# **Individual Situation Determines If Creep Feed** Operation Will Become Profitable for Rancher

By PAT C. GARNER County Agricultural Agent

If you are thinking about initiating a creep feeding program for beef cattle operation, carefully consider advantages as well as limitations and fit them to your individual operation, advises Pat C. Garner, county agricultural agent.

Calves which are to be creep fed should receive enough feed to fatten them by weaning time. Fat calves are being purchased today for direct slaughter. Feeder buyers do not prefer to purchase fat calves for feedlots thus this limitation should be considered prior to creep feeding. Approximately 900 pounds of feed are required to produce a 100 pound increase in calf weight, Garner explains.

Creep feeding adds some weight and allows calves to grow more uniformly in size and condition. At weaning time less

not replace a breeding program in which females are selected for good milk production. Calves that are nursing good milking cows while grazing an abundant, nutritious green pastures may not respond to creep feed-

Since calves are often difficult to get on feed, extra time and patience as well as a helping hand may be required to get them on their way. Also, additional expenses will be incurred due to extra equipment, labor and feed costs. Where cows have several gathering places, a creep feeder at each location may be too expensive.

Some livestock producers run hogs, sheep and goats in the same pasture with cattle. This practice could not be continued if a creep feeder was placed in the pasture

Whatever type of creep feeding operation you may be considering, says Garner, make a careful study of your individual situation and facilities before starting the program.

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



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
