PLANS WERE ANNOUNCED this week by the Baird Garden Club for the annual home Christmas lighting contest -- a project we believe to be most worthwhile.

DON'T FORGET that this Sunday is a very important date for both children and adults.

Be sure to find time between 1 and 6 p. m. Sunday to get by for that booster dose of Sabin oral polio vaccine. The vaccine has compiled a most impressive record to date in cutting down on polio -- but becoming complacent now might allow the disease to get started again.

THE REMODELING WORK completed recently at the Baird Post Office gave the building's interior a brighter, more attractive look. Moving the mail slots caused some brief problems, but patrons found them again quickly.

Wonder if the brighter interior is a part of the department's efforts to get more Zip into its operations?

IF THE TREND from recent years hold true, the 1964 Census of Agriculture, which is being conducted in Callahan County at present, will show fewer farms and ranches than five years ago along with an increase in the average size.

The last census, taken in 1959 showed Callahan County had 828 farms and ranches at that time, with an average size of 630.1 acres.

Five years earlier, in 1954, the county counted 946 farms and ranches which were an average of 552.6 acres in size.

While we are in no position to make predictions on what the survey will reveal, a projection of changes between 1954-59 to the 1959-64 span, would indicate about 700 farms and ranches in the county now, with an average of about 700 acres each.

This trend is not unique to Callahan County, of course, but is true all over the country as economic conditions forces farmers and ranchers to become more efficient in their operations and efficiency allows them to handle more acres.

Total value of products sold by county farmers and ranchers in 1959 was \$4,660,006, coming chiefly from the sale of livestock and livestock products.

Bears Capture 9 All-District Slots

The district champion Baird Bears hogged honors on the all-District 10-A football team chosen by coaches Wednesday night, carting off nine of the 26 spots awarded.

Rugged Bruce Bell led the Baird parade by capturing first-team slots on both offense and defense. The 160-pound senior was selected as an all-district offensive guard, and was tapped for a linebacker slot on the defensive team.

Joining Bell on the offensive team were Bear end Kelton Jones, 135-pound senior, and fullback Richard Windham, the 220-pound senior who spearheaded the Bear attack which led to a 9-2 season record.

Bruce Bell Gets All-State Honor

Bruce Bell, guard and defensive ace on the Baird High School district championship football team, was given honorable mention all-state recognition by the Fort Worth Star-Telegram this week.

He was the only member of the Bear squad to receive mention for the mythical team, and was one of three players from District 10-A to be selected for the group.

Also receiving honorable mention by the newspaper were Trent Thomas, De Leon guard, and Charles Brewster, Albany fullback.

Two players from Goldthwaite, the team which defeated Baird in bi-district, also received honorable mention. They were Tom Duren, big Eagle tackle and Jim Childers, backfield star.

Weldon Tittle of Merkel, whom Baird faced in non-conference play, was named to the squad.

District FFA Banquet Tuesday in Abilene

Polio Campaign Sunday

Callahan Countians will swallow Sabin vaccine-soaked sugar cubes Sunday afternoon as part of an area-wide attempt to keep polio under control.

Vaccine stations will be open from noon to 6 p. m. Sunday in Baird, Clyde, Eula and Putnam. The program is being sponsored by the Taylor-Jones Medical Society and is open to everyone.

There will be no charge for the vaccine doses, and medical officials have urged every family to participate whether they can make a donation to help defray expenses or not.

Contributions will be accepted to meet cost of the vaccine,

however, which is approximately 50 cents per dose.

Vaccine will be available at the Baird school cafeteria, the Clyde Community Center, Eula school and Putnam school.

Helping supervise the program will be Drs. R. W. Evans and J. E. Mikeska of Clyde, and Dr. M. L. Stubblefield of Baird. Assisting will be Mrs. J. L. Ault and Mrs. Betty Cathcart of Baird, and Mrs. Evans and Miss Jean Robbins of Clyde, all registered nurses.

Various service clubs in the area have volunteered to work with the program, handling registration and other detail work.

Clyde Lions Club is sponsoring the program there, and Baird Chamber of Commerce is sponsor for the Baird-Putnam effort.

Minors or persons under 21 years of age who are not married must have written permission from parent or guardian to take the vaccine. Consent forms have been distributed through schools in the four communities, and the form is duplicated in today's newspaper.

Consent forms will also be available at the vaccine stations. Officials have urged parents to fill out the form ahead of time in order to conserve time Sunday afternoon.

No minor will be permitted to take the vaccine without signed parental or guardian consent.

To be administered Sunday is the "trivalent oral polio vaccine," which contains Types 1, 2 and 3 of the Sabin oral vaccines. The dose will serve as a booster for everyone who took the various types of vaccine some two years ago.

Persons who have not had any of the Sabin vaccine types, or who have had only one or two of the types, have been urged to go ahead and take the trivalent dose Sunday. They later should get additional doses from their physician.

Vaccine will be administered to everyone on sugar cubes, with the exception of infants who will be given vaccine from a dropper.

No cases of paralytic polio have been reported in Texas this year among persons who have taken the Sabin vaccine.

Baird Basketball Teams Enter Tournament Action This Week

Tournaments draw the attention of Baird High School basketball forces this weekend, with the Bears competing at Jim Ned and the girls at Cross Plains.

Both tournaments run Thursday through Saturday.

Next week the Bears will host Central Catholic for A and B matches Monday night, while boys and girls will visit Eula for games Tuesday night. Both teams will again enter tournaments next weekend, with the girls going to Dyess and the boys to Eastland.

Baird won two games from Wylie Monday night. The girls won the opener, 38-27, and the boys took the nightcap, 58-51.

Vickey Jones pumped in 20 points for the Bearettes although Kathleen Long of Wylie was high pointer for the evening with 21. Sally Green had nine, Peggy Gordon had six and Yvonne Shelnut had three for Baird.

Wylie led after one quarter, 9-8, but Baird had a 21-16 edge at halftime.

Tommy Barton's 13 points led Baird in the boys game. Dee Cross of Wylie bucketed 20. Wally Harris added 10 to the Baird cause while Maxie Gordon and Kelton Jones each had eight markers.

Baird was way out front by the end of the first quarter, 16-3, and held a 39-10 halftime margin. At the end of the third it was 53-26, but Wylie came up fast in the fourth.

Monday night the Bearettes lost a close one to the Coleman girls, 36-33. Miss Jones had 20 for Baird and Miss Shelnut had nine. Jamie Streetman's 19 was high for Coleman.

Baird led after the first period, 11-6, Coleman was ahead at halftime by 20-19, and Baird was out front after three quarters, 27-26.

The Baird boys went the overtime route Monday night to beat Central Catholic, 41-39. Barton's 16 was high for the Bears and David Barrera had 19 points for the Chargers.

It was even, 9-9, after one quarter and the Bears were out front at halftime, 23-18. Baird led at the three-quarter mark, 35-30.

Baird's B team girls lost to Coleman Monday night, 31-19 while the Bear B team beat Central Catholic that same night 44-26. Evelyn Smalley had eight and Carolyn Kimbrough six for Baird in the girls game while George Lopez topped the B boys with 11 markers.

Grid Year Puts Fund in Black

The past football season was one of the most successful financial years ever for Baird High School. The school's athletic fund wound up the season solidly in the black.

After football season expenses were deducted, the fund retained \$2,177.27 for use in meeting basketball and track expenses for the rest of the school year. Also to come from the balance are letter jackets for 1964 football lettermen.

Receipts from Baird's 11 games this season totaled \$4,574.26 -- with the last three piling up almost half of that amount.

By games, Baird's share of gate receipts included Santa Anna, \$221.96; Merkel, \$429.52; Roscoe, \$256.65; Rotan, \$323.50; Ranger, \$333.77; Eastland, \$237.52; De Leon, \$283.25; Cross Plains, \$326.27; Albany, \$571.98; Clyde, \$633.97; Goldthwaite, \$925.88.

There is a spread of more than \$700 between Baird's share of the smallest and largest gates of the season -- \$221.95 at Santa Anna and \$925.88 for the bi-district clash with Goldthwaite.

Disbursements so far for the football season include \$364 for insurance; \$1,561.58 for equipment; and \$471.41 in miscellaneous expenses.

Outdoors In Texas

Most hunted animal in Texas, except the deer, is the ringtail. For two months hunters will take this animal any way they can — with lights, dogs or traps. Afterwards, the fur will wind up on some woman's back in the form of a beautiful coat. Only fur-bearing animal left in Texas that commands a worthwhile price on the market is the ringtail. In recent years the pelts have held steady at about \$1.25 each for the better ones.

Many Texans never have seen a ringtail. This sly diminutive creature spends most of its life in the dark. It beds down in a den during the day. And it will not venture into the open until well after dusk. Then, unlike most nocturnal prowlers, it retires before daylight arrives. Only on very rare occasions will you see a ringtail during daylight hours. Although the ringtail ranges over much of the dry Western half of the United States, the biggest population is found right here in Texas. There are more ringtails in the Edwards Plateau of Central Texas than in any other comparable region. This animal is mistakenly called the ring-tailed cat. But, it isn't a member of the cat family. It's a carnivore closely kin to the common raccoon. Average ringtail is about 20 inches long, including tail and weighs between two and three pounds.

Its tall and round eyes which appear much too large for its meek-looking face are the ringtail's most notable characteristics. The tail has alternating black and white rings, hence the name ringtail. In all, there will be 14 to 16 rings which don't quite come together on the underside of the tail. Overall coloration is a tan-ish or grayish hue. Its tell-tale eyes glow brightly when caught in the beam of the headlamp or flashlight. Despite the fact that thousands of ringtails are killed each year, it is remarkable how little is known about this animal.

"There just isn't much available information on the ringtail" says Al Springs, co-ordinator for wildlife restoration with the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission. "We've ran a study on its food habits, but other than that I can't tell you too much about it. Frankly, I doubt whether a majority of Texans even know it exists."

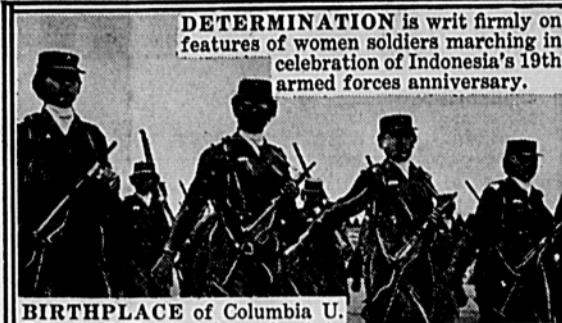
A dietary analysis made of more than 100 ringtails revealed that about one-fourth of its total intake is composed of tiny mammals like mice and rats, including carrion. Otherwise, it feeds upon grubs of native plants, birds, snakes, lizards and various insects like spiders, scorpions and centipedes. Believe it or not, one of the favorite foods is the common mistletoe which grows in mesquite trees.

It isn't unusual to have a ringtail answer a predator call. But considering this diet composition, it sort of makes a person wonder what motivation could possibly prompt the animal to be attracted by the dying-rabbit cries. Perhaps it is curiosity more than anything else.

Usually ringtails live along rocky ledges where they den in crevices.

Females hatch their young in the spring and average between two and four offspring. Young ringtails are almost helpless at birth and don't open their eyes until 31 to 34 days later. At about four months they have

the same overall look of adults. But, of course, they are smaller in size.

One reason the ringtail isn't better known is because very few exist in captivity. Unlike coons and other similar animals, the ringtail doesn't show up around farm houses as pets. Seldom are they caught when young. This because the young rarely ventures out until they are grown. Also the very nature of the ringtail's living habits, in the narrow and confining rocky crevices, make the young difficult to capture alive.

It isn't unusual for several adult ringtails to den together. But when you find them out prowling at night, they almost invariably will be traveling alone.

Most hunters seek them simply by walking slowly through the woods, swinging a bright light through the treetops, searching for the glow of eyes. Many ringtails also are trapped. A few are treed by packs of trained hounds. Regardless of the method used, the Texas hunter finds great pleasure in seeking the animal.

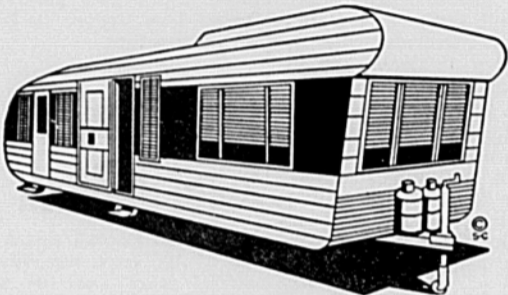

Farm, Ranch Management Course Set Dec. 8-10 for Courthouse

A farm and ranch management shortcourse will be held at the courthouse in Baird on Monday, Tuesday and Thursday, Dec. 7, 8 and 10. The program will begin each night at 7:30 p. m. and will end at 9.

The shortcourse will cover three subjects: economic analysis of brush control, pasture management and farm and ranch income tax planning.

Billy G. Freeman, area farm management specialist, and Rex P. Kennedy, economist in management, will be featured speakers. Both are with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The shortcourse will be on the economic aspects of the topics, not on the mechanical aspects. For example, the brush control program will be on costs and

returns of different brush control methods. They will discuss how long it will take for method of control to pay for its use and what the return of the investment will be.

The pasture management program will be on such things as returns in reseeded fields, fertilizer costs and returns, costs and returns on annual grasses and forage sorghums as compared to permanent grasses.

The program on income tax planning will be on when to buy or sell equipment, capital gains, planning depreciation schedules and others items that will enable you to save tax dollars.

The shortcourse is sponsored by the agricultural sub-committee of the county program building committee.

This brings the total winnings of Callahan County 4-H members to over \$1,000 prize money won and over \$11,000 worth of livestock sold in premium sales for the 1964 show year.

Callahan County 4-H members exhibited livestock in the following major shows in 1964; Sand Hill Hereford and Quarter Horse Show, Odessa; Abilene Fat Stock Show; Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show, Ft. Worth; Southwestern Livestock Show, El Paso; San Antonio Livestock Exposition; Houston Livestock Show; San Angelo Fat Stock Show; West Texas Fair, Abilene; and the State Fair of Texas at Dallas.

They showed one grand champion steer, one reserve grand champion steer, one reserve champion junior Hereford steer, one champion Angus steer, one reserve champion Duroc barrow, and one reserve champion fine wool lamb in the major shows.

They have had five first places, ten second places and seven third places, and numerous lower placings, in addition to the champions mentioned above.

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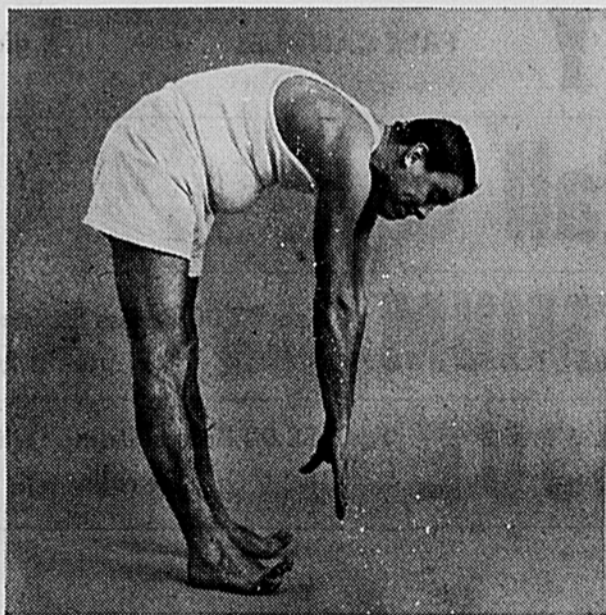
