## Series Of Meetings Planned On Swine

Swine producers in Northwest Texas will have an opportunity to consider a mandatory check-off on market hogs during a series of educational meetings in Lamesa, Canyon, Pampa, and Vernon in December.

According to County Extension Agent Spencer Tanksley, the Texas Pork Producers Association (TPPA) may conduct a state-wide referendum and election if producers view as favorable the mandatory check-off program.

Educational meetings already have been held in Llano, Brenham and Lubbock, says Tanksley.

Meetings scheduled for the west Texas area are as follows: Lamesa, Dec. 18, 7:30 p.m., at the Chamber of Commerce Building, 307 North

Houston Avenue; Canyon, Dec. 19, 7:30 p.m., at the Randall County Farm Bureau Building, 1714 5th Avenue; Pampa, Dec. 20, 7:30 p.m., at the Courthouse Annex, 1/4 mile east of Pampa City limits on Miami Hwy.; and Vernon, Dec. 21, 7:30 p.m., at the Wilbarger Auditorium, 2100 Yamparika Street.

Swine producers in these areas, says Tanksley, are encouraged to attend one of these meetings, since the referendum would affect any swine producer regardless of the number of hogs he markets. Participants in the meetings will include Marvin Sartin, area economist - management, Gilbert R. Hollis, area swine specialist, both with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service at Lubbock, John Fair, executive vice-president, TPPA, and Bob Gray of the Texas Department of Agriculture. Norman Brints, Extension area economist-management at Vernon, will attend the discussion in Vernon in place of Sartin.

If the mandatory check-off program is viewed favorably by most producers, the TPPA will petition the Commissioner of Agriculture for certification to conduct the state-wide referendum and election.

The balloting would result in the election of fifteen (15) directors, from as many areas of the state, who will administer funding for research, education, promotion, and disease and insect control. By this system money taken from mandatory check-off on market hogs will be used to improve the production and marketing of swine, says Tanksley.

All swine producers, he added, will be affected by the outcome of these meetings. It will be to their benefit to share

Davis also announced that the County ASC Convention was held December 12, 1973. Aubrey

Heathington was reelected to fill the vacancy on the county ASC committee. Davis said convention delegates also elected T.D. Davis, county chairman; Aubrey Heathington, vice chairman; and Marvin A. Drake, regular member; for the coming year.

ASC County and community committees are in charge of local administration of such national farm programs as cotton, feed grain and wheat, Davis stated.

Last year, he pointed out, over 1030 farmers -- about 98 per cent of all farmers in the county, took part in one or more of the programs administered by the ASC committees.

What is the best bargain for unemployed, out-of-school young men and women, age 16-21? The Job Corps, thinks the Texas Employment Commission.

"There are now openings for such young people who are interested in improving themselves and qualifying for the jobs that are available in the labor market of today," says Lonnie Merriott, manager of the local office at 210 South First Street here in Muleshoe.

"The Job Corps strengthens basic educational skills, and offers programs of excellent training in a wide range of vocations. In addition, personal development is encouraged through sports, music, hobbies, student government, and recreation.

The Job Corps Center at Camp Gary, San Marcos, is for young men. Another, for young women is located at McKinney. Most Job Corps enrollees from Texas go to these two centers.

Once they complete training, Job Corps graduates get help in finding a job in the skills they have trained for, Texas Employment Commission makes its services available.

The Texas Employment Commission is the recruiting agency for the Job Corps. In Muleshoe, the office is located at 210 South First Street.

An announcement was received this week from both Sen. John Tower and Sen. Lloyd Bentsen stating that the Rural Electrification Administration has approved a \$674,000 loan to the Bailey County Electric Co-op Association in Muleshoe.

The loan will finance service for 256 new customers, 27 miles of distribution line and two miles of transmission line. The loan also will finance one new substation.

## Postal Service Notes Increase Over Last Year

The U.S. Postal Service said this week that the volume of Christmas cards and letters mailed during the two-week period ending December 10 increased 15 per cent over all compared to the same 1972 period.

"The increase indicates to us," said E.V. Dorsey, Senior Assistant Postmaster General for operations, "that the public is continuing to respond to our 'mail earlier' program.

# Fertilizer Use Important Despite Higher Prices

As sure as the sun comes up in the morning, fertilizer prices are on the way up. How should farmers react to this major addition to an already long list of price increases for agricultural production?

First of all a soil test looks more important this year than ever before, because of the limited supply of nitrogen and phosphorus that is available at this time. With the harvest of all crops on the South Plains nearly complete now is a good time to take these soil samples and make plans for next year's fertilizer program. All county extension offices have information regarding methods of correct sampling and mailing

cartons for the soil sample. Even though the situation is changing, a producer must not abandon sound agronomic planning needed to produce profitable returns from his investments in plant nutrients. The principle of applying nutrients according to the soil and crop requirements still hold.

Better planning, more lead time and alternative combinations of analysis as well as methods of application will need consideration by producers. For example, it may be more economical to make more than one application in order to get the best combination of nutrients and make the supply go over more acres. We cannot

continue the luxury of applying nutrients that are not needed -- primarily for convenience.

Perhaps the most meaningful statement that can be made about nitrogen fertilizer materials is that their use requires a higher level of management skill than either phosphorus or potassium fertilizers, if optimum efficiency is to be attained. Nitrogen is used in larger amounts than any other essential nutrient. Nitrogen usually does not accumulate in soils except in the form of organic matter.

Most of the nitrogen taken up from the soil by plants is in the nitrate form. Soil conditions that are favorable for the biological conversion of ammonium nitrogen to nitrate nitrogen.

What, then, of fall applied nitrogen? Producers should make an effort to provide the needed nitrogen at a time that will most adequately meet the crop requirements. Fall and winter application may not be the best time to apply nitrogen fertilizers for field crop such as cotton, grain sorghum and corn. Fall applications of the crop requirement should be considered only in those areas where soil temperatures remain less than 50 degrees F. three to four weeks before planting, where winter rain fall is expected to be low.

The foregoing is not meant to imply that early application on nitrogen is hopeless, it should, however, be recognized that certain hazards are involved and that every effort be made to follow proven agronomic and soil management

practices to obtain profitable returns from the available fertilizer nitrogen supply.

Farmers must also consider

full accounting by the North Vietnamese of U.S. Servicemen Missing in Action.

The House Foreign Affairs Subcommittee on National Security Policy and Scientific Developments opened hearings on the legislation today.

In testimony submitted to the subcommittee, Price said, "The record is clear. The North Vietnamese signed agreements designed to facilitate the full accounting of U.S. Servicemen Missing in Action during the recent military activity in Southeast Asia. They have not lived up to those agreements."

"There remain in this country today, the wives and children, the mothers and fathers, the friends and loved ones of more than a thousand U.S. Servicemen who have been lost, who have not been accounted for and who are still listed only as 'Missing in Action.' 'The lack of cooperation on this matter exhibited by the

North Vietnamese, the Viet Cong and the Pathet Lao suggests it is their desire to continue to inflict upon American families as great a degree of personal suffering as is possible.

"We must break this impasse," Price said the legislation before the subcommittee is "designed to do just that" and he urged favorable action.

The House Concurrent Resolution being considered states "that it is the sense of Congress that it shall be the policy of the United States that the Government of the United States shall cease forthwith all consideration of aid, trade, diplomatic recognition, or any other form of communication, travel or accommodation" with North Vietnam or the Viet Cong until they comply with agree-

ments signed by North Vietnam of Jan. 27 and June 13 of this year. Those agreements pledge assistance in accounting for U.S. servicemen Missing in Action.

Price was successful earlier this year in attaching to the Farm Bill a ban on the sale of agricultural commodities to North Vietnam except by specific subsequent Act of Congress. The Price motion attaching the ban passed the House of Representatives July 24 on a 371-to-35 roll-call vote and subsequently became law.

especially in light of the energy problems the nation is facing."

The cumulative total of stamped Christmas mail cancelled from November 27 through December 10 of this year is over one billion, compared to just over 868 million last year.

Figures compiled by the postal source data system at 116 major facilities, show the increase in Christmas mail was up 32 per cent from 105,669,000 pieces last year to 139,883,000 for one day, Monday, December 10.

Dorsey said the postal service anticipated an increase of about three per cent over last year on a daily basis for the period of November 27 through December 24.

Postal Service figures show an increase in Christmas mail of 33 per cent on December 8, the day the Postal Service recommended as a deadline for mailing Christmas cards first-class.

another important soil nutrient and that is phosphorus. A history of five or more years of annual application of 50 to 60 or more pounds of P2 O5 per acre per year has contributed at least 250 to 300 pounds of P2 O5 per acre. Since crop removal is generally less than this, a buildup of phosphorus occurred and further additions may not produce any increased yields for some time.

Apply phosphorus in the most efficient manner to obtain best results. Phosphorus can be applied to soils considerably ahead of the growing season. Phosphorus can be banded in the fall for spring planted crops and show good results in the growing season.

Producers are urged to use fertilizer at the recommended rate and to strive for maximum efficiency and if these steps are followed that will probably be plenty of fertilizer to go around.

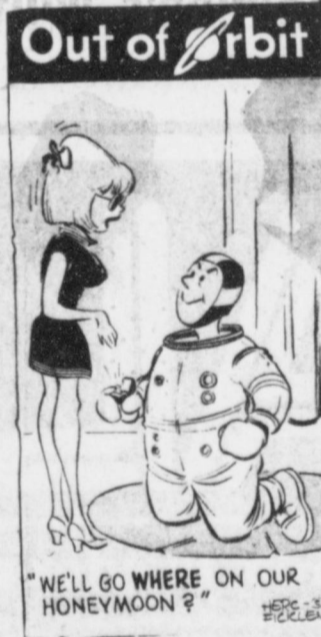
### McCamish Elected DECA Prexy

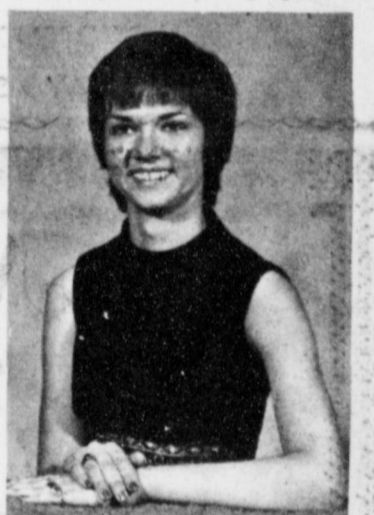
Before the last number was played, the Band Favorites were presented. The candidates this

Then there are six new over-bed tables to be used throughout the home, giving those residents who eat in their rooms a better height from which to eat.

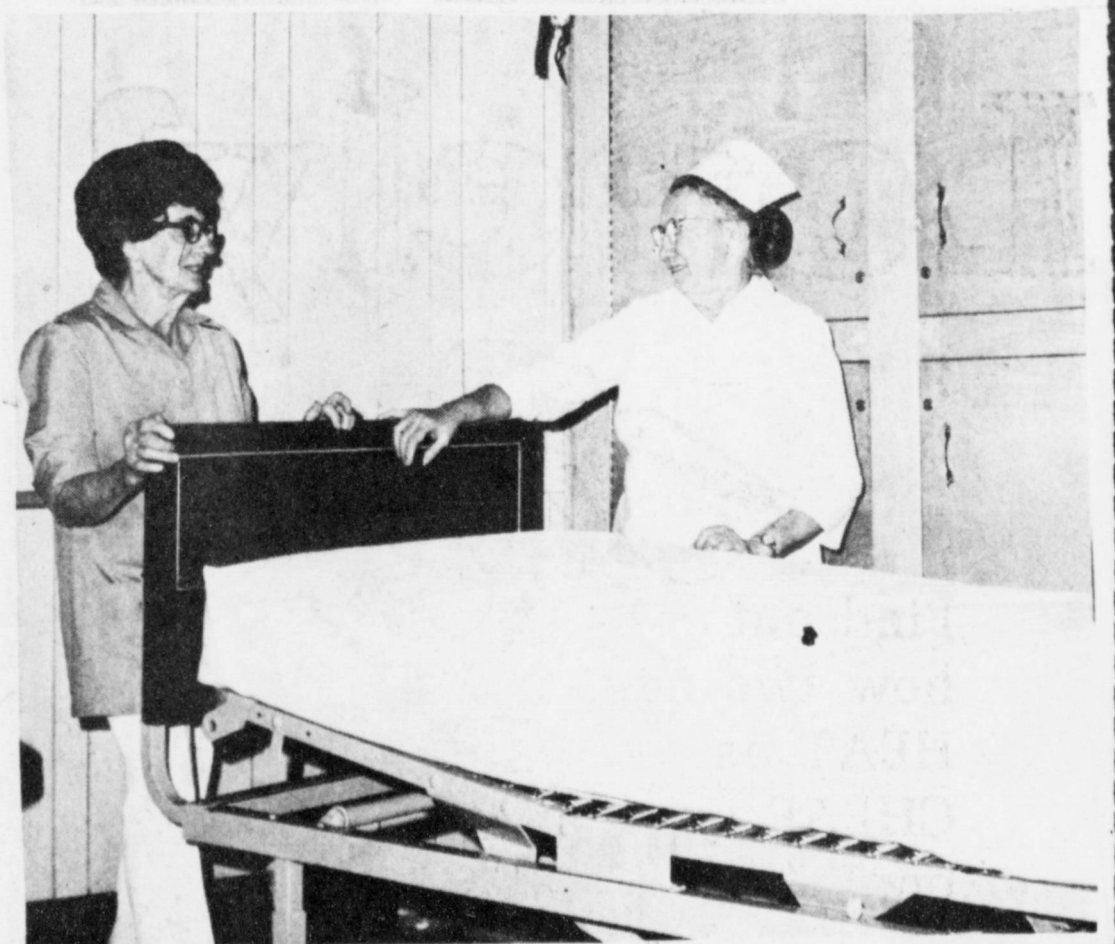
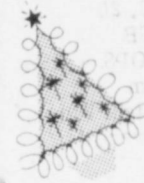
