Adult Workshops Slated to Begin June 10 at Baird Agriculture Bldg.

BAIRD — A series of adult homemaking workshops has been set during the 2nd and 3rd weeks of June, according to Judy Odom, Baird High School Homemaking teacher. The workshops will be two hours in length, beginning at 6:30 p. m. and will cover a variety of subject areas. All sessions will be held at the high school ag building.

June 10 - Monday - The first workshop will feature Mrs. Eddie Lee of Clyde, who will introduce and demonstrate liquid embroidery. All those interested are urged to attend; those wishing to purchase the equipment for this hobby can also be aided by Mrs. Lee.

Tuesday - June 11 - A series of filmstrips and sound tapes on child guidance and development for adults has been made available from the Region 14 Service Center. The series covers motor, social, emotional and mental development up to two and half years with an optional section on pregnancy, birth, and the newborn.

June 17 - Monday - The 3rd workshop will be presented by Mrs. Odom on the subject of managing the food dollar. This session will be part lecture, part shaping-discussion, and part group work. This is definitely recommended for the novice as well as the expert shopper. Those attending need to take pencil and paper.

June 18 - Tuesday - Marriage and the family is the fourth in the series of workshops, this one also being presented by Mrs. Odom. Four main areas will be stressed: 1st the problems of marriage; 2nd, coping with conflict; 3rd communications and 4th guidelines for a happy marriage. This too will be part lecture, part discussion, and part group work. Students are asked to bring pen and paper.

June 20 - Thursday - The last workshop will be operated in conjunction with American Handicrafts Co. of Abilene, and is the only workshop which pre-registration and cost will be required. The representative from American Handicrafts is going to teach a new method of decoupage that needs only one coat of gloss. There is no overall fee for the course, but each student will need to purchase his own equipment which will run, on the average, \$8.00. Pre-registration is necessary in order that students ahead of time can select the board and the picture that they wish; all other supplies can be arranged without problems. This pre-registration can be done in three ways: pictures and board samples will be available for those at the regular monthly meeting of the Young Homemakers on June 13, at the Community Building; call 854-1334 (the high school in Baird) and ask for Mrs. Odom - she has a catalogue from which supplies can be chosen; the 3rd method of pre-registration would be to go by American Handicrafts, 2920 N. 1st in Abilene. Those wishing to do this can select the picture and board and NEED TO TELL the salesclerk that this is for the adult homemaking class in Baird on June 20. Pre-registration is needed to save time on the night of the workshop and also to assure that each person can have the type of project he really wants.

These adult homemaking workshops are in conjunction with the Texas State Agency and State Vocational Home-making Education. Any questions should be directed to Judy Odom, 854-1334, between the hours of 8:30 a. m. and 2:30 p. m.

Vote Recount Set For Friday, June 7

BAIRD — A total of 1432 county residents went to the polls Saturday and voted in two major run-off elections.

The race for County School Superintendent showed a slight margin between incumbent L. C. Cash and E. L. "Chief" Reese. Cash received 704 votes to Mr. Reese's 692, only a 12 vote difference. Reese has requested a re-count of all county voting boxes, which will take place at the Courthouse in Baird Friday, June 7 at 9 a. m.

In the race for County Commissioner Precinct 3, Duke Mitchell was defeated by E. F. (Franz) Odum by an 88 vote margin. Mitchell received 403 votes and Odum had 392.

City of Baird Announces Increases in Water, Sewer & Sanitation Rates

BAIRD — It is always with regret that we must inform our valued customers that we are having to pass along a price increase to them due to increases from our vendors. It is even more regrettable to have to pass along news of a new pricing policy which is being forced upon us by not only one chief source of products, but by many other vendors including the manufacturers of copper, brass, iron and steel, as well as all petroleum products.

It is because of this action by our suppliers that we, too, must also pass along these increased prices to our customers.

The Texas Aid Control Board and the Texas State Department of Health are requesting the City of Baird to comply with their regulations and discontinue outdoor burning and initiate a satisfactory disposal system, which is to provide a city dump under regulations governing metropolitan areas such as larger cities. This entails, in brief, landfills of three pits, one for garbage, one for dead animals and one for limbs, brush,

Raul Hinojosa, Specialist in Beef Cattle, To Speak to Young Farmers

BAIRD — The Young Farmer Chapter will be honored to have Raul Hinojosa, a Texas A&M graduate, at their next meeting, June 13 in the Community Building, at 7:30 p. m.

Hinojosa will speak on Anaplasmosis, a cattle disease once thought as primarily a Southern problem and how it has spread to nearly all states in the U. S. The USDA estimates that between 50,000 and 100,000 animals die from anaplasmosis each year. Total cost of the disease is now about \$100 million a year from deaths, abortions, reduction in milk and beef production. Hinojosa received his BS degree from A&M in 1961, majoring in Animal & Range Science. He worked four years as Range Conservationist for the Soil Conservation Service. His duties first started in Rio Grande City and later took him to Archer City, Laredo and San Antonio. In 1965 he quit the SCS and began working for A&M as Beef Cattle Specialist and advisor for International Programs Office. This position took him to the Dominican Republic for four years. Following his return, he received his Master of Physiology of Reproduction and taught at the University of Salfido,

etc. Regulations state that each day the pits must be covered with six inches of soil, final closing of each pit when full of trash shall be covered with two feet of soil.

In order for the City of Baird to meet these regulations, it will be necessary that a man be on duty at the dump ground at least eight hours each day to see that the trash is dumped in the proper pits and not just the first place that is handy, so this trash can be covered at the end of that day. In order for the dump ground attendant to have control of the dumping of trash as it should be, it will be necessary for him to live there at the area. To accomplish this, the Council has purchased a mobile home, a water well has been dug, septic tank is installed, and electric lines will be extended about one-half mile to get electric power to the home.

It will be necessary for the City to have some means of digging the pits, compacting the rubbish, and covering same. This will require a large, heavy tractor-type loader and a man to operate it - all of this requires large expenditures of money.

With all of the added money required in these various departments, it is necessary for the City to raise present rates being charged for water, sewer and trash.

The following new rates will be reflected on the bill you receive July 1, 1974:

Water: 4,000 gallons - \$2.60 (Minimum). The excess used over the first 4,000 gallons will be 55c per 1,000 gallons.

Sewer: Resident \$2.50 - (Minimum).

Sanitation: Resident \$2.00 (Minimum).

Small Commercial: \$3.50.

Large Commercial: \$6.00.

There will be a \$10.00 re-instating charge to any customer who was cut off for non-payment. It will be necessary for the entire delinquent charge, plus the \$10.00 re-instating fee, be paid before service is restored.

The Mayor and City Council regret very much these steps become necessary, but under the circumstances there was no alternative.
