"I haven't been scratched, except a small piece of shrapnel hit my thumb and knocked the hole off—although the bullets were flying thick and fast. And don't ever let anyone tell you they are not afraid in something like this because you are scared as hell.

"It gets cold here sometime but we have warm boots and parkas so we keep plenty warm. I know it's hot there at home, but I would like to be there just the same.

"If you want to send me a package, it must not weigh over five pounds and not be larger than a shoe box and must be inspected at the post office before it is sent.

"I think I have received all your mail up to May 30th. I am hoping for Sergeant's stripes soon."

In a recent week more than 9,000 soldiers sent nearly \$1,000,000, in amounts of \$10 or more, with no maximum limit. Money may be transmitted to an individual payee, or to a bank. The process is speedy and sure. If a soldier desires to do so, he may also purchase war bonds by this method.

### ROCKING CHAIR PATRIOTS

Freedom to us in this country, is our greatest heritage—likewise, its preservation is our gravest responsibility.

We have used the freedom our men are fighting to perpetuate, as an instrument to avoid discomfort some of us went out on strike in vital defense work because we did not get total wage increases demanded. Hundreds of thousands of us struck against government because we didn't think we were paid enough to dig coal with which to win the war. We actually have had the gall to wave the American flag over such acts, the same flag under which our troops are dying in every corner of the world.

Many of us, in our selfishness, cheer at proposals for our government to run the show after the war, just like other governments have been running the show in Europe. We cheer because we think we can get more handouts from government. Apparently, after the war, we don't intend to stand up to wave Old Glory—we plan to do it sitting down in an easy chair.

This abuse of freedom must end somewhere, or there won't be any freedom to abuse. Our employing, tax-paying enterprises must be preserved as private endeavors. Men returning from war must be saved the right to go back to work under private employment as free citizens. Unless the right

### Aid to Enemy

"Any American who willfully neglects to pay his taxes on time or to invest every cent he can in War Bonds is surely giving aid and comfort to the enemy. . . . We have a job to do and we are all called for service to our country. Our dollars are called to service too. Let us all ask ourselves, 'Shall we be more tender with our dollars than with the lives of our sons?' " — Secretary Morgenthau.

The number of dead and missing men in the American merchant marine has risen to more than 4600. The service still remains the most dangerous of all, in point of casualties.

## Our Merchant Marine

Spurred by Atlantic competition and the Gold Rush of '49, Americans developed the Clipper, with sharper bows, slimmer lines, loftier spars and a great spread of canvas. Old Salts said the new-type ship would capsize.



In the same year, the American Clipper 'Oriental' broke into Britain's Tea Trade, running from Hong Kong to London in 91 days, a record which was followed, by other speedy voyages.



The Red Jacket, Flying Cloud, Sovereign of the Seas, and Stagbound, will sail forever in our history, while Donald McKay's Lightning holds the all-time record for a days run—436 nautical miles—faster than most steamers of today.

The grandest ships and the greatest sailors—this was America's achievement in the age of the Glorious Clippers!

The Clipper Ship, Sea Witch sailed from New York to San Francisco (1850) arriving in 97 days instead of the customary 150! The 'Glorious Clippers' had arrived! Over 90,000 men made the trip in one year.

In California, eggs were 50 cents each, a thin slice of ham cost a dollar.



American shipyards were deluged with orders and produced a steady stream of the noblest and fastest sailing ships of all time.



To-day, the largest American Merchant Marine in history cuts the oceans, while present programs promise by 1944, a Merchant Marine almost equal to the rest of the world's combined!

### THE ETERNAL SOLDIER

The chief steward on an American merchant ship, carrying 2300 troops from an East Coast port to Australia carefully computed the amount of food he would need for the voyage. He discovered after a few days that the supply was diminishing at an alarming rate. His kitchens were feeding 4000 men at each meal. After consultation with the commanding officer, a check was made. It was discovered that the men had so little exercise room they became "repeaters" to save going back to their bunks. Some printers were enlisted from the men aboard, "Joe's Lunch" tickets were issued to each man and punched at each meal. The food supply lasted.

The maker's statements are backed by the War Production Board, which lends considerable credence to his assertion. It isn't illegitimate of course, for grown people to divert baby foods to their own use, but it's highly unpatriotic—at a time when the national birth rate is increasing sharply and food makers face restricted output for various good reasons. Don't you think it would be the noble thing to do, Mr. and Mrs. Scurry County, to do your part in helping save baby food for babies?

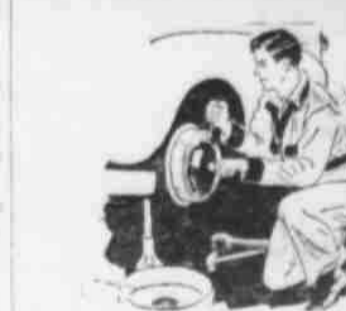
### Cadet Nurse Corps Organized

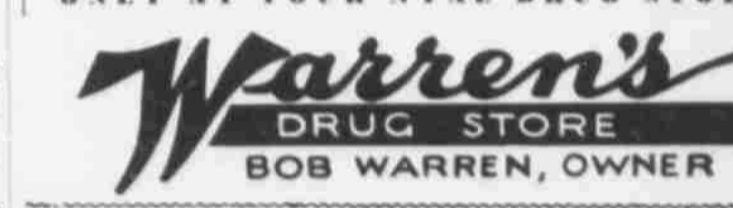

**Certificate For Slaughtering**

A livestock owner who buys custom slaughtering must, after July 1, sign a certificate giving his address, the slaughter permit number, the kind and number of livestock killed and the total dressed and live weight. This certificate must also be signed by the custom slaughterer.

**Ice Boxes For Civilians**

A total of 239,575 ice boxes are to be produced in the next three months for civilian use, according to a new order of WPB. Despite limited factory capacities and scarcity of materials, the production rate is expected to reach about 75,000 units a month.

**Gas And Tires For Farm Machines**

To assist grain farmers in harvesting 1943 crops, the War Food Administration has made arrangements with ODT and OPA to assure owners of custom-operated machinery sufficient gasoline and tires to run their equipment, especially itinerant combine operators who will soon be working in the wheat harvest.

**'Hitler's Children' At Garza Theatre Sunday - Monday**

Presenting a vivid picture of what a Hitler victory would mean to an enslaved world, "Hitler's Children," showing Saturday night 11:30, Sunday and Monday at the Garza, features Tim Holt, Bonita Granville and Kent Smith in a daring, highly dramatic and though-provoking expose, the basis of which is an epic love story, menaced by official frustration and climaxed with a double tragic sacrifice.

The unusual film is based on the sensational best-seller, "Education for Death," by Gregor Ziemer, who for ten years headed the American Colony School in Berlin, saw the mad growth of Nazi teachings among Germany's young people and came to the United States to tell what he saw.

Kent Smith portrays Ziemer's own school-master part in the picture, with Holt as a young German-American who succumbs to the Nazi beliefs and Miss Granville as Smith's pupil who later becomes his assistant, only to be sent to a labor camp because of her German parentage.

Attempting to find the girl and get her out of the country, Smith runs into the opposition of Holt, who as a Gestapo officer is trying to conceal his basic affection for Miss Granville under the stern cloak of what he believes to be his duty to the state. Inwardly both young people are rebels against the Nazi doctrines, but outwardly they hide their feelings for one another until a crisis arises that forces Holt to punish the girl.

Then he too goes berserk and makes a futile but courageous attempt to set her free, knowing full well what the inevitable consequences will be. The ensuing climax, with both young people endeavoring to enlighten their contemporaries on their "education for death," is said to constitute one of the most graphic film scenes of recent years.

Bringing as it does the first authentic revelations of Nazi teachings to the screen, "Hitler's Children" shows those teachings for what they are, an inhuman program for enslaving the rest of the world under a German yoke, for ruthlessly breeding legions of illegitimate babies, for killing off all who do not fit into the Nazi scheme of things.

Featured also are Otto Kruger, as an S. S. Chief and H. B. Warner as a fearless churchman.

**U. S. Seamen Are Best Paid In The World**

The American merchant seaman, now delivering the bulk of war materials to the global battlefronts, is the best paid in the world. While at sea, an able-bodied seaman receives a minimum of \$100 a month, plus a bonus of 100% of his base pay and overtime. In addition, he gets \$5 for each day his vessel is in one of the major war zones, such as on the Murmansk run, the South Pacific or in the Mediterranean. Each time his ship is under attack in port, he receives a bonus of \$125.

If any American seaman is captured by the enemy, his wages continue for the full time that he is interned. If he loses his life, his beneficiaries receive \$5000 insurance for which the seaman has paid no premium. If he suffers disability, he receives compensation measured by the extent of his injuries.

If his ship is lost at sea, the wages and bonuses continue until he has been landed at an American port. Furthermore, the government pays for the loss of his personal belongings up to \$500. If he is a navigation officer owning a sextant, the government will pay him \$100 for loss of the instrument and another \$50 for loss of other navigation gear.

Any distressed seaman arriving in an American port may appeal immediately to the United Seamen's Service for food, clothing, shelter or loans of money. He may spend all the time he needs in rest homes specially planned for recuperation. His nationality doesn't matter so long as he is a seaman from one of the United Nations countries.

In spite of those advantageous conditions, there still is a shortage of qualified men to man the ships being turned out at such a remarkable rate. The training schools are unable to keep pace with the program which demands about 200 additional men each day to man the five ships delivered daily for service, according to the American Merchant Marine Institute. Deck officers, marine engineers, radio operators, cooks and bakers are particularly in demand.

**Pfc. Jack Samson Enlists His Dog In Dogs For Defense**

Pfc. Jack Samson of Camp Hood, Texas, has enlisted his dog, Pepper, in the Dogs for Defense, Inc., and has paid his entrance fee into the War Dog Fund.

If dogs are not the breed nor the age to join the Waags, owners may enlist them in the Dogs for Defense, Inc. by listing them with the state representative in Fort Worth. Owners are supposed to let them in the rank or rating of the man in service for whom he is enlisted.

All enlistments can be made to War Dog Fund, in care of H. D. Nurenborg, Burk Burnett Bldg., Fort Worth, Texas. After enlisting you will receive a certificate denoting your dog's rank in the Dogs for Defense branch of the service, and a tag for your dog's collar, to show that he is a member.

If you have friends who own "pets" and who want to enlist them they may get in touch with Mr. Nurenborg at the Fort Worth address.

Austin, July 20—Deficit in the state's general fund today amounted to \$21,722,517 compared to \$22,500,084 a month ago, the Treasury department announced in issuing a call for the payment of \$2,067,641 in warrants through Nov. 18, 1942.

The general fund deficit has declined \$7,319,593 in the last year, dropping from \$29,042,111, the department said.
