School Suffers from State Test, Anxiety

"Today was the worst day in the history of Post schools," Post Independent School District superintendent Bill Shiver told trustees Tuesday night at the regular board meeting.

"We were flat all day, and I expect it'll be that way until we get the results back on the test," Shiver added.

He told trustees that the low morale is a result of the uncertainty of the state teacher's test which was administered Monday.

Results on the tests won't be known for at least seven weeks, meanwhile teachers and administrators do not know whether or not they passed the test.

Shiver said he took four hours to complete the test "and you know how sloppy my handwriting is, I just don't know how I did."

The superintendent also said the test had a few "trick" questions as well as questions with opinion answers.

"Those subjective questions are the ones that bother me," he added.

Shiver told trustees that

two teachers broke down emotionally following the test Monday.

He said that state-wide there is sure to be litigation against the state concerning the test, mainly due to the lifetime certificate teachers earned when completing previous college and state requirements.

"That professional certificate from the state that I earned is a basic constitutional right...now the state is saying that lifetime certificate could be invalid," Shiver added.

The board approved a contract with Billingsley and Stracener Architects-Engineers for the purpose of supervising the construction of a new vocational agriculture training facility.

The new building will be constructed on the east side of the new field house, using the existing wall on the east side of the field house.

The structure will have 11,000 square feet, with classrooms and shop space.

Estimated cost of the project is expected to fit the budgeted amount of \$225,000, with bids from

contractors to be opened in early May.

Board members devoted a considerable portion of the meeting studying the design, which had been previewed in previous meetings with vocational ag instructors participating in earlier planning.

Three alternate items were struck from the main bid to save money, but will be included on bids from contractors and if the bids are low enough, the alternates could be added to the project.

Alternates are a paint room, storage deck and cement apron around the building.

Shiver was directed by the board to authorize middle school cheerleaders to raise funds to pay for uniforms and to eliminate the current requirement that parents sign an agreement to pay for the uniforms prior to student's entering competition for the cheerleader positions.

Board member Royce Hart, the board's representative on the central appraisal board, discussed the recent study on falling oil

prices and the impact on school tax revenues.

"We could see as much as a 50 percent decrease in tax revenue next year," he warned.

Shiver told the board he is initiating cost-cutting measures and is attending a special meeting in Austin later to find out what help the state will provide school districts impacted by the lower oil prices.

"Fat chance of help from them," Hart commented.

The board approved the renewal of six certificates of deposit, rejected an offer

for an oil lease on approximately eight acres of minerals east of Post and approved the teacher career ladder.

"There is absolutely no support for this career ladder," Shiver explained, "which is required by the state, and I feel certain it will be changed...they just don't know which plan to use."

Attending the meeting were board president Jack Kirkpatrick, members Hart, Pru Basquez, Tom Middleton, Jimmy Bartlett and Jerry Osborn.

Paving Project Gets Started with Bids

Commercial Concrete of Lubbock was awarded the low bid for this year's paving project in Post, as the Post City Council accepted the bid during its regular meeting Monday night.

The bid was \$248,709.50 and work is expected to begin within a month.

The engineering estimate for the project was \$274,193.30. A state grant for paving will provide \$246,000 of the project.

Others bidding were Caprock Highway Construction, Price Construction Co., Ronnie Zahn Paving, Inc. and Williams and Peters Construction Co., Inc.

The council passed the second reading of the animal ordinance and the second reading of the truck ordinance.

A decision on appointing a city health officer was postponed, with Mrs Suzanne Pass (RN) serving as the temporary health officer.

The council also voted to change long distance service to NTS, which will

provide an approximate 20 percent savings in telephone charges with no additional costs for the change.

Council member Weaver McKamie abstained on the vote.

Pru Basquez, Leroy Demming and Earl Chapman were reappointed to the Housing Authority board, with manager Delores Redman explaining her appreciation of the efforts of the three board members.

Jack King, representing the Post Economic Development Corp. (PEDC) discussed plans for transferring 4.46 acres of PEDC property to the city and ask for help from the council in designating city owned property for potential industrial development.

The council agreed that currently unused city-owned property could be used for industrial development and that PEDC could advertise that certain city-owned property could be made available for that use.

Commissioners Cut, Cut

"It seems the more we complain about the telephone bill, the higher it gets," Garza County commissioner Ted Aten complained during Monday morning's Commissioners' Court meeting.

The telephone bill was \$200 more than the previous month at \$1700 and commissioners are planning special meetings with all department heads next Monday to find specific areas to cut from the budget.

Commissioners issued an order to cut the purchase of coffee for the courthouse and sheriff's department in half.

A review of the bill for coffee showed that the sheriff's department had ordered 10 cases of coffee in February.

Commissioners set a limit of five cases a month for the sheriff's department and two cases a month for the courthouse.

"We're going to be looking at cutting every non-essential function that can be found," Judge Giles Dalby said.

Judge Dalby also told commissioners that the case load in his court has increased 400 percent and he expects more cases to go to jury trial, which will increase the operating costs of the court.

Commissioners heard a presentation from Bill Davis, representing Oklahoma Texas Telecommunications, with a proposal for a telephone system at the courthouse.

The proposed system would tie all courthouse lines into one central computer and would keep track of all long distance calls by line.

Garza County Drilling Report

Showing ability to flow 127 barrels of 38-gravity oil daily on a quarter-inch choke, the No. 3 PLK "41" has been brought on line in Garza County's Happy Field about 13 miles south of Post. Campbell Oil Co. is the operator.

The well will produce without perforations from the Ellenburger Formation. The production interval is 8,310 to 8,315 feet into the hole, with bottomhole at 8,315. Flowing tubing pressure came in at 225 PSI.

Also in the Happy Field, Magna Oil of Texas is preparing to make hole for the No. 1 Lott, an 8,600-ft. Ellenburger test. Drillsite will be in a 240-acre lease in the Jaspas Hays Survey A-535, about 12 miles southwest of the Post township.

Wildcat drilling action is scheduled by Hunt Oil of Dallas in a 640-acre lease in the T&NORR Survey, about 14 miles south of Post. Carrying permit for 8,500-ft. maximum drilling depth, the well will be known as the No. 1 Davis "28."

Pumping 37-gravity crude at the rate of 14 barrels per day, the No. 6 Stoker has been completed in Garza County's Garza Field about four miles southeast of Post. Rocker "A" Well Service is the operator.

The well probed to a 3,050-ft. bottom and will produce from a perforated interval in the San Andres Formation, 2,710 to 2,830 feet into the wellbore. In addition to oil, it made 56 barrels of salt water per day.

Commercial shows of oil have been logged at the No. 1 Parks, a Garza County wildcat located 15 miles southeast of Post.

The well was spudded on Dec 3 of last year and has been drilled to total depth of 8,219 feet. Production testing is scheduled. Located in a 643-acre lease, T&NO Survey, the well is an exploration

A completion rig has been called in at the No. 1 Kirk Green, a Garza County wildcat venture located five miles southeast of Post. With Fred G. Yates as the operator, the well probed to an 8,334-ft bottom after being spudded on Jan 19 of this year. It is in a 320-acre lease in the GH&H Survey.

Drilling operations are nearing the midway point at the No. 1 Justice, a Garza County wildcat located seven miles northwest of Post. Carrying permit for 9,250-ft. TD, the well had been spudded on Feb. 14 with Marshall and Justice Inc. as the operator.

A Garza County wildcat has been bottomed at total depth of 8,113 feet in a lease three miles southwest of Justiceburg. Designated as the No. 1 R. Clyde Miller, the well was spudded on Christmas Day and had carried permit for 8,300-ft. TD.

NRM Petroleum was the operator.

Drilling is nearing the 6,000-ft mark at the No. 4 Slaughter Estate, a developmental well in the Dover Field, Garza County, 15 miles southwest of Post. Durham Inc. is the operator. Aimed at pay in the Ellenburger Formation, the well is under permit for 8,450 feet of hole making.

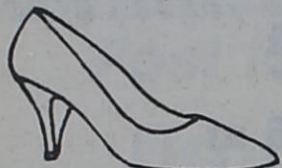

Colleen's Comments

The mortgage, car payment and utility bills still have to get paid, even when money is tight.

So for most of us, that means "making ends meet" is a matter of reducing household living expenses for food, clothing, and home maintenance.

There must be 1001 ways to cut these expenses, certainly more than could ever be listed in this space - or that you could remember.

But there are some general strategies for cutting household expenses that you can apply to your own situation.

First, try trading time for money.

Cut up your own chicken, make cookies instead of buying them, prepare a casserole from scratch instead of a box and use slow-cooking methods to cook some less expensive cuts of meat.

The same thing applies to many home cleaning products, substitute generic products or make your own all-purpose cleaner from vinegar and water, or ammonia and water, at home.

Trading time for money extends to careful shopping: making lists, checking ads for the best prices, coupon clipping, comparison shopping and sticking to a budget.

However, be careful about using coupons to save money on things you don't need or using up more money on gas than you saved by driving across town to get a "bargain."

Another good strategy is to think in terms of recycling or repairing anything before you consider buying.

If you sew, mend or update clothes that can be worn for another season or "handed down" to a younger child.

Rewire your old lamp, repair your own washing machine or fix the cracked plaster yourself.

You can get step-by-step instructions on home repairs from Extension publications, library books and free pamphlets on display at many hardware and home improvement stores.

Sharing is another excellent strategy for stretching dollars.

Many families commonly share some items, such as baby furniture or maternity clothes, with relatives or friends.

But also think in terms of sharing other infrequently used items.

For example, if you and your neighbor both garden, you could share the cost of a needed tool.

Sharing applies to skills too.

If you have a friend who knows how to change the oil on a car, you could babysit one evening in exchange for this service.

The last strategy is to simply cut back.

If you've got two rented phones, take one back to the phone company.

Turn the air conditioner

up or the heater down and dress accordingly to cut down on utility costs.

Try to work out carpooling arrangements so you won't need a second car.

Take a careful look at your lifestyle and hunt for those things you could cut out or reduce.

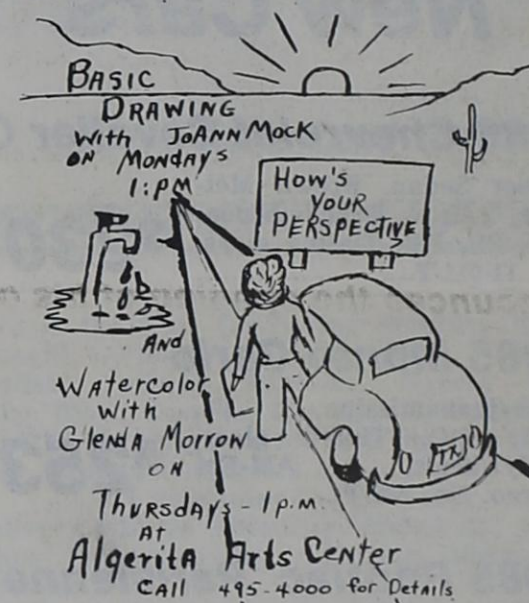

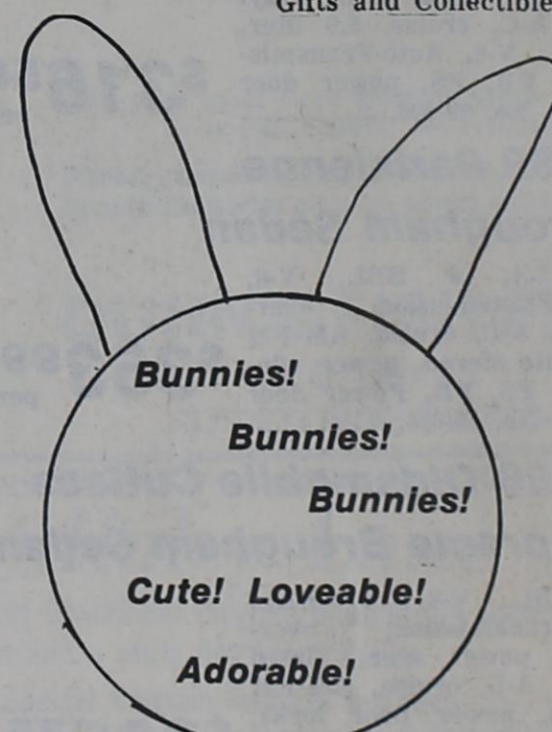

by purchasing the \$19,000 system.

The annual audit report was presented by CPA Steve Sawyers, who gave the county a good report.

"The county has done a good job of keeping expenses below revenues and I believe you are well prepared to face difficult times."

Sawyers praised county officials for their cooperation in the audit and "found no problems with any office."

He has begun the audit ordered by the court of the clerk's office and will present it at a later meeting.

Judge Dalby asked that District Judge George Hansard and other officials be at the special meeting when the clerk's audit is presented.

At the suggestion of county treasurer Voda Gradine, the court agreed that all revenues to the county be transferred to the treasurer's account within 30 days so that all funds could be invested.

Commissioners accepted the bid of Smith Ford of Slaton for a new 3/4 ton pickup truck to be used in Precinct One. The bid was \$10,476.

Commissioners took up the issue of an employee in Precinct Two who was alleged to be living outside the county.

Aten told commissioners that the employee lived in the Graham Community, although Judge Dalby pointed out that the employee's mail is delivered to Wilson.

"We want to make sure that our policy is consistent," Dalby emphasized, "we have required deputies to live in the county, and we need to have the same rules for all departments."

After hearing an opinion from the State Attorney General's office, commissioners accepted Carl Cedarholm's retirement and agreed to postpone the appointment of a clerk until after the Democratic primary election in May.

The state constitution provides for an elected official to continue in office until a successor is appointed or elected.

Attending the meeting were Judge Dalby, commissioners Aten, Herb Walls, Tommy Young, and T.D. Craft and treasurer Voda Gradine.

King reported that there are now 20,900 bales of cotton in storage at the Postex Plant Building with the possibility of the doubling by June.

Jack Alexander and Zoe Kirkpatrick, representing the park board, recommended that work begin immediately on the next phase of park improvements.

The park board members recommended that the walking and jogging path be developed around the perimeter of the baseball parks.

The council authorized for construction bids to be advertised to take advantage of the remaining money from the state grant.

Alexander also asked that paving in front of the swimming pool be included in the project, to provide for safety of children when parents arrive and depart.

"That area on the highway is really potentially dangerous," he explained. Leon Clary came to the council with a request that the city not participate in the new state law requiring certification and licensing of junk yards.

The council voted to call a special meeting to pass an ordinance "opting out" of the state regulations, which other cities have already done.

The ordinance from Plainview is being used as a model.

If the city takes no action, the April 1 deadline will require all junk yards to completely pave lots and follow an 11 page list of regulations.

"I just can't afford to stay in business with those restrictions," Clary said.

He also pointed out that the DPS will not be able to call him for wrecker service after April 1 if the city doesn't take action to "opt out" of the state rules.

City attorney Harvey Morton explained that the law was written to protect the bigger cities.

The law was also written so that smaller cities could decide not to participate if they want.

A group of citizens confronted representatives from Energas with complaints about billing.

Led by spokesperson Barbara Steel, the group asked for special help with the elderly.

Eugene Eller of Energas' Lubbock office, carefully explained the company policies and emphasized that arrangements are frequently made for people on fixed incomes to pay out

their bills.

He also said that the company will not turn off gas to a residence when the temperature is at or below 32 degrees.

He announced that gas rates have decreased 13 percent this year and are expected to be reduced even lower as a result of an agreement recently with WestStar.

recent dramatic drop in the spot market price has certainly gotten our attention.

For one thing, we as taxpayers are beginning to see, not that we didn't already, that oil plays a major role in our ability to fund local government.

The county, school, hospital and city are all looking at potential serious losses of revenue next year...depending on the price of oil at the time of evaluations in January.

The museum was built in 1912 by the cereal millionaire C.W. Post.

It was the only hospital this side of Fort Worth.

It held the finest facilities available, x-ray, laboratory, operating room and

sterilizing room, nurses training, diet kitchen and all the rooms were private with steam heat.

The hospital had to shut down in 1918 when the war broke out and the doctors were enlisted into the army.

The old sanitorium was then turned into apartment buildings.

It had been abandoned for some time when it was donated to the people of Garza County in 1966 by Marshall Mason and Mrs James Minor for the use as a museum.

The museum has been

recognized by the State of Texas for its contribution to Texas culture, history and heritage.

It has been recorded as a Texas Historical Landmark.

We have been able to get new signs put up by the State Highway Dept.

We are going to have an antique drive. Big or small, we will take it all.

If you can't bring it by, call us and we will come get it.

From cars to jars, lamps to stamps, clothes and stoves, anything.

Lots of people in Post did

not know that we even had a museum or where it's located.

There are many who have never been inside.

The museum is located at 117 North Ave. N., open 10-4 Monday thru Thursday and 10-3 on Friday's.

At present the museum is not open on the weekends, but soon will start opening on the weekends.

Please help support our special pieces of history and help get it going strong.

Our next monthly meeting will be March 20 at 7:00 at the museum.
