

## Clyde Methodist Church to Host Annual Missionary Conference

CLYDE — First United Methodist Church of Clyde will host their first Annual Missionary Conference Aug. 23, 24 & 25. At this time Ms. Doris Trefren, the Harold Spanns, William Mayos and Donald Nortons will share the Good News reflected in their experiences in China, Taiwan, Africa, South America and Arizona.

Ms. Trefren went to China in 1931 in answer to the call of the China Inland Mission for two hundred new missionaries to reach the interior of the China mainland for Christ. She served until the end of 1951. When the Communists released her at the end of 1951, Ms. Trefren returned to America to recuperate before going to Taiwan in 1953. There she trained teachers at the Central Taiwan Bible College to teach the Bible to laymen. In her forthcoming book, *From Hea-Hunters to Hallelujahs*, she tells of the work among former headhunter tribes, as they were subdued by faith in Jesus Christ and became earnest preachers of the gospel.

Mr. Harold Spann is assistant to the president for Institutional Advancement of Asbury College in Wilmore, Ky. Prior to this, he served pastorates in the Texas Conference. His last pastorate was in San Augustine, where he served for eight years. He has frequently been on various foreign mission fields in Mexico, Central and South America, and has served as annual conference preacher for a

number of annual conferences in Central and South America.

Mr. and Mrs. Mayo serve with World Gospel Mission, an interdenominational missionary organization with approximately 240 missionaries and associate missionaries minister in 15 areas of the world. During their first term in Burundi, beginning in January 1964, Mr. Mayo did evangelistic work among various churches and youth. Mrs. Mayo directed the women's work at Kayere. When the Mayos returned to Burundi in mid-1968 they found that evangelism had many facets other than preaching, including building a bridge in one area. While on furlough, the Mayos share their experiences from a nation wracked by turmoil and bloodshed.

Mr. and Mrs. Donald Norton, also serving with World Gospel Mission, are missionary appointees to Southwest Indian School, located near Phoenix, Ariz. The Southwest Indian School has served 34 Indian tribes since its inception in 1952. At present the student body consists of 156 students. The Nortons teach, give individual counsel, teach Bible classes and hold special revivals. They will leave for the Indian school as soon as support shares are raised.

Rev. Jessie Dea invites members and guests to a covered dish dinner on Friday, from 5:30 to 6:30 in fellowship hall. Saturday breakfast from 7 to 8 a. m. will give the men an opportunity to meet with the missionaries. The ladies will share a noon covered dish luncheon hour. Services will begin each evening at 7 p. m., and a display room will be open Friday and Saturday, immediately following the worship period.

MERKEL — Henry C. West, 90, former Merkel mayor and civic leader, died at 12:40 a. m. Thursday at Hendrick Memorial Hospital in Abilene, after a long illness.

Funeral services were held at 4 p. m. Friday in Grace Presbyterian Church in Merkel. Burial was in Rose Hill Cemetery.

Mr. West played a major role in shaping the destiny of Merkel. One of the town's pioneers, Mr. West was born in Dallas Sept. 12, 1883 and came with his parents to Merkel in 1886. His father founded the West Co., the oldest business in the community. Mr. West was associated with the store for more than 50 years, retiring in 1960.

Survivors are two sons, George of Midland and Dick of Washington, D. C.; a daughter, Mrs. Sidney Foy of Baird; a brother, John R. of Merkel; a sister, Mrs. Booth Warren of Merkel; 11 grandchildren and 14 great-grandchildren.

If you wish to keep the same seats you had last year, be sure to contact the superintendent's office on or before August 23.


## Eulys (Pat) Johnson Dies of Heart Attack

## Clyde Library Receives New Books On Texas Cultural Heritage

AUSTIN Western art - from theater to folk to fine - is the subject of a new \$15,000 cooperative project between the Amon Carter Museum of Western Art and the Texas Commission on the Arts and Humanities.

A five-volume set of books devoted to various aspects of Texas cultural heritage is being made available to all 588 Texas public libraries, including the Clyde Library.

The gifts were announced today in a joint statement issued by Mitchell A. Wilder, director of the Amon Carter Museum, and Maurice Coats, executive director of TCAH.

The project is funded equally by the two organizations under the TCAH Major Institutions Program. The Amon Carter Museum of Western Art in Fort Worth, publisher of the books, is a leading repository of Western art.

The gift volumes range the history of the emerging West as depicted by the artists and artisans of the times. They tell of the battleground at Little Big Horn and the razzle dazzle of the Wild West shows; they picture the Texas homes of the 19th century and life in a Texas-most city (Fort Worth) of the 20th century.

Included is the catalogue of the collections of the Amon Carter Museum, which has just recently released. It contains more than 600 pages of descriptions and photographs of the collection which was begun by the late Amon G. Carter of Fort Worth. The catalogue is virtually a study guide for students of western art.

Also included is the book Texas Homes of the 19th Century, by Drury B. Alexander, University of Texas, Professor of Architecture. It is the most important books available on 19th Century Texas architecture. Two other books, by Don Russell, editor of Chicago Westerners, are entitled Custer's Last, and The Wild West, A History of Wild West Shows.

They also contain many color plates and black and white reproduction of paintings, drawings, graphics and photographs of the period. Many are from the Carter Museum collection.

The fifth book, by Leonard Sanders, is a history of Fort Worth, Texas, titled How Fort Worth Became the Texasmost City. It contains 131 photographs which "reflect life in Fort Worth from the early period of growth at the outbreak of World War I." According to Mr. Sanders, it was during these decades the basic character of Fort Worth was formed.

All five books are published by the Amon Carter Museum of Western Art.

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# 1974 Cattlemen's Round-Up For Crippled Children Gets Underway

As the 15th annual Cattlemen's Round-Up for Crippled Children gets underway, officials of the West Texas Rehabilitation Center expressed a guarded optimism concerning the fall sale of livestock to benefit the Center.

Charlie Morris of Abilene, general chairman, said, "This has been a tough year on the cattlemen, but our rancher friends have always stood by the Center in drought and plenty. Our Round-Up supporters know how important this fund-raising event is to the continuing operation of the Center, and I'm confident they'll do the very best they can."

The idea for the Cattlemen's Round-Up for Crippled Children originated in the fall of 1960 when cattlemen all over the Southwest joined together to donate livestock to be sold to benefit the Center. Since then the unique Round-Up has been a major source of income each fall for the private, non-profit out-patient diagnostic and treatment facility.

The cattlemen have played a major role in making the West Texas Rehabilitation Center one of the largest and finest facilities of its kind in the Southwest. Since the Center first opened its doors in 1953, more than 21,000 handicapped persons from all over the Southwest have been treated. Last year alone, 4,493 individuals were served, emphasizing the phenomenal growth of the multi-faceted facility, especially within the past five years. During 1973, patients were admitted from 122 cities in 51 Texas counties, as well as from

11 other states and two foreign countries. There are no geographical limitations.

Anyone needing help gets it regardless of age, race, creed, color, or ability to pay. A referral by a physician or any accredited referring agency is the only entrance requirement. "Since it has been a matter of policy from the beginning not to charge patients for therapy, the Center is primarily dependent upon the general public for its support," explains Shelly V. Smith, Executive Director. He added, "Since the sale of donated livestock comes in the last quarter of the year, its success determines whether we meet budget or not. We can continue to grow and serve only as our friends give us a helping hand."

The 1974 operational budget for the Center is \$648,000. Last year's Round-Up raised almost \$125,000.

The Cattle Sale is set for Sept. 30, with the Horse Sale to follow on Oct. 5 and Sheep and Goat Sale on Oct. 14. The Center has facilities to pick up livestock at any time.

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## Lone Star Gas Co. Announces Increase in Industrial Rates

DALLAS — New Industrial gas rate schedules have been established by Lone Star Gas Company, which will affect all standard industrial sales contracts in Texas, with the exception of those in the city of Dallas where an industrial rate increase was effectuated last April. The new base rates, applicable to approximately 5,000 industrial customers, are estimated to increase revenue by about \$7 million annual when fully effective, based on sales volume to these customers during the 12 months ended June 30, 1974. Gas cost adjustment provisions in nearly all such industrial rates will also impact revenue, based on the recent sharp escalation in gas costs.

The Company has pending before the Railroad Commission of Texas an application to adjust residential and commercial rates. Subject to approval by cities and towns served by the Company, such rate adjustment, when added to the announced industrial rate increases, will help eliminate some of the Company's utility earning deficiencies.

Robert E. Reading, Rate Officer and Assistant Controller, explained that the new rates will be applicable to all new contracts immediately, and will be placed into effect on existing contracts on their anniversary dates throughout the next 12 months. Reading pointed out

that industrial customers must bear their fair share of increased costs of providing reliable service. "These adjustments are distinct and apart from Lone Star's pending rate action before the Texas Railroad Commission which affects residential and commercial customers," Reading said.

Just since mid-1972, Lone Star has invested \$124 million in additional gas pipelines, treating facilities, and well drilling to secure additional gas supplies for its utility customers. The Company also has current cash advances and prepayments of \$36 million outstanding as required to secure additional gas supply.
