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THE ARGUMENT DEVELOPS

The argument over the atomic bomb will be increased, not lessened, by the explosion over Bikini Lagoon and there is no chance whatever of scientists, engineers and technicians reaching an agreement as to the real significance of the test.

While we are willing to await subsequent atomic explosions to appraise the destructiveness of the atomic bomb, there seems to be a slight doubt of its effectiveness against warships. In fact, Vice-Admiral William P. Blandy, commander of the test, concludes that there is no reason to believe that the day of the carrier and the destroyer is done. He thinks the nation will continue to build them in the future.

AFTER THE MALES

Having convinced the ladies of the land that beauty, romance and long life can be had through the application of lotions, creams and whatever-they-have-to-sell, the cosmetics makers are now after the susceptible males.

The natural argument in favor of this campaign revolves around the simple arithmetic that if women buy so many million dollars' worth of stuff, the market will be doubled of men can be persuaded to spend their money for the same kind of material.

It all adds up to the fact that the purchaser pays his money and is entitled to his choice, with the additional notation that, in addition to the Four Freedoms, every American has the right to be a sucker.

MERGER HITS A SNAG

The President's revised bill for a merger, or reorganization, of the defense forces of the United States, is not making much progress in Congress where action will probably be postponed for some months.

Despite the President's declaration that he expected the full support of all the services for his program, there is every reason

to expect vigorous resistance from the Navy to two proposals, that providing for a single department of defense and that putting land-based naval aviation under the control of the Air Forces.

It is true that the President, after receiving reports from Army and Navy officials, took the responsibility for settling matters at issue, but there does not seem to be any overwhelming sentiment in Congress to rush the so-called "merger" by prompt legislative action.

WHO WON THE WAR?

A newspaper article pokes fun at the Soviet Union, alleging that a Russian publication asserts that the Red Army, plus Red workers, scored the victory over the "fascists" and that the job was done without much help from anybody else.

This will be news, of course, to most American. Over here we have been informed that the victory was won by the Air Forces alone, by the Army on its own and by the exertions of the Navy, with side claims that it was won by American labor, big business, capitalism, the public school system and the churches.

The Russians have apparently reduced their claims to the Army and the workers. Over on this side of the Big Pond we have not yet been able to pass on the merits of the claimants and public opinion is still divided, with protagonists insistently advancing the claims of their favorite candidate.

JAPS DROWNED 1,000 CAPTIVES

While German atrocities have received major attention in this country, largely because more Americans were involved in the mistreatment, there is no reason to overlook the brutality of the Japanese in the Far East.

The mistreatment of subject peoples and of Allied captives by the Japanese exhibited the same brutality seen in Europe. The trials now proceeding in the Far East are necessary if the nations fighting Japan have any idea of protecting their soldiers from atrocities in future wars.

Recently, a Netherlands Indies Army military high court has revealed that the Japanese drowned 1,000 Australian, British and Dutch guerrilla fighters, after capturing them in Java. Five witnesses report that the Japanese forced two captured soldiers into a basket, loaded hundreds of baskets on ships and dumped the men into the sea a few miles off the coast of Java.

Gib Sandefer FRIENDLIEST WEST TEXAN For Representative 17th Congressional District

"Son, I've met thousands of people in this world, but never a man I didn't like," the late Will Rogers told a youthful Gib Sandefer 20 years ago on the Hardin-Simmons University campus where the famed humorist and goodwill diplomat was a guest.

And that oft-repeated saying of Will Rogers has been Gib Sandefer's creed down through the years. He has traveled the world over, and everywhere he has made and left friends.

Gib Sandefer was born and reared in the 17th Congressional District. He is 40, married and the father of one daughter. He is not wealthy, not aspiring to attain great quantities of the world's goods, but finding greater wealth instead in the friendships of his fellowman.

He attended Abilene Public Schools. In 1927 he was graduated from Hardin-Simmons where for 31 years his father, the late Dr. Jefferson Davis Sandefer, was president. He remained with the university as business manager of Athletics and as manager of the famous and colorful Cowboy Band. It was through his ability to make the right contacts that the band toured 12 foreign countries, gave command performances before the crowned heads of Europe, and traveled 500,000 miles spreading in music and spirit the tradition of the West Texas Cowboy.

In 1929 Gib Sandefer bought a small ranch in Nolan County, and operated it with success until disposing of it in 1942.

He declined a Navy Commission that carried a desk assignment in Washington, D. C., to become a Field Representative of the American Red Cross in various combat areas of the recent war - in Africa, in Italy and in the China-Burma-India theatre. Home, he toured the United States as a lecturer asking for greater world fellowship and a more thorough understanding of the other man's problems as a means of assuring peace in the world. He recently declined a lucrative radio contract in order to offer his services in a far greater field - as representative of his district in the halls of Congress.

TRAINING COURSE FOR DHIA
A training course for D. H. I. A. supervisors and official testers has been scheduled at College Station for the week of July 29 to August 2.

At the present time there are several openings in prospect for D. H. I. A. supervisors. These jobs usually pay upward of \$175 per month. While on the job the supervisor is usually provided board and lodging, but is required to furnish his own transportation.

Anyone interested in dairying and who wants to work to get ahead, this might be a wonderful opportunity. Your training, experience, and contacts made as a supervisor may be invaluable. Contact your County Agent immediately for further details and application forms if interested.

FLYING FARMERS MEET

Texas Flying Farmers will gather Saturday, July 20, at Sweetwater to select delegates to the National Flying Farmers' Association meeting at Stillwater, Okla. The national meeting is scheduled for August 1-2.

The Army Air Force will stage an air show at Sweetwater, according to Clayton Beard, Tahoka, president of the Texas Flying Farmers.

The program will be devoted to a discussion of use of airplanes in agriculture.

Dr. Howard W. Barlow, dean of the School of Engineering, Texas A. & M. College, will discuss flight training under the GI Bill of Rights. The first flying lessons for veterans are now underway at A. & M. with an enrollment of 63 students.

The Texas Flying Farmers organized in May 1946 at College Station. This meeting is closer to home and anyone interested should attend.

PLANES ON FARMS AND RANCHES NOT A FAD

Airplanes are "coming of age" in rural life. The U. S. Department of Agriculture estimates that at least 3,000 post war surplus airplanes soon will become "air trucks" for moving farm

products. Plane dealers say that 60 per cent of all the private planes they've sold since the end of the war have gone to rural residents.

And here's one more important trend. The Civil Aeronautics Authority believes that in time opportunities will be greater for war-time pilots in "aerial agriculture" than with commercial airlines or as civilian instructors.

Well, what are some of the jobs which are going to be done better by planes? Dusting, spraying and inspecting crops, checking cattle, sheep and range conditions, spotting breaks in fences, locating forest fires. Those are a few of the more ordinary ones.

Now here's a fairly recent development. Ninety per cent of the rice planted by California growers this year will be sown from planes. And in Texas, some areas of the next crop are expected to be seeded from the air. The USDA's Bureau of Plant Industry says the main advantage of using aircraft is that from 300 to 500 acres a day can be planted by plane. That's three to four times the normal rate where the job is done by tractors.

Rice used for seeding by air usually is pre-soaked to drive the excess air from the hulls. The seeding is done preferably on calm days. To aid the pilot "flag men" are stationed on the fields to step off seeded strips and guide the course of the plane.

In Illinois grass seed has been sowed successfully by a small plane to 1200 acres of rough land. The plane sowed 40 to 50 feet in a swath and carried 150 pounds per load. The cost was \$3.20 per acre compared with \$6 per acre for hand seeding.

Mechanical seeding was impractical because of the nature of the land.

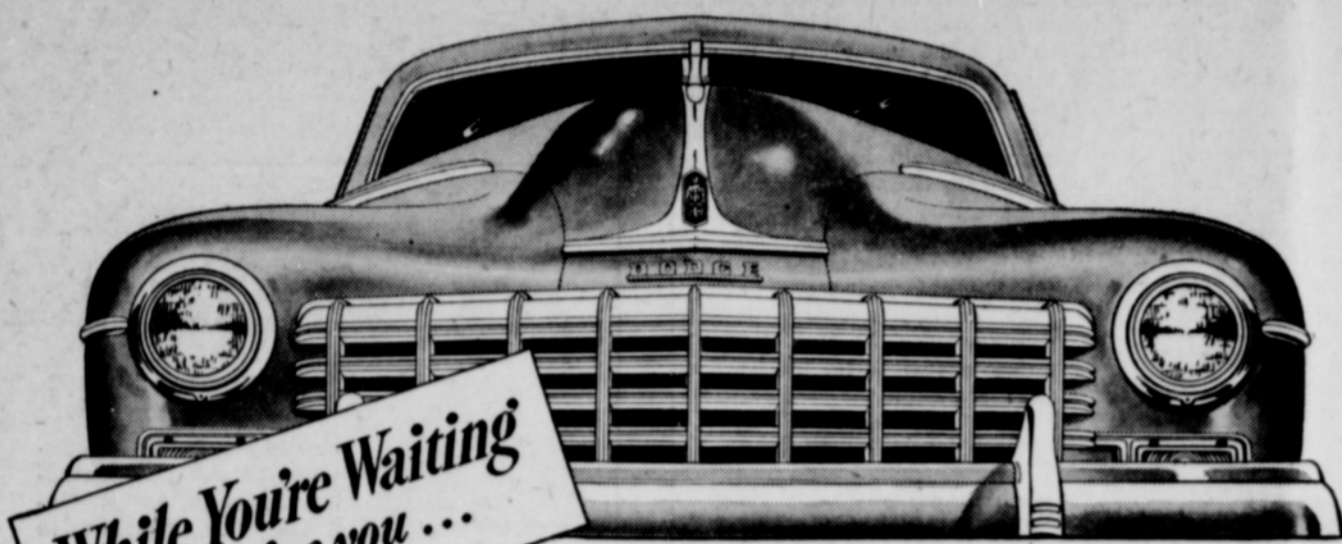

LABOR-INDUSTRY LAW IS NECESSARY TO CURB INFLATION

STAMFORD, TEXAS, July 13.—Ted Miles, Stamford business man and ex-GI, running for the U. S. Congress on the West Texas Farmer's ticket, today called on the present congress for immediate action to ward off a second series of devastating post-war strikes.

ATTORNEY GENERALSHIP BELONGS TO PEOPLE

The office of Attorney General of Texas belong to the people, not to the politicians, Price Daniels of Liberty, candidate for that office, declared this week.

Daniel, who spent most of the week campaigning in West Texas with his schedule calling for him to be in Houston Saturday, warned that an attempt was being made to set up a political dynasty in the Attorney Generalship.

"I have no big political names or former officeholders to parade before the citizens of Texas to tell them how to vote," Daniel said. "It was my observation before entering the Army three years ago that Texans like to see a man run on his own name and his own merits. I haven't found that the war has changed this feeling."

The former Speaker of the Texas House of Representatives asserted he is encountering general popular resentment against "the attempts of politicians and past officeholders, to take over control of the Attorney General's office." He predicted that this feeling would be evidenced in the voting on July 27, with a large majority for him over his opponent.

"The people are with me in this race," Daniel declared.

Daniel, who has practiced law in Liberty County since receiving his law degree from Baylor University in 1932, served three terms in the Legislature and was elected Speaker of the House in 1943. He resigned the Speakership to enter the Army as a private and was discharged only two months ago. He is married and the father of three children.

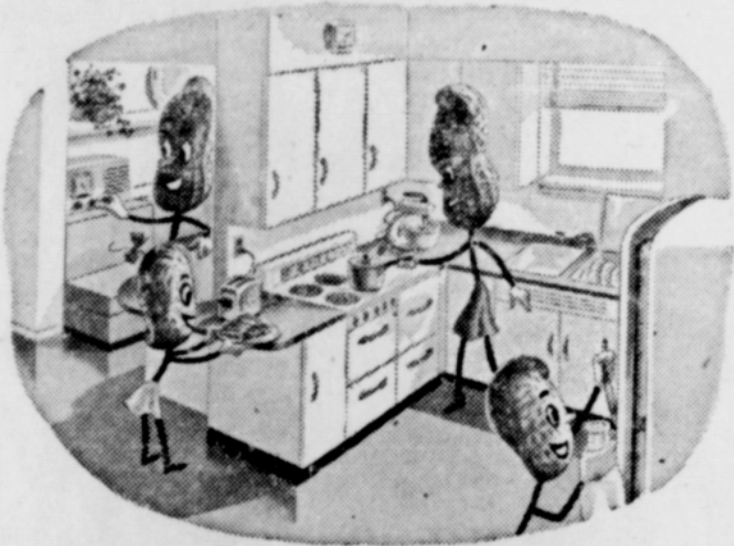

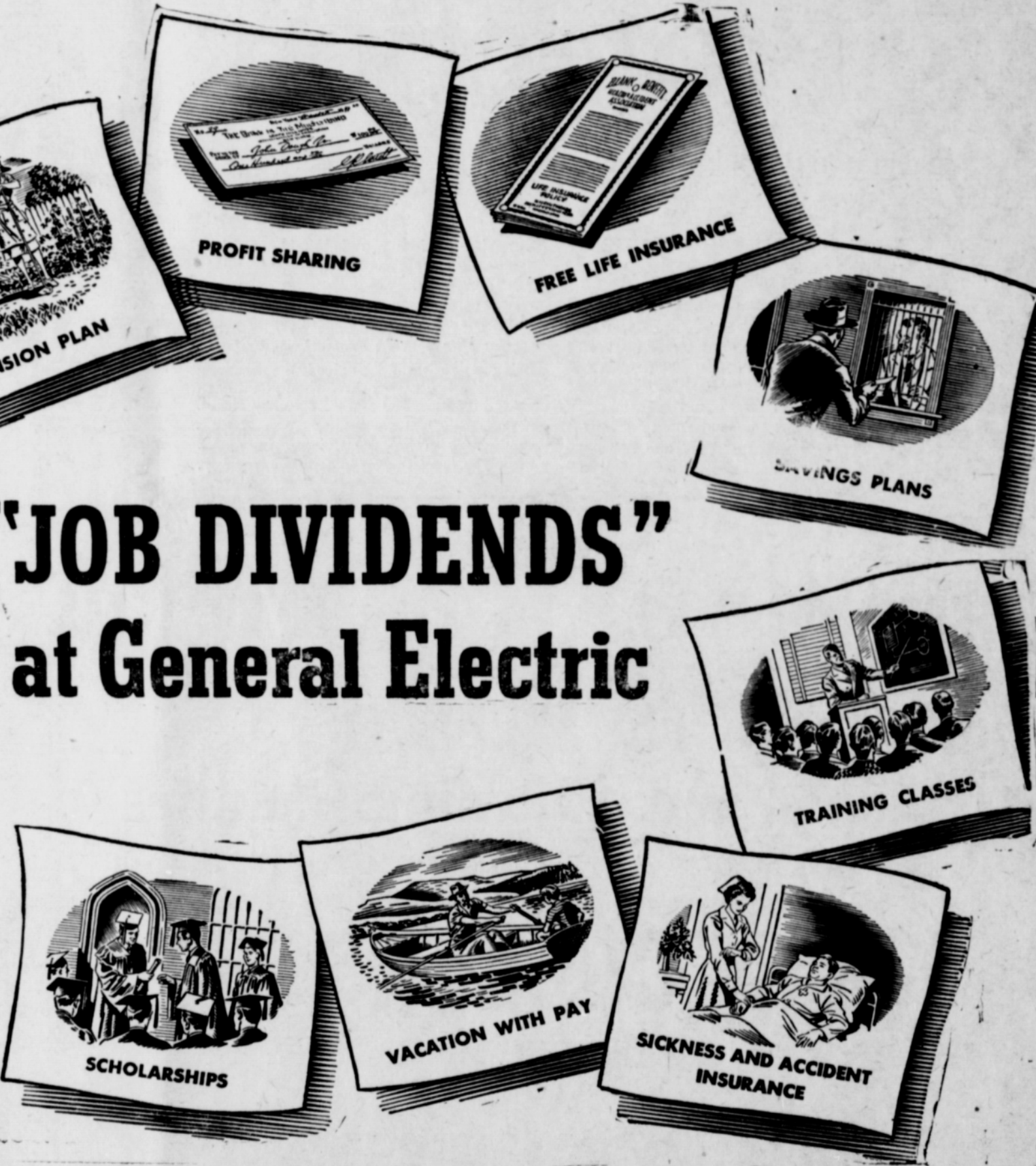

TREATING POULTRY FOR LICE

Lice will cause chickens to lose weight and will weaken their condition so that they will be susceptible to diseases. Two kinds of lice are found on chickens. The head louse, found near the head, obtains food from the skin and scales on feathers. Body louse is found all over the body in general and obtains food the same way as the head louse. This species is somewhat larger than the body louse. It is white or yellowish-white in color when full grown.

Lice multiply very fast during the warm months of the year. Records show that as many as 35,000 of these insects may be

found on one individual chicken. Lice lay eggs at the base of the feathers which hatch in 5 to 7 days. They emerge, after 3 molting processes, as grown lice. These newly hatched insects are ready to lay eggs again in about 30 days.

There are quite a few ways to rid flocks of lice. Sodium fluoride is an old and proven treatment. It can be used as a dust or a dip. As a dust, it can be used through a sifter or by the "pinch" method. Place one pinch on the neck feathers, one on the abdomen, and one on the back. Work the dust well into the feathers. Prepare dip using 1 ounce of laundry soap and 1 ounce of sodium fluoride to 1 gallon of water. Best results are obtained by using warm water. The water helps dissolve the soap. Hold fowl by the wings then move around in the solution until the feathers and body come in contact with the solution. The fowl should be completely soaked before being released.

Nicotine sulphate (Black Leaf "40") is another proven "de-louser." This can be used as roost paint by using 1 ounce to every 15-20 linear feet of roost. CAUTION: For external use only. Nicotine sulphate is POISON. Keep away from children. Black Leaf "40" can be applied to the roost with paint brush or oil can. It can also be applied direct to the base of the feathers or skin. This can be done with an ordinary eye dropper. Place one drop at the end of the breast bone and one drop on the neck. This amount will take care of both species of lice. CAUTION: Do not use more than three drops on a mature bird.

The final steps are to clean out all the old nesting materials and arrange the chicken house so that the maximum amount of fresh air and sunlight can pass through.

JESTER WOULD BUILD RURAL ROADS
