Canyon sites on registry

Congressman Omar Benson announced over the weekend that Post-Canyon sites in Cooper Canyon of Garza County have been nominated to the National Register of Historical Places. The National Register is the official list of the nation's cultural resources worthy of preservation.

These properties must have an established set of criteria and receive the approval of the Secretary of the Interior to be included in the National Register.

The Garza County Social Service Center (formerly the 4-H building) has taken on a modern look with space for 15 offices.

The middle weight steer, weighing 1125, brought Randy a blue ribbon and premium prize money of \$766.80. Approximately 800 entries were in the steer show.

Following the sale, the

steers are sent to the same slaughtering house and carcasses are judged by USDA specifications and sent to a computer for the best average, thus the naming of the Champion Carcass.

With this honor goes a \$100 savings bond, \$750 in prize money, a silver and gold belt buckle and a certificate of recognition.

Randy was accompanied to the fair by his dad, Syd Conner.

\$214,000 is low bid for rental duplexes

Low bidder for five new rental duplexes for the Post Community Housing Association, Inc., last Thursday afternoon was the Hoover Construction Co., of Burnet, Tx.

The low bid was 214,000. Two bids were submitted at the bid opening in the bank community room.

Other bid submitted was from Bill Marshall of Lubbock for \$274,318.

Bill Stewart of Tahoka, district FmHA administrator, is sending the low bid to the state FmHA office in Waco for loan consideration.

If the loan is approved, a

construction contract will be signed. The housing association here, a non-profit corporation, then would pay back the construction loan to the federal government.

The association has seven duplexes for 14 rental units at Avenue S and 13th Street. They have been completely occupied since completed two years ago.

The new units will be built on the same site.

20 days in jail on drug charge

One of Robinson's last community service endeavors was to report bank employees here as 100 percent in the current United Fund drive. He has headed the bank employees division for the past two years and reported them 100 percent each time.

Debbie, Post's first regular mail-woman, also heads the postal employees division of the United Fund drive.

What we're thankful for

Thanksgiving undoubtedly is America's own No. 1 holiday, Christmas being a world-wide holiday — for the Christian world, that is.

Down through the years we've lost the real meaning of Thanksgiving just as many of us are losing the true meaning of Christmas.

Today Thanksgiving means the bringing together of families from far and wide around a bountiful table overloaded with food.

It's also a football holiday, providing something for over-eaters to contemplate on a TV screen while stretched out on the couch more or less in a gastronomical stupor.

But putting these aspects of the holiday aside, Thanksgiving as originally conceived was a time to break bread together and give thanks to God for enabling the original colony of pilgrims to reap enough from the soil to provide for a harsh winter ahead.

We have come a very long way from that beginning.

But, still, if we look about us we can find much to be thankful for right here in this computerized age of space and atomic knowledge.

You can sit down in a few moments and make your own list. Here is ours:

We're thankful to live in a small town which is full of friendliness and good cheer, and we know each other and share together our troubles as well as our joys.

We're thankful the air here is clean and one can walk the streets alone at night without fear.

We're thankful our town has its head screwed on straight and is full of folks who

constantly strive to make life better. People who in the last year alone have through their efforts brought us a new community center, a new senior citizens center and a trained unit of emergency medical technicians, and who support an excellent school system.

We are thankful, finally, that we live in a hard but beautiful land. This adds zest to living, natures natural friendliness to strangers, and cements our bonds to continue to strive for something better together.

We are thankful for adversity, too. In facing it, we are strengthened. And we can always find a full measure of adversity here.

An airport example

All are towns can take a lesson from Floydada about airport neglect. Maybe neglect is too harsh a word, maybe we should say lack of necessary maintenance.

The city council there has decided to call a public meeting to see what taxpayers think about spending \$29,000 for runway repairs. The council thinks the expenditure may be too much for the gain.

That 3,600 foot long runway is still being used, but is in poor condition.

Post is among the towns that needs to pay close attention to airport maintenance.

It's very easy to let things go until minor repairs will no longer suffice and major repairs must be made if the airport is to remain open.

Then the choice is shut it down in the air age — and become bypassed from above — or ante up big with taxpayers' dollars.

The Dispatch believes the city council here tries to keep abreast of airport needs, of which there are current ones. But it had better stay on its toes.
