UNIFICATION IS DEFEATED

By A Majority So Overwhelming That Its Proponents Are Vociferously Silent

Below is given the full vote in the 45 Conferences in the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, on Unification. The vote has been carefully compiled from American Associated Press reports, and compared with reports published in the Christian Advocate, the general organ of the Southern Church.

There was a slight difference in a few Conferences and in such cases we corrected the vote to conform to the vote in the Nashville Christian Advocate, believing that this report is correct, because the report of the Secretary of each Conference, giving the vote, is sent direct to Lamar & Barton, publishers of the Advocate. We therefore consider this report as correct and official.

Unification failed by 1,949 votes. We suggest that every Methodist family in Callahan County place this report in their scrap book, as it is an official report of the first election ever held by our Church on Unification, and will be an important item in the future history of our Church. —Editor The Star.

CONFEDERATE HALF DOLLAR

To Be Sold At Auction At The Court House Monday Night Confederate Souvenir

Prior to the introduction of Mr. Homer D. Wade the principal speaker at Monday night's mass meeting at the Court House, Colonel George Wolsey Symonds, Commander of Albert Sidney Johnston Camp, No. 556, United Confederate Veterans, will sell at auction, to the highest bidder, for the benefit of the Stone Mountain Confederate Memorial Association, a Silver Confederate Half Dollar.

To aid in the completion of this massive memorial, the United States Government has had coined at the Federal Mint in Philadelphia, replicas of the Confederate Silver Half Dollar, four only of which were coined in England, just before the removal of the Confederate Government from Montgomery, Alabama, to Richmond, Virginia.

The last estimate of the cotton crop, based on ginner's reports to December 1st, places the 1925 crop at 15,600,000 bales. The report knocks off \$5.00 per bale on the price of cotton.

Mrs. Ferguson flatly refuses to call a special session of the Legislature. So, Speaker Satterwhite and Representative T. K. Irwin, of Dallas, who seem to be the only two members that are anxious to hold it, can go ahead and hold their session without hope of fee or reward.

Governor Miriam A. Ferguson refuses to call a special session of the Legislature, as demanded by some forty odd members. Mrs. Ferguson says that there is no necessity for a special session.

We have all along contended that there is no special necessity for a special session, and we are glad that Mrs. Ferguson has refused to be bluffed into doing something that she believed to be an unnecessary and useless expense on the taxpayers.

The State Constitution of Texas gives power to the Governor alone to call a special session of the Legislature. That instrument defines the duties and powers of the Legislative, Executive and Judicial Departments of the State Government, and no department has any right to interfere with or assume any duties assigned to other departments.

If this interpretation is correct, then the Legislature has no power to enact a law authorizing any other person or persons to call a special session of the Legislature. If the Legislature has no authority to pass a law authorizing the Speaker to call a special session of the House of Representatives, then no succeeding Legislature will have any constitutional authority to appropriate money to pay them.

Boiled down then, it would seem that any special session called by any other than the Governor, is illegal and all its acts would be void.

If any one had any doubts about the real object of Speaker Satterwhite in calling a Special Session of the House of Representatives, that interview given out in Saint Louis, Monday of last week, shows his object is to impeach Mrs. Ferguson.

He explained that Mrs. Ferguson will be permitted to serve out her term, but he wants to show to the people of Texas that Jim Ferguson is the real Governor! So the cloven foot is disclosed at last. The real object is not in the interest of the

public, but to discredit Mrs. Ferguson in the eyes of the people.

We had an idea they would let the cat out of the bag before long, and it is a political cat, or, in plain English, political bunk, and they wanted to let it loose at the expense of the taxpayers.

Now the boys will have to pay their own expenses for holding a special session, and with little or no prospect of unloading that expense on the State by some subsequent Legislature.

Some prohibition leaders are criticizing President Coolidge because of lax enforcement of the prohibition law.

These criticisms are unjust and unfair, because, so far as we can see, the President is making an honest effort to enforce the Volstead Act. The trouble with the Wayne B. Wheelers and the Atticus Webbs is: that they cannot see or discuss anything but Prohibition. Reason: Their living depends upon agitation of the Prohibition question.

They think the President and all Governors should give their entire time to enforcing liquor laws.

A Kansas preacher says that the only Devil that exists is a man-made Devil, to scare the people, in order to keep them under subjection to the Church.

According to this kind of reasoning one can show that the only God is a man-made God; that there is no heaven, hell nor hereafter.

No doubt that this preacher is a convert to Scopes' monkey creed, for that is what belief in the animal ancestry of man leads to. If religion is losing the respect of mankind, as some claim, such preaching as this is responsible for it; but all the preaching of infidelity in or out of the pulpit, cannot destroy the Christian religion.

All who believe in the teaching of such preaching as this, should study the warnings in God's Own Book, especially Isaiah 5:20-21: "Woe unto them that call evil good. Woe unto them who are wise in their own conceit," etc. Read the full text in the two verses

The Christian religion is so interwoven with the foundation and the upbuilding of our Government that one cannot be injured without injury to both. MANY CLAIMANTS FOR OLD ESTATES

Some Seek Ancestors' Property, Others Money.

New York.—The recent court action brought in Washington, in an effort to clear the title of an inch-and-a-half strip of land held by an asylum for 58 years is only one of a series of lawsuits involving old estates and wills made scores of years ago.

A suit which bore striking similarity to this and which was likewise brought up in the nation's capital about a year ago involved a claim for property in Maryland and the District of Columbia worth hundreds of millions of dollars. Mrs. Nellie Drake Pascoe, the plaintiff, said that just before her father died he told her of the possibility of her becoming immensely wealthy and gave her documents showing that what are now the District of Columbia and Prince George's county were at one time the property of James Anthony Drane II, who came to America with Lord Baltimore's party in 1634.

Acresage Not Known.

Drane, according to one of the papers, bought land in the neighborhood of Beltsville, Md., and settled in Prince George's county. How many acres this property included is not definitely known, but it was supposed to take in part of Washington, and it also extended five miles north and ten miles west. Although no information exists that would throw any light on just how the land got out of Drane's possession, it is believed by the claimant that "squatters" took it.

Although Washington has had its share of such cases, it cannot compare with New York city as the claimants' paradise. It is estimated that at least one suit is brought every year in an effort to recover old Manhattan estates. In July, 1924, a New Jersey woman, eighty-two years old, announced that she intended to try to obtain a portion of the land supposed to have been left by Anneke Jans Bogardus. This myth, like many others of its kind, originated in the tales that ancient estates remain unsettled on Manhattan island.

The myth, however, had its inception in real history, for Anneke Jans inherited the land from her first husband, Roelo Jans, who purchased it in 1636. According to this story, she left the property under a 99-year lease to its occupants, with a clause that it would revert to her heirs when the period expired. A will is supposed to have been made, but actually the property was transferred to the governor of the province, and later Queen Anne presented it to Trinity church.

Other Claimants.

Two more claimants for Manhattan land were lured in February of the same year, when a woman in the South wrote to E. L. Brooks, assistant solicitor of the Title Guarantee and Trust company, in regard to ten acres, now densely populated, which she thought she had a right to claim. The other claim was concerned with an area in Greenwich village, including Washington square.

Other ancient lawsuits based, however, on stronger evidence, such as a deed or will, have lately been fought and won, after many years of litigation costing thousands or millions of dollars. In December last, for instance, a woman at eighty-three won a will fight extending over thirty-eight years by finally establishing her rights as legitimate daughter of George M. Chapman, who died in 1887.

Another aged woman early this year obtained, at the age of sixty-six and after waiting near 15 years, \$5,242 left her by an aunt. The money had been placed in a bank to her credit, but it was brought out at the trial that the niece had not known of the deposit or of the existence of the book among her aunt's effects.

Explorer Discovers New Race in Western Siberia

Irkutsk, Siberia.—Prof. B. N. Gorodkoff, Russian explorer, who has traversed western Siberia, reports the discovery of a hitherto unknown race on the River Pora.

Altogether Professor Gorodkoff has discovered five clans containing 600 people. The local Samoyeds call the tribe "Pyan Ha Sovo," which means "forest people," while in their own language the tribe call themselves "Neshen," which means "men."

Their language is entirely different from that of any of the other nationalities populating western Siberia. The Neshen people differ also from their samoyed neighbors by their dark hair and complexion. They have no intercourse with their neighbors and very few of them engage in fishing and hunting beyond the borders of their own little country.

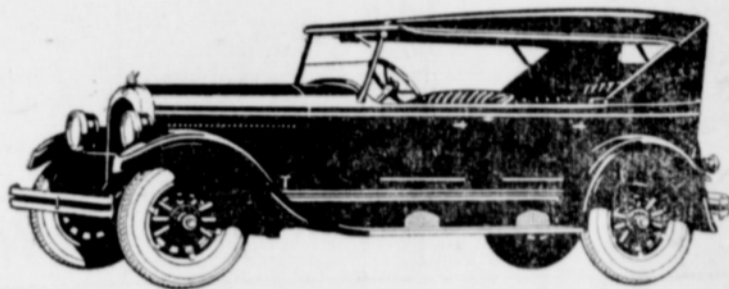

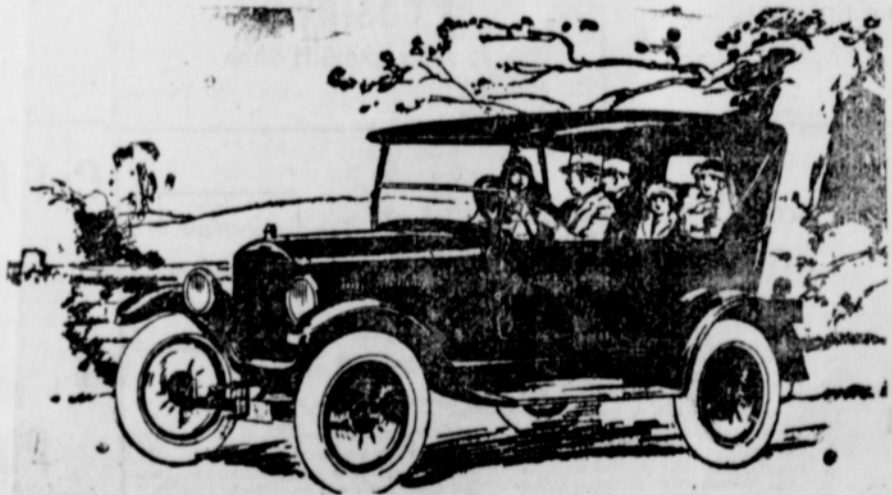
