## Facts About Fire

During 1931 fire destroyed approximately 10,000 lives.

Nearly one-third of these were children under ten years of age.

Two-thirds of the total were burned to death in homes.

The total economic loss was \$404,633,265.

In order to visualize these facts, compare them with the following.

The annual fire bill is about equal to 75 per cent of the interest on our national debt.

The new excise and miscellaneous taxes recently imposed on us will produce, in a year, very little more

than the annual fire bill.  
Over 80 per cent of all fires are easily preventable.

## Fires Are Preventable

Fire is the great destroyer—not only of lives and property, but of employment, business opportunities, community and industrial progress. Of every hundred industrial establishments burned in the last five years, 43 were not rebuilt. The waste was complete and absolute.

The conquest of fire is simply the conquest of indifference. Each of us owes the community a duty—to eliminate the hazards on our property. We cannot afford the "luxury" of a fire.

## A Science—A Craft —And An Art

In the pioneer days, many communities had laws requiring everyone to keep buckets filled with water in their homes, as a defense against fire.

Today almost every progressive community, large or small, has an up-to-date fire department, with a trained personnel and the best of apparatus.

These two methods of fire protection are very different. But both stemmed from the same attitude of

mind. Both arise from the necessity of protecting lives and property from the ever present danger of fire.

The fire buckets were followed by crude hand pumps. Then came the steamer, and at last the motor-propelled fire engine of today. The science of fire control is a genuine science, that has gradually been perfected through hundreds of years of trial and error, success and failure—and ceaseless experiment.

The building of first class, standard apparatus has been a fine art as well as a difficult craft. Most of us think of a fire engine as the by-product of the manufacture of trucks. Nothing could be further from the truth. Apparatus that is made that way often proves a very untrustworthy weapon in the war against fire, failing when most it is needed. In the case of the standard makes, every part that goes into the completed engine is designed and built with but one thought in mind—stamina and uninterrupted service in fighting fire.

The evolution of fire engines is not done. It will reach new standards of efficiency and service. Manufacturers of standard apparatus have saved the nation billions of dollars in property values and tens of thousands of irreplaceable lives.

## Wright Patman

Honorable Wright Patman, Representative from the First Congressional District of Texas, is one of the young Democrats in Congress who came out of service in the Army during the World War and went into politics. He is forging ahead as one of the coming statesmen of the nation. Mr. Patman is probably the best informed Democrat in the House of Representatives on the question of money. 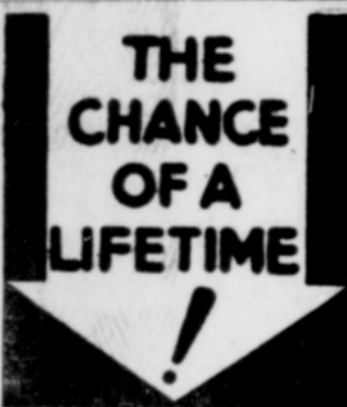
