

Mills Appointed to Fill Vacancy

The Post City Council appointed Larry Mills to replace Bill Pool on the council, following Pool's resignation to accept the city manager position at Monday night's regular session.

Mills, who garnered the next largest number of votes following Jim Jackson in last April's election, was next in line to be offered the position after Jackson had declined to serve due to business interests.

The council also voted to annex U. S. Hwy. 380 to the airport and the airport, following the motion by council member Jack Ault.

"If we are going to put money in that airport," he

explained, "then we ought to have control over the facility and the land should be part of the city."

The decision on both issues was unanimous.

The annexation does not include property on either side of U. S. Hwy. 380, but to fulfill legal requirements to annex the airport, the highway was included in the annexation.

Budget Time

Studying ways to increase revenues without increasing taxes, the council reviewed options on water, sewer and sanitation rates.

Mayor Giles McCrary pointed out that Post has operated with the same

water rates since 1966 and council member Maxine Earl showed a comparison to other West Texas cities with Post on the bottom in rates of all city services.

Water rate changes were not decided, but the council voted to increase sanitation service fees to residential and commercial users outside of the city limits.

Starting in October, the new rates for non-city residents will be \$10, up from \$5 and commercial will be \$30, up from \$15 per month.

The council also approved a policy which establishes city rights to set or refuse service outside of the city limits based on recommen-

dations by the staff.

Sanitation fees for city residents will be increased \$1 per month from \$3.25 to \$4.25 and the commercial service will go up \$3 to \$12.75 per month.

The mayor pointed out that the sanitation service loses \$71,000 per year, with the cost running at \$139,500 and revenues of \$68,000.

"Taxpayers have been subsidizing this service and we ought to try to bring the fees a little closer to paying for the services," he explained.

The council also authorized Mike Sanchez to enforce trash dumping in alleyways by warning resi-

dents and preparing documentation for possible legal action.

"There are folks who just throw their trash over the fence and don't seem to make any attempt to use the dumpster," the mayor explained.

The council went on to approve new rates for sewer at \$2 per resident including each apartment unit and \$4 for commercial. Restaurants, motels and schools will be evaluated for special sewer rates to be decided later.

Other sewer rate increases approved were service stations to \$15, car wash outlets to \$20, industrial minimum of \$25 and negotiated and processing plants at \$25 per month.

Sanchez explained to the council the five year plan for replacing water lines and extension of water mains. The council approved a budget item of \$40,000 per year, with work to begin on the highest priority items in October.

A public hearing to review the Energas rate hike request has been set for September 10 at the regular meeting.

In other action, the council approved a request by the Caprock Cultural Association to set aside \$2,500 of the motel occupancy tax for the development of the arts program in Post.

Representing the association were Bryan Williams III, Joann Mock, Geraldine Butler, Inez Hartel with council member Maxine Earl explaining the goals of the association.

The funds from the motel occupancy tax are designated by state law to be used for the promotion of arts and tourism.

The association plans to provide instruction on arts and to promote Post and the Caprock as a place for visiting artists in addition to programs of drama and music.

The county commissioners had previously approved \$2,500 in matching funds, which gives the association the avenue to apply for recognition with the Texas Commission on the Arts.

Two local insurance agents presented bids for liability insurance for city property, but after a lengthy discussion, council tabled the matter until September 10 in order to provide detailed evaluations and specific bid requirements.

Harold Lucas presented proposals which he said could not be firm due to lack of information on what the city needed or wanted for coverage.

Tom Power presented a firm bid, but his bid nor Lucas' included the two old theater buildings which were recently donated to the city.

Attending the four and one-half hour meeting were Mayor Giles McCrary, council members, Bill Pool, Weaver McKamie, Jack Ault, Lewis Holly and Maxine Earl, along with city staff members Wanda Wilkerson, Mike Sanchez and Wyvonne Kennedy.

Justiceburg Dam Site Approved

The Texas Water Commission granted to Lubbock the permit to build the Justiceburg dam in a unanimous decision Monday evening in Austin.

The decision followed the recommendation of Texas Water Commission Hearing Examiner Jim Rourke's to approve the permit.

Attorneys for opponents to the dam site presented arguments that Rourke had not been on the case long enough, but the hearing examiner demonstrated to the satisfaction of the commissioners that the case had been thoroughly researched and reviewed.

The hearing started at 4:39 p. m. and concluded at 7 p. m.

Attending from Lubbock were the city council and Mayor Alan Henry as well as State Senator John Montford.

Lewis Earl, Post Chamber of Commerce manager, was also at the meeting.

Members of the Texas Water Commission are chairman Paul Hopkins, Ralph Roming and Lee M. Biggert.

Opponents are expected to move for a rehearing, which is expected to be denied by the commission.

Litigation from the opponents would then be filed in district court and Lubbock officials have said the ensuing legal snarl could take up to five years.

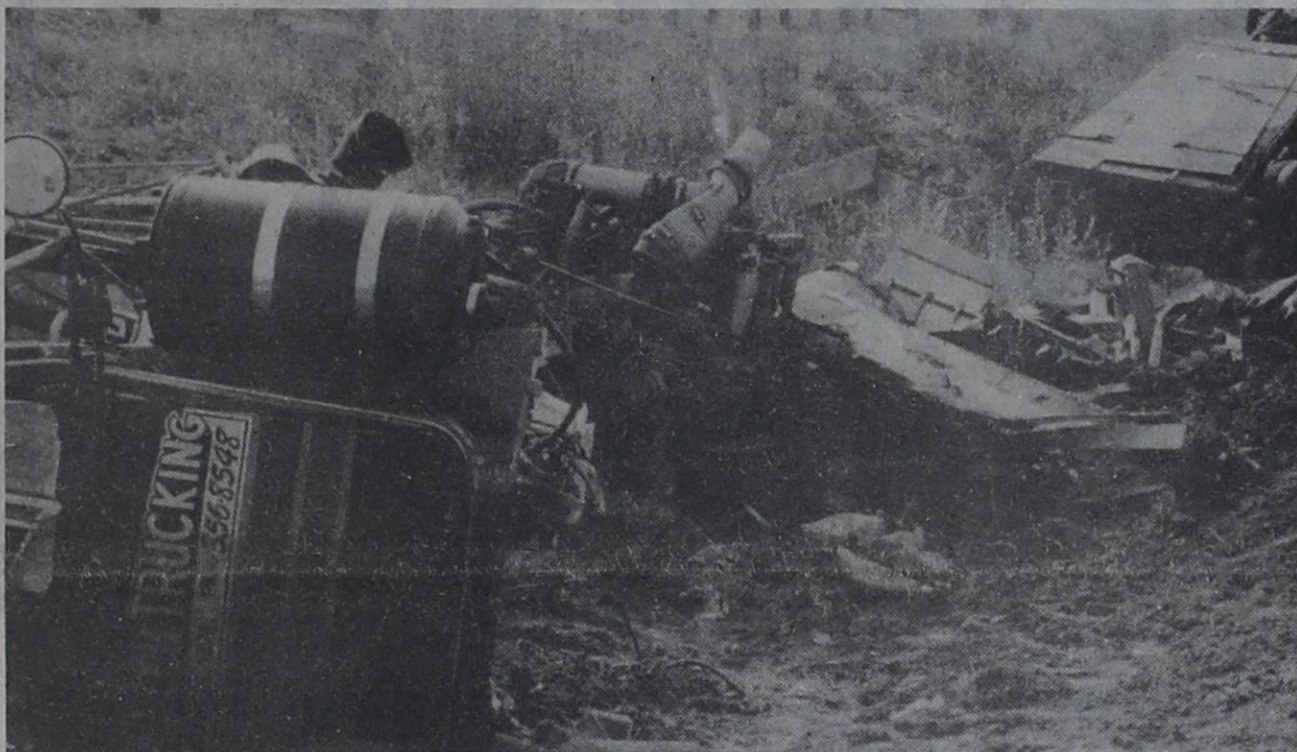
Burglary Investigated

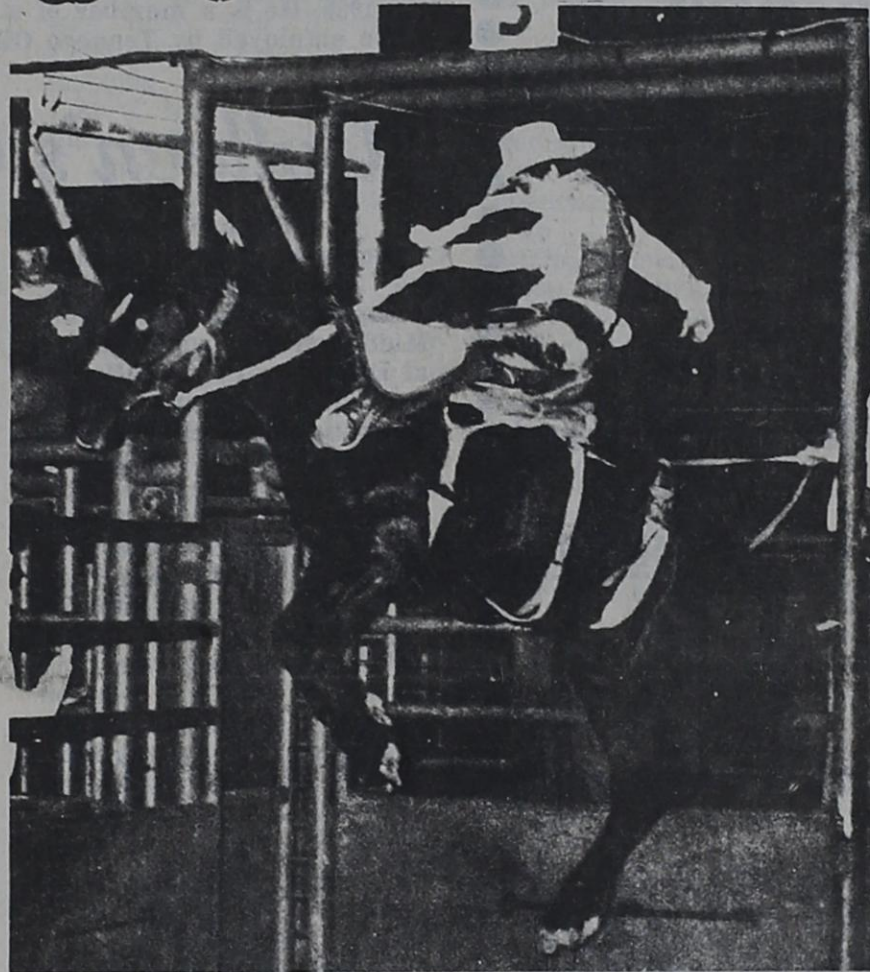
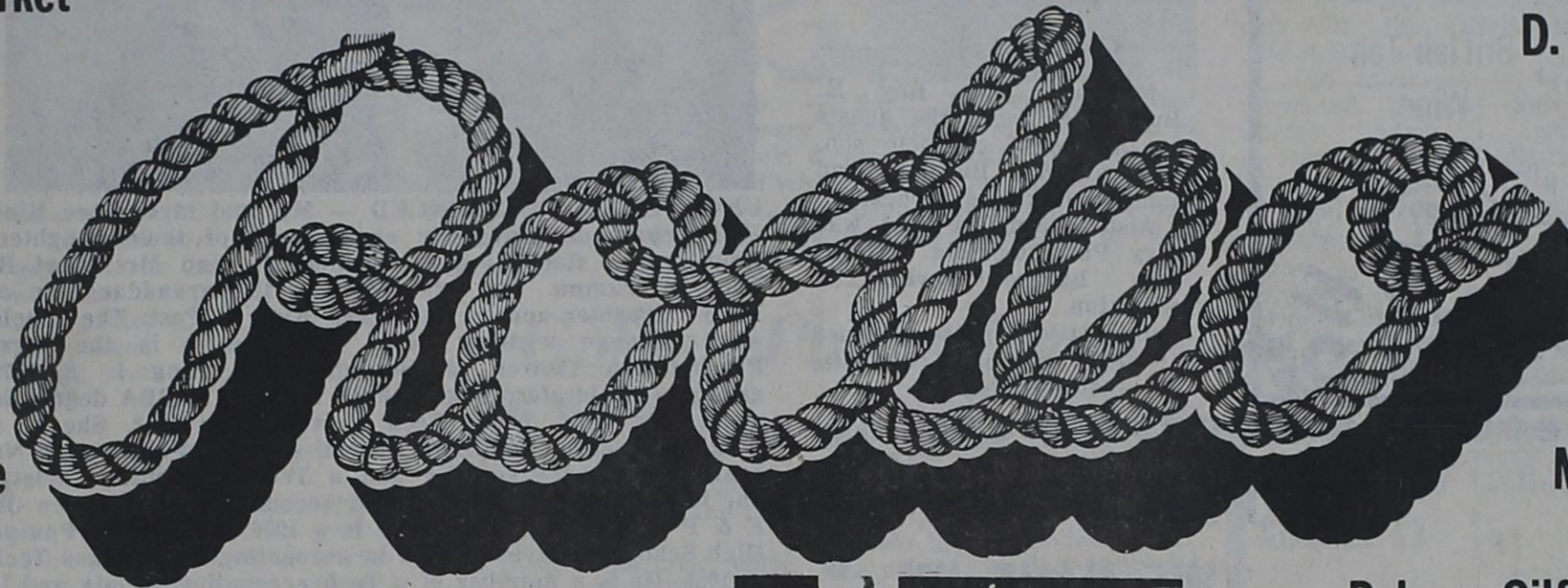

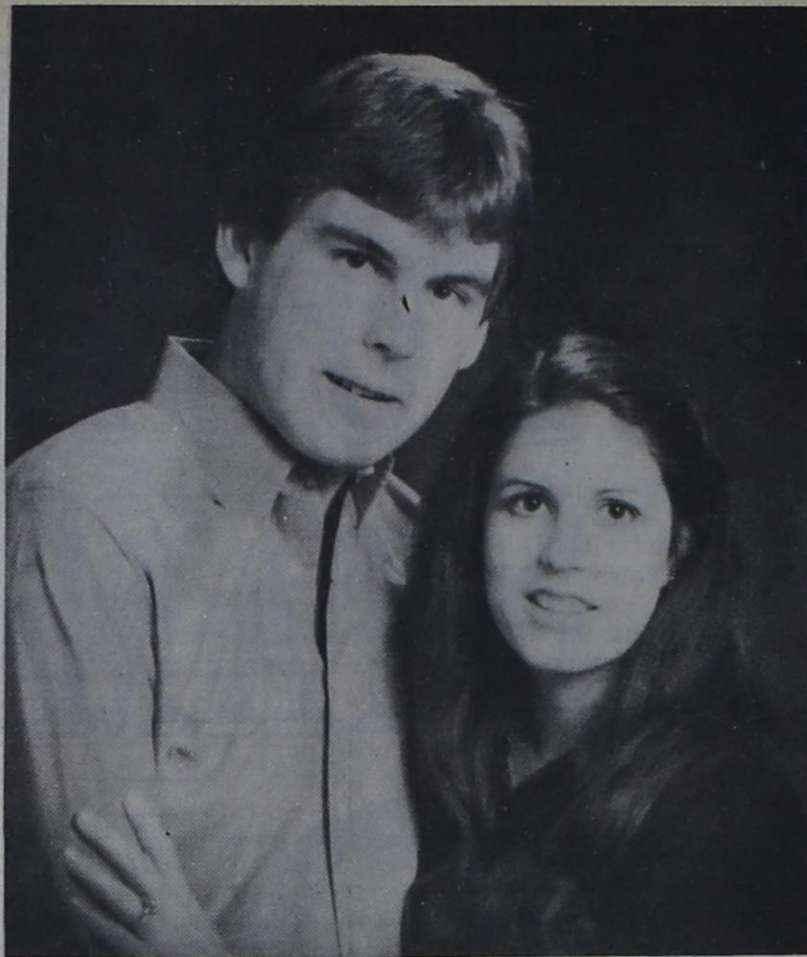

DPS Now Taking Applications

The Texas Department of Public Safety is now accepting applications for the position of Trooper-Trainee.

The 18-week recruit school is scheduled to begin in January 1985 with training to be at the DPS Academy in Austin.

Major V.J. Cawthon, Commander of Region 5 said, "The basic requirements for the position of Trooper-Trainee are: you must be of excellent health, be between 20 and 35 years old and have at least 60 semester hours of college. Two years law enforcement or military experience may be substituted for the educational requirements.

Additional requirements are: your weight must be proportionate to your height; for men, two to three pounds per inch of height and for women, one and three-fourths to two and one-half pounds per inch of height.

You must be a U.S. citizen and have a valid Texas drivers license. our eyesight must be no worse than 20-200 correctable to 20-30. Severe color deficiency in your eyesight will be a disqualification."

Major Cawthon also stated that testing will be conducted in Lubbock, Amarillo and Wichita Falls on every Tuesday and Thursday, except holidays.

Testing will start at 9 a.m. each day of the test, beginning August 16 and continuing to October 11, 1984.
