## 22 stores participating

The biggest cooperative promotion in Post in years will get under way today with 22 retail stores participating in the Chamber-sponsored City-Wide Sale.

The sale is not only a day sale — Thursday and Saturday — but it turns into an interesting merchandise sale on Saturday night right out onto the sidewalk.

# Voda Beth Voss is elected big promotion

Garza voters Saturday elected Voda Beth Voss, Garza county treasurer, to the office for four years beginning in January.

Voss defeated Paul H. Rhodes, 501 to 505 for the district nomination for county treasurer and will be the only opponent in the general election. She had led by six percent in the May primary.

Voss won seven of the nine voting boxes and absentee balloting, tied for, and lost only two in her first victory at the polls.

She lost the big first box by only two votes, 106, and the Southland box tied 37 all in all she swept the rest.

She is the only other local candidate. Herbert L. Walls won the county commission court from a field of 4 by almost a 2-1 margin over Billy G. Rhodes, 225 to 117. He, too, will not be opposed in the general election.

Voss won the big Post box 176 to 92, won at the Justiceburg box 106 and led in the Justiceburg box 22 to 11.

The runoff saw Garza voters with the winners in the state, congressional, and state senator races.

Charles Stenholm of Stamford who scored better than a 2-1 victory over A.L. (Dusty) Rhodes of Abilene for the Democratic nomination for 17th district congressman, took Garza County, 578 to 365 over Rhodes in a turn-around from the May primary which saw Rhodes finish 10 percent ahead.

Stenholm won seven out of the nine Garza boxes and the absentee balloting in piling up his victory here.

The final vote in the congressional district was 46,599 for Stenholm to 22,871 for Rhodes. Stenholm will face Republican Bill Fisher, an Abilene attorney, in the November general election.

# Garza oil production slips slight in '77

Garza County's oil production dropped slightly in 1977 from its "biggest year ever" in 1976, according to figures released this week by the Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association.

Production dropped about 43,000 barrels last year from the 7,000,000 barrel high of 1976. The 1977 production was listed as 6,957,359 barrels at a rate of 19,061 barrels a day.

The 1977 production brings total production in Garza County since oil was first discovered in 1926 to 155,874,254 barrels.

Texas crude oil production declined last year for the fifth consecutive year, whereas Garza's had been climbing through 1976 due to high oil prices which made small wells profitable again.

Texas' output last year was just over 1.1 billion barrels, 51 million barrels below 1976 production and more than 162 million below the all-time peak production year of 1972.

Neighboring Scurry County slipped from the state's top county producer (See Garza oil, Page 14)

# Annual 'rain week' big cotton boost

## No stock water yet

If there is one thing almost sure about unpredictable West Texas weather it is that the first week of June is "rain week."

If farmers didn't get enough to plant while 4.92 inches of moisture was officially falling on Post in May, the first six days of June did the trick.

With moisture recorded on five of the first six days, the moisture total for June stood at 3.13 inches here Tuesday.

That brought Post's 1978 moisture to date to 10.49 inches.

Just about everything was included, including a tornado warning for northern Garza County.

That came Monday night between 8 and 9 p.m. when a howling north wind sent the rain dancing in sheets down the streets of Post.

Five minutes later when the storm had passed on, the Lubbock weather bureau warning came via television that a possible tornado would be passing near to Post "within a few minutes."

If that strong wind came from the tornado cloud, the warning was a mite late.

The "rain week" got under way last Wednesday night when moisture blew in with strong winds to leave an official 1.15 of an inch, according to the 8 a.m. Thursday moisture reading.

About 3 a.m. Friday another thunderstorm aroused all but the heavy sleepers here with the worst batch of thunder and lightning in recent years.

That storm produced .59 of (See Rainweek, Page 14)

# Fast start for big recreation program

The 1978 summer recreation program for Garza youth is off to its best start in the last four years with 183 youngsters enrolled through Tuesday, Program Director Joe Giddens reports.

Giddens says registration is still open to any youngster who wants to participate. He said some now on vacations or at church camps plan to enroll when they return.

The gymnastics class had so many enroll that it had to be split into two classes. Cheerleading is being offered for the first time and there are 20 girls in one class and 14 in another learning how to stir up pep and enthusiasm.

Giddens said he didn't expect many youngsters to turn out Tuesday morning in the light rain after a long night of rain, but over 100 were on hand.

Outdoor activities were cancelled, but all three gyms were used for the morning with older youngsters playing games in one and smaller youngsters in another. Many of the activities such as gymnastics, cheerleading and crafts are indoors anyway.

Giddens has a staff of 11, including those who help with swimming classes. He said the summer program this year will continue through July 13, as it started a week after school was out this year instead of the very next week following school.

A group of 16 Southland area youngsters are bussed to Post each morning so they can participate in the program.

# County agent traps weevils over county

The Dispatch is cooperating with Garza Extension Agent Syd Conner on providing Garza cotton farmers with the weekly count of boll weevils in Conner's nine sets of traps around the county and above the cap.

Conner explained that the traps are being checked weekly to determine if weevils are wintering in the county, and if so, where with what kind of cover.

"I've already caught weevils in some of the traps which shows that weevils apparently are over-wintering in the county because there is now no cotton to attract them," Conner explained.

Conner has had his weevil traps out for two weeks.

There are four traps to each set and Conner checks them every Friday.

## 40 years of enthusiasm

Georgie Willson, who has directed the Post High School's vocal music program for the last 22 years, slipped quietly into retirement this week.

After 40 years of teaching music, Georgie has decided to move on to other things, such as private lessons for a few chosen students and a less demanding way of life.

As a "music man" who could teach and inspire youngsters it is obvious that he won't be easy to replace.

What we have most admired about Georgie in the 20 years we've known him is his enthusiasm for his current project, whatever it happened to be. Enthusiasm is certainly an asset to any teacher, but it also is a trait which attracts almost everybody. What a joyful way to live.

We remember some years ago when Georgie came up with the idea — and it was

a good one — for an outdoor natural amphitheatre northwest of Post along the caprock.

It was a proposal with real vision and charm, but Post wasn't ready for it then, and probably isn't now. We need a young adult theatre and music group, as well as the schools, to promote and develop such a project.

The Chamber took a close look at it at the time, but couldn't stir enough interest to get it off the ground.

But Georgie's idea is still valid, still worth developing.

Maybe now that Georgie has stepped from an 8 to 5 busy-busy existence, he can find some time to spark the community to new undertakings with his enthusiasm.

We can't let Georgie, his ability and his enthusiasm go to waste.

## Story hour's importance

The Post Public Library this week launched a two-hour summer story hour each afternoon Mondays through Fridays for youngsters age four through nine.

This is not just a kid-sitting project, or a pass-the-time affair. It's probably the most important educational offering of the summer to youngsters in this age group and parents should understand its importance.

The field of knowledge is open wide to the boy and girl who can read — and especially those who enjoy reading.

A story hour is an investment in the reading process.

It opens the eyes of youngsters to what they can find within the pages of a book. It takes books out of the classroom and makes

them companions of the young.

The Dispatch has said repeatedly that one of the prime responsibilities of every parent is to encourage their sons and daughters to read.

The encouragement can come in many ways. Certainly forced reading is no answer. But a story hour is an introduction to that world of books.

Encourage your child to attend. Encourage the youngster to read for fun and enjoyment. Teach your kids to enjoy reading — even if you've never learned how yourself.

The basis of an education is one's ability to read. It's so important don't let your children neglect it.

## A good one retires

Tanner has been covering the West Texas scene for 38 years which means his "connection" goes both ways. He knows the people — and the people know him.

The Lubbock Avalanche-Journal has lost another "connection" to the West Texas area with the announcement of the retirement of Tanner Lane.

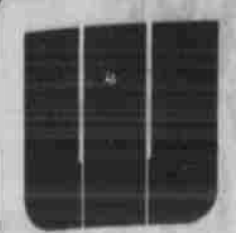

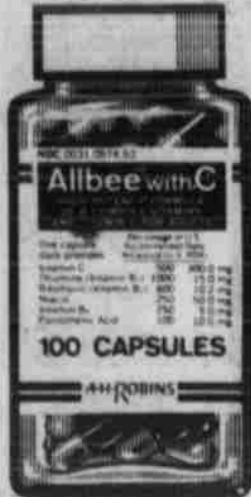

## Strawberries are on food budget list

COLLEGE STATION — Budget items at Texas grocery markets include eggs, pineapple, strawberries, lettuce, squash, some dairy and canned or frozen products.

Canned and frozen economy buys include nonfat dry milk, tuna, cling peaches, fruit cocktail and frozen potato products, according to Mrs. Gwendolyn Clyatt, a consumer marketing information specialist.

Mrs. Clyatt is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A & M University System.

Her summary of food prices and quality includes the following:

**FRESH VEGETABLES** — Economy buys include lettuce, softshell squash, cucumbers, green peppers, radishes, green onions, carrots and corn.

Also, dry onions and potatoes are worth considering.

**FRESH FRUITS** — Best buys are pineapple and strawberries.

Watermelons and cantaloupes

prices are still on the "high side," along with peach prices.

**POULTRY** — Eggs provide high-quality protein at low prices. Higher prices are the word for fryer chickens, however.

**DAIRY** — Advertised specials appear on milk, yogurt, sour cream, cottage cheese and mild cheddar cheese.

**BEEF** — Best values include chuck roast and steak, generally, along with rib and round steak and beef liver.

Ground beef prices are considerably higher, but since there is no waste, the cost-per-serving is still a good value.

**PORK** — Specials are scarce. Values appear mostly on chops and sometimes on loin-end roast and liver.

**Consumer Watchwords** — Red-meat prices are higher, so when using beef or pork, plan meals around their less-expensive cuts. Also combine meat with low-cost rice or pasta — to stretch the amount of meat.

# White Sox sock way into Babe Ruth loop lead

## 20 hits leave them unbeaten in 2 starts

The White Sox pounded out 20 hits to win their first two starts last week in 1978 Babe Ruth League play and move into first place in the current standings.

Both games scheduled for Tuesday night were postponed because of very wet grounds.

The Sox defeated the Cubs 8 to 6 last Thursday night in the league inaugural and then pounded out a dozen hits Saturday night for an 11 to 10 squeaker over the Braves.

In the second game, the Sox were breezing along with a 6 to 1 lead when the Braves when a rash of five Sox errors opened the scoring gates to the Braves for an eight-run sixth inning.

That gave the Braves a 9 to 6 lead.

But the White Sox rallied in the bottom of the seventh, trailing 10 to 6, to score five times on four hits and two walks to win the game with only one out.

Pitcher Mark Holly won the game at the plate instead of on the mound. His double scored the winning run in that seventh inning rally. It was his third double in three official trips. He also walked twice.

Shortstop Marvin Taylor and First sacker Marvin Wynn each got a pair of hits in the victory over the Braves with Taylor scoring twice and Wynn three times.

Catcher Adolpho Varela got two hits for the Braves and also got aboard twice on Sox errors.

The Sox biggest inning was a five-run burst in the third on four hits and an error, the big blow being a triple by Catcher Danny Wright.

The Braves went into Saturday night's close loss to the White Sox tied for first after a 16 to 4 win over the Indians Thursday night.

In that one it was a tight 5-4 game until the Braves went to bat in the top of the sixth and scored 11 times on only one hit. Ten walks did the damage as two Indian pitchers had all kinds of trouble finding the plate.

Actually the Braves managed only four hits off three Indian pitchers. Ronnie Price got half of those for the winners, a single and a double.

Lance Dunn went the route for the winners to gain

the victory.

The Cubs came back Saturday night to score an 11 to 7 win over the Indians by breaking open a tight game with three runs in the sixth and four more in the seventh.

The Indians scored twice in the bottom of the seventh and had the bases loaded after six walks, but Pitcher Bryan Taylor fled to center to end the game.

# Cotton having banner year with exports

MEMPHIS — U.S. cotton exports are up a banner year, with markets this season and groundwork is laid to keep the momentum going into 1979.

Exports to the National Council's board of directors here today indicated this season's total commitments hit 6.4 million bales on May 21. Shipments moving actual exports by the end are expected to be about 5.3 million bales. Commitments will be set over to next season. In addition, outstanding for next marketing have already reached 1.1 million.

David C. Hull, Council operations director, factors behind this strong exports in aggressive selling by exporters, adequate supply, and competitive prices. He also cited a series of development activities by Cotton Council International (CCI) which added to the thrust. Among activities designed was a Cotton Belt program for representatives from the People's Republic of China. This led to a trade team to China in May, and Hull said the exchange has a favorable influence on U.S. cotton sales to PRC.

A follow-up, six representatives of the China Textile Import and Export Corporation — who all of the PRC's raw imports — will be to visit the Cotton Belt this fall. Also scheduled separate Cotton Belt tours for a group of cotton buyers from Bangladesh. In addition, two trade missions to Europe and two to East this fall.

Recent visits by the Cotton Council were cited as an important factor in the bid for foreign cotton. James T. Hazel, Council promotion director, pointed out that the tour not only was a peg for getting promotion underway for U.S. overseas but also to establish relationships in the textile industry and foreign government.

U.S. representatives, Maid of Cotton farmer also reported highlights of her recent tour of Europe to the Far East.

This season's strong exports are a key factor in the 8-cent rise in prices since early May, Council Economic Bowling said. The price increase is much-needed income in farm income. It is not expected in serious market unless the price gap widens between its major synthetic competitors.

This season's domestic production expected to be 6.5 million bales. The current probably equal 11.9 million bales.

During the 1978-79 season, Bowling said a Service indicated production range from 11.5 million to 12.1 million bales. He is promising for reasonable close to season's level, and consumption between 7 million bales. He develops, it could be somewhat lower than the 5.4 million bales projected for next season.

economist, and Dr. Phillip Wakelyn, staff technology manager, said the final standard — expected to be published earlier this year — has been delayed pending a review by the President's economic advisors of its inflationary aspect. The review followed a series of meetings and communications by Council and

industry leaders with key Administration officials. While the Occupational Safety and Health Administration has estimated the capital cost of its draft final standard at \$625 million compared with \$2.7 billion for the standard it initially proposed, Council staff members questioned the figures.

They said the current proposal's lower cost is partially explained by liberalized exposure limits in some work areas. OSHA's initial proposal specified a cotton dust exposure limit of 0.2 milligrams in all work areas in every industry sector. In contrast, the draft final standard calls for textile mill exposure limits

of 0.2 only in yarn production areas; 0.75 for weaving; and 0.5 for all non-textile industries except ginning.

Council staff members noted that capital cost at the textile mill level would run

\$1.1 billion in yarn production alone. This raises doubts concerning OSHA's \$625 million estimate for all industry sectors. Indications are the biggest economic impact under the draft final standard would fall on

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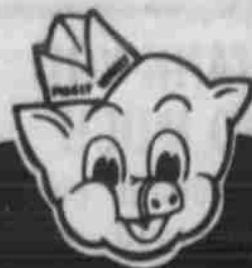

**Texas farm land up 11 percent in year**  
 COLLEGE STATION, — The value of Texas farmland went up to 11 percent for the year ending Feb. 1, slightly outdistancing the nationwide increase of nine percent.  
 The increase raised the national average from \$450 to \$490 per acre, noted Dr. William E. Black, economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, citing figures from a U.S. Department of Agriculture report.  
 "Although the rate of increase has slowed, land markets still can generally be called strong," said Black.  
 While Texas surpassed the national average increase, a number of states showed an even greater increase in farmland values. Wisconsin had the steepest gain, 18 percent, followed by South Dakota, 17 percent; Maryland, 16 percent; Louisiana and Mississippi, 15 percent; Missouri, 14 percent; California, Ohio and Kentucky, 13 percent; and Minnesota, Indiana, Tennessee, Michigan, Pennsylvania and Delaware, 12 percent.  
 Nebraska was the only state showing a decline in farmland values for the year, down four percent. Increases of three and four percent were common in the Southwest, Southeast and Northeast.  
 Texas farmland is currently valued at \$316 an acre compared to \$285 in February, 1977, and \$195 in February, 1976 pointed out Black.  
 States with the highest farmland values at this time are New Jersey, \$2,057 per acre; Connecticut, \$1,962 and Rhode Island, \$1,939. New Mexico and Nevada farmland is currently valued under \$100 per acre.

 Congressman Omar Burleson announced the approval of a \$32,820 community services administration grant to the South Plains Community Action Association, Inc., with headquarters at Levelland.  
 The counties served are Garza, Lynn, Bailey, Cochran, Hockley, Lamb, Terry and Yoakum.
