





LOANS TO FOREIGN GOVERNMENTS TO STABILIZE WORLD TRADE

By the end of 1946, the United States will have committed itself to about \$1,000,-000,000 worth of foreign credits if the British loan is approved by Congress, according to the Department of Commerce.

The Export-Import Bank will complete its extension of \$3,500,000.000 credit and something close to \$3,000,000,000 will have been realized from surplus property sold abroad in credit, on merchantships sold to foreign purchasers and in Lend-Lease settlements. These items, plus the \$3,750,000,-000 loan to the United Kingdom, constitute the estimated total of credits.



> Of the annual average flood damage of \$662,000, land on the small tributaries suffers 76 per cent. Damage to crops and pas- 3 tures accounts for most of the total loss.

The flood problem in the Middle Colorado watershed can be divided into these three parts: that occurring on small creeks and branches, that on the main stems of the San Saba River, Brady Creek and Pecan Bayou and that on the main stem of the Colorado River.

In this area of low and uncertain rainfall, the land treatment measures are concerned with the control of erosion and the conservation of water. Experiments indicate that in this area soil moisture is the major limiting factor of production. Forming the basis of an agricultural program in aid of flood control are the remedial measures recimmended by soil conservation districts, measures that are moisture-conserving, practical of application, acceptable to farmers and ranchers, and give maximum results in run-off and waterflow retardation and erosion control.

When measured in dollars and cents, benefits of the work are great. Each dollar of total cost will return benefits of \$3.44, it is calculated. Each dollar invested by the federal government will return \$1.46 in flood control benefits. Total direct flood control benefits are estimated at \$137,-000 annually. This represents a 21 per cent reduction in flood
