 downs. On the last down, Joy's punt was blocked and the Hawks again took the ball deep in Crowell territory. With a first down on the Wildcats' 23-yard line the Hawks found the real meaning of "seven men of granite." In the first play the whole Wildcat line charged through to drop a Hawk for a 13 yard loss. On the second play a bad pass from center sent the ball back and members of the Crowell line nabbed the Hawk back for another loss of 14 yards. On the third play, the line again chased a Hawk back for a twelve-yard loss and the fourth down found the Hawks on their own 39-yard line with 49 yards to go for a first down. Crowell took the punt on its own 24-yard stripe and from that point marched down the field for 74 yards for the final score.

A pass, Joy to Canup, netted 22 yards. Joy made 14 yards in two tries and Meason added 4 more. After an incomplete pass, Joy passed to Meason for 13 yards to place the ball on the Hawks' 30. On two plays, Joy placed the ball on the 15 with first down. Meason picked up two yards and Joy added 4 more. On the third down, Meason spun back through the center of the line to cross the goal line standing up. Joy's place kick was low. Crowell 19, Iowa Park 0.

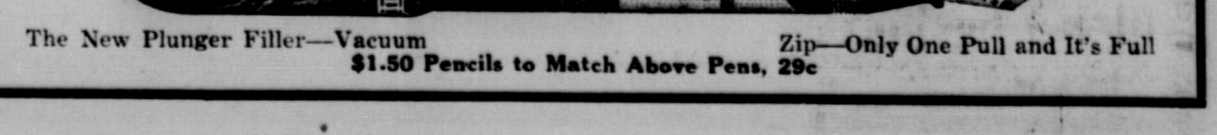

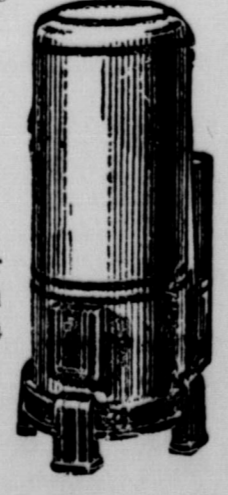

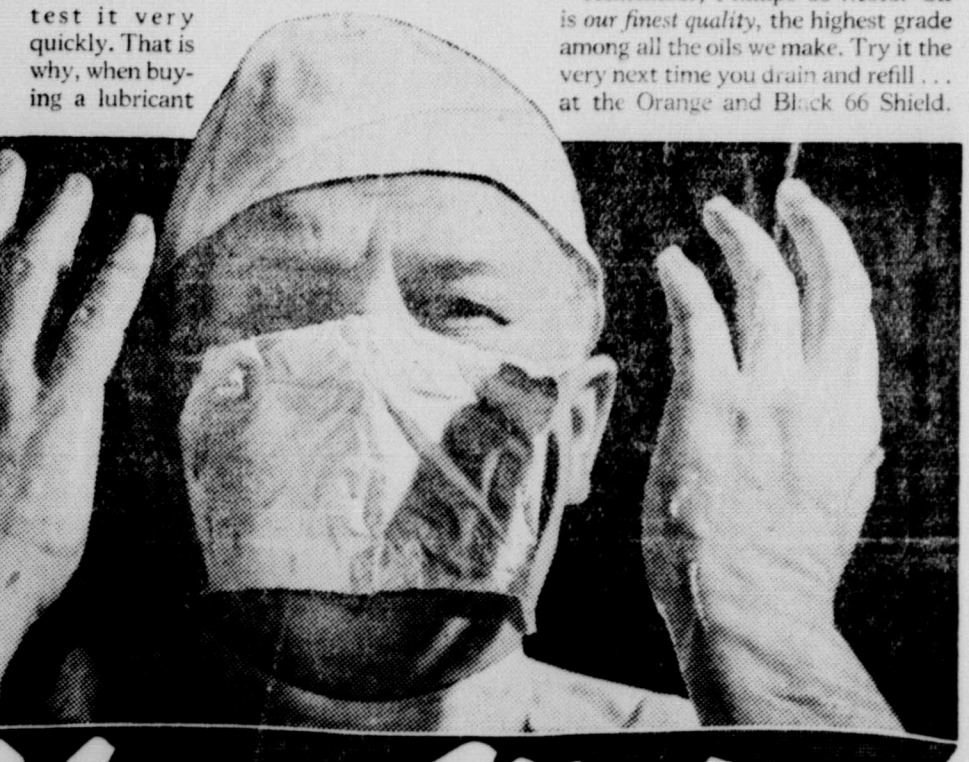

WHAT WE THINK

(By Frank Dixon)

Long ago I had occasion to look at a particular piece of work done by a skilled workman. The work for what workmen call "top work," scrupulous attention to detail, exact and painstaking adjustment. I called for the work the man with whom I had left it, and he turned it over in his hands. Though he was searching for a defect, some minor detail might have been overlooked. His obvious concern was to have his work in perfect condition.

The work we do, the tasks we perform, are the true expression of our lives, whether they are thoroughly done, with fidelity to every detail, or whether they are carelessly and indifferently done.

In each case it is the silent expression of the workman's life. How important such a thought makes every little task that falls into our hands to do.

We may, by being on our guard, cover up the hidden defects of our work for ourselves, the indifference, the lack of order and system in our thinking, but when we do a piece of work, whether it is sweeping a room, making a bed, mowing the yard, or building a house, we record, where everyone who passes that way can read and see, the type of workman we are.

In this homely truth there is a sermon for every one. The importance of doing small tasks well, of developing the habit of thoroughness and order and system. If the real fact or reason for failure of many men in business, or employees of others, could be discovered, in most cases it would be found to be this very thing—the lack of thoroughness.

Whether it is a letter that is typed, a set of books that is kept, a room that is put in order, a house that is painted, or a great structure that is built, each resolves itself into a matter of little details, the slightest of a single one of which will mar the perfection of the whole.

This is the difference between a careless, and indifferent, and shiftless workman and the master workman, whose hands turn out perfect work always—the fidelity to little details.

Our Weekly Sermon

Text—They that be whole need not a physician, but they that are sick.—Matthew 9:12

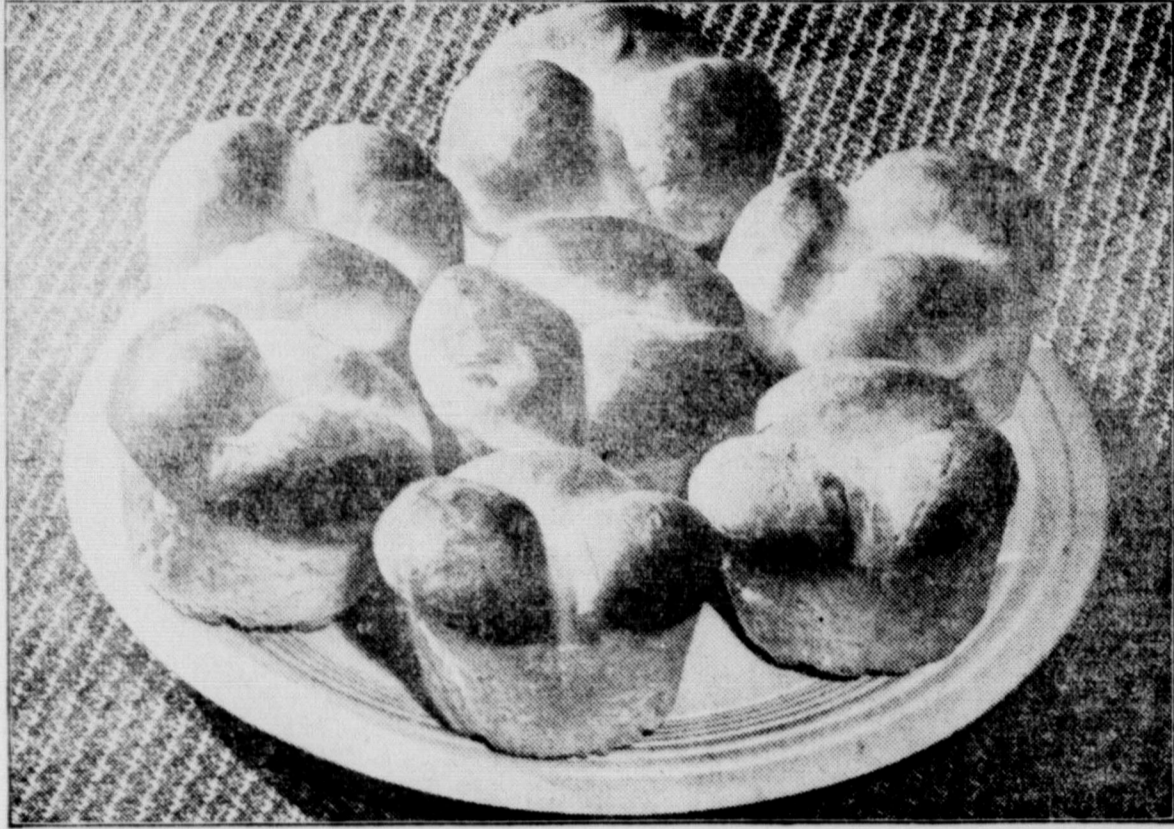

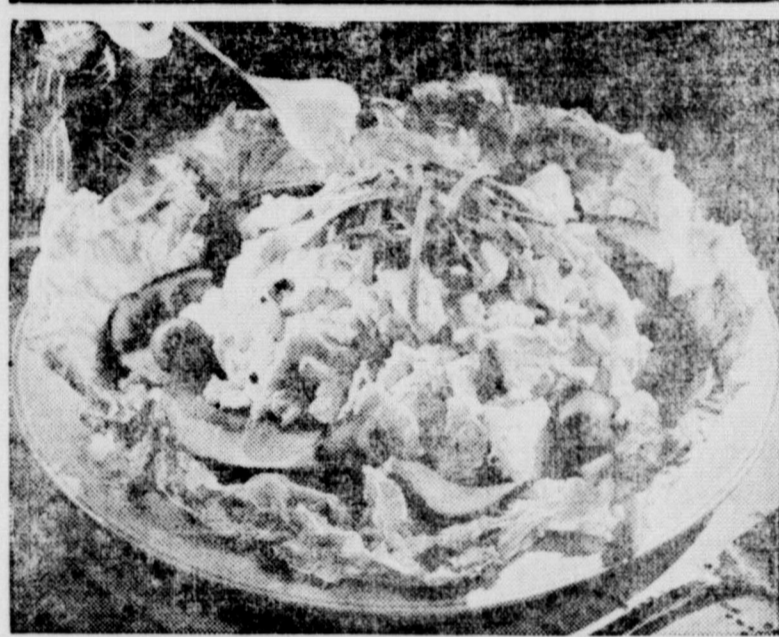

Largest Farm Show To Feature Fairs' Golden Jubilee

Dallas.—Fifty years of successful State Fairs in Texas will be climaxed October 8 to 23 in the Golden Jubilee celebration with the largest array of agricultural and livestock exhibits ever before shown in the Southwest.

Otto Herold, president of the World's largest State Fair, said this week that practically every inch of available space had been taken in the agricultural building, with but little remaining in the livestock and poultry buildings.

Sixty-seven Texas counties, covering the expanse of the State from North to South and from East to West, will be represented in the county unit exhibits. In addition to these there will be a regional exhibit from East Texas, generous exhibits by individual farmers, and showings by the boy and girl club organizations, and the various farm activities of the Federal government.

Competition in farm exhibits has been eliminated this year. Every county exhibit which passes the standard of a "sifting" committee will receive a flat award of \$125 cash. This change was made so that all the counties could be assisted financially in assembling and transporting their exhibits.

In livestock, some of the country's outstanding herds will be on exhibit. Every breed of cow, or hog, or sheep or goat in the Southwest will be represented. Cleanliness and carefulness will be made the watchword of this show. Attendants will wear white uniforms. They will be housed in an upstairs dormitory with running water. Stalls will be kept scrupulously clean.

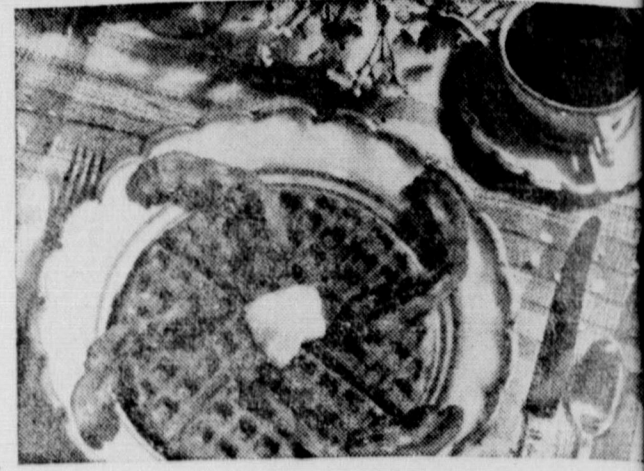

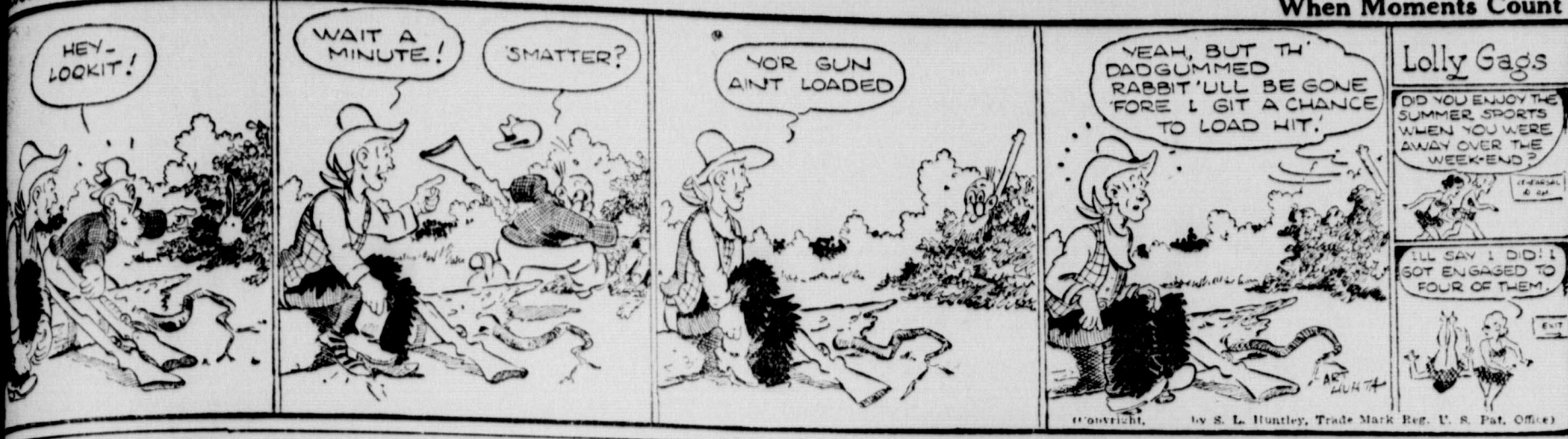

Continental Oil Company's Pension Plan for Employees

Ponca City, Okla.—The Continental Oil Company has announced the establishment of a retirement and pension fund for all of its employees who reach the age of 45 in the case of men and 60 in the case of women.
The plan, according to Dan Moran, president of the Company, will be co-operative in character, employees making regular monthly contributions which will be supplemented by a contribution on the Company's part. It will provide a minimum benefit of \$30 a month, and in the average case the total retirement income including the Federal pension will amount to a figure somewhere between one-third and one-half of the employee's salary. For the older employees the Company is providing a benefit in recognition of service already rendered.
"The new retirement and pension plan," said Mr. Moran, "was adopted by the directors of the Company after authorization by the stockholders at the last annual meeting, and it is their opinion that it will benefit both the company and the employees."
The plan affects approximately 5,000 employees. It will be administered by the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company.
