#### Included In Hwy Program

High improvements in Callahan County are included in a \$50.2 million safety and improvement program for 1975 approved recently by the Texas Highway Commission.

Roger G. Welsch, District Engineer of District 8 (Abilene) stated that the program includes a seal coat (asphalt and aggregate overlay) on the travel lanes for the following projects: U.S. 283--from Baird to S.H.

Estimated cost of the project is \$62,800.

The 1975 State Highway Safety and Betterment and Farm to Market Road Improvement Program statewide in-clude 709 projects in 201 counties of the state, involving 4.328.2 miles of roads.

Fifty-two percent of the work is on US and State numbered routes, 47 percent is on Farm to Market Roads and one percent is reserved for later assign-

## **County Agent Warns** White Grubs May **Damage Small Grain**

Producers planning to plant small grains when fields dry up, should check the soil for the presence of the "C" shaped white grubs according to Greg Gerngross, County Agent of Callahan County. The white grub caused varying amounts of damage last year and could be a possible problem this season. According to Area Entomologist Mike McWhorter, "The only sure method of determining if a potential white grub problem exists in a field is to take soil samples in several areas of the intended small grain acreage." One square foot samples should

two or more white grubs per square foot of soil are found, then a pre-plant, incorporated insecticide application will pro-bably be economically justified. Granular or liquid applications of diazinon have proven effective for white grub control when incorporated in the upper 3 to 5 inches of top soil. County Agent Gerngross emphasises that little can be done to control the white grub once small grains are planted. Additional information as to insecticide rates and their proper application can be obtained by contracting the county agent's office.




