## 'Silver Whistle' Packed with Laughs!

Don't let the name fool you...this stage production is as lively and funny a play you'll see in these parts this year.

I'm talking about "The Silver Whistle," the first production of the newly created Caprock Community Theater, which debuts in Post tonight at the School Auditorium.

Curtains rise at 7:30 on a cast of local talent, lead by recently returned home-grown Will McCrary... whose theater experience adds a real measure of Broadway in this play.

McCrary plays the part of a 77 year old spry and youthful "swinger" who drops in as a temporary resident of a church-operated "old folks home."

Surrounded by a cast of characters as zany as you can imagine, the zesty old man begins immediately to liven the place up...

I've only seen the first act...but I am convinced that the rest of the show

will leave the audience just as impressed as the first part.

Anne Leake does a marvelous job of setting the tone in the garden as Mrs Hamner, a crusty old lady who is waiting for the end to come.

Her lines are delivered crisply and loaded with just the right amount of laugh-producing one-liners.

You'll have trouble recognizing many of the cast, who are costumed appropriately.

Preston Poole creates Mr Beebe with delight and Debbie Chambliss takes the limelight with her "sobbing" portrayal of Miss Hoadley.

Jennifer Miller is just as attractive on stage as off, sporting the brightest and prettiest smile in her role as Miss Tripp, the director of the home.

David Murphy is the minister, carrying the role of the frustrated administrator in just the correct manner.

Patsy Bilbo is the "straight-arrow" and indignant Mrs Gross...and supported brilliantly by Jack Alexander as Mr Cherry.

You'll just have to see the entire play for yourself...and you'll have three chances...tonight, Friday night and Saturday night... all at 7:30 and at the school auditorium.

Tickets are only \$6 per person and may be purchased at the old Garza Theater box office downtown on East Main Street between 11 a.m. and 1 p.m. daily.

I'm sure you'll also appreciate the acting from the rest of the cast...Ronnie Gradine, Jack King, Jack Chambliss, Mike Tooms, Jan Olson, Ronnie Metzgar and "RoJo" the rooster playing Omar. RoJo is loaned by Fernie Reed.

Believe me, you don't have to drive to Lubbock to see good theater on the stage...I'm sure we'll have people from Lubbock coming to Post to see this one!

The Post Dispatch will provide election night results with a telephone hotline open from 8-10 p.m.

Entries for the art show are being accepted beginning at 8 a.m. Tuesday to 8 p.m. and Wednesday from 8 a.m. to noon.

Judging and a patron's reception will be held Thursday, May 1 at 7 p.m.

Friday and Saturday the art show opens to the public from 9 a.m. to 7 p.m.

The show opens Sunday, May 4 at 1 p.m. and awards presentations will be held at 3 p.m.

## Merchants Study Main Street Project

A group of Post merchants and civic leaders attended the Texas Mainstreet Project workshop held last Thursday in Lubbock, evaluating the procedures for entering the Mainstreet program.

Attending from Post were Curtis Hudman, Ronnie Gradine, Jan Crawford, Marie Neff, Loveta Josey, Bill Pool, Mayor Giles McCrary, Lewis Earl and Wes Burnett.

Sponsored by Texas

Tech's Center for Public Service, the workshop outlined with slides and discussion "before and after" of a wide variety of Texas cities which have seen dramatic economic revitalization through participation in the Texas Mainstreet Project.

Participants learned about ways to improve the outside and inside appearance of buildings without investing "tons of money."

"Keeping windows and front areas clean is a good start," project director Anice Reed commented.

She explained the advantages of becoming a Mainstreet City, especially pointing out the value of hiring a full time manager to assist in economic development and recruiting businesses for empty store fronts.

"There's nothing quite as depressing as a mainstreet lined with empty buildings..." Mrs Reed added.

Success stories were shared from Stamford, Sweetwater and Pampa.

Main Street architect Dick Ryan showed a number of older buildings which were revitalized and became assets to their communities.

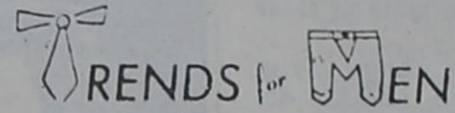

There is NO ADMISSION. "Sugarless" Foods Can Have Sugar Calories

"Sugarless" and "sugar-free" food products may still contain calories from sweeteners, in spite of their label claims.

The Food and Drug Administration (FDA) defines "sugar" as sucrose, which is common table sugar.

However, other sugars such as glucose and fructose, and related natural sweeteners called "sugar alcohols", including xylitol, sorbitol and mannitol, can be used in food processing.

All these sugars and sugar alcohols contain as many calories as table sugar and break down in the body in a similar way.

But because of the narrow definition of sugar used by the FDA, a food can be labeled "sugar-free" and still be high in sugar-contributed calories.

Sugar alcohols do not contribute to the development of cavities in the teeth, which is why they are often used in "sugarless" gum and candy.

But a food will be lower in calories only if it is sweetened with the artificial sweetener saccharin, or the non-nutritive sweetener aspartame.

**Buckle Up Those Children And Grandchildren!**

Fatalities of children 0 to 4 from automobile accidents in Texas has decreased 13 percent since the legislation requiring children to ride in car safety seats was passed in 1984.

But the bad news is that many parents and grandparents still aren't using car safety seats for their children.

According to a 1985 survey by the Texas Transportation Institute the percent of children NOT riding in safety seats ranges from 89 percent in Brownsville to 44 percent in Austin.

If you need a child safety seat, but can't afford or don't want to buy one, there are many loan programs available.

Check with the Texas Department of Health, State Department of Highways or Department of Public Safety office in your area, since these agencies are participating in loan programs.

**Planning Low-Cost High-Protein Main Dishes**

Protein foods add important nutrients to our diets.

So even if you're trying to save money, you'll want to keep these foods in your diet.

But there are some things you can do to plan low-cost protein main dishes:

-Use more low-cost protein food, such as dry beans, eggs, peanut butter, turkey and chicken. Hamburger and liver are good buys in red meats.

-Shop the sales for red meats. If you find a good buy in a large roast, you can cut it up and use it in different ways for more than one meal.

-Include meat combined with other foods so it goes further. Spaghetti and meat sauce, beef stew, chicken and dumplings and tuna casserole are some ways to stretch your meat.

-Use less tender cuts of meat, including blade steak, chuck and arm roast. Make them tender

by moist, slow cooking or using a marinade.

-Figure the cost per serving of meat to save money. As a general rule, meat with no bones has four servings per pound. Meat with some bones has two to three servings per pound. Meat with lots of bones has only one serving per pound.

-Serve eggs as a main dish. Two eggs provide the same amount of protein as an average serving of meat.

## Xi Delta Rho Celebrates Founder's Day

On April 30, 1986, here in Post, Xi Delta Rho chapter of Beta Sigma Phi, in concert with 12,500 chapters of 250,000 members throughout the world, will celebrate their Founder's Day.

During the Depression, Walter W. Ross thought that young women needed more in their lives than work, responsibility, and hardship.

He thought a social and cultural outlet was needed

and that he was the man to see that it was provided.

His efforts brought seven young women in Abilene, Kansas, together on April 30, 1931 to form that sort of organization.

Beta Sigma Phi began, and time proved Walter Ross's idea a good one.

Because Beta Sigma Phi has continued to meet their needs, on this April 30, Walter Ross will be remembered by this largest Greek letter sorority in the

world.

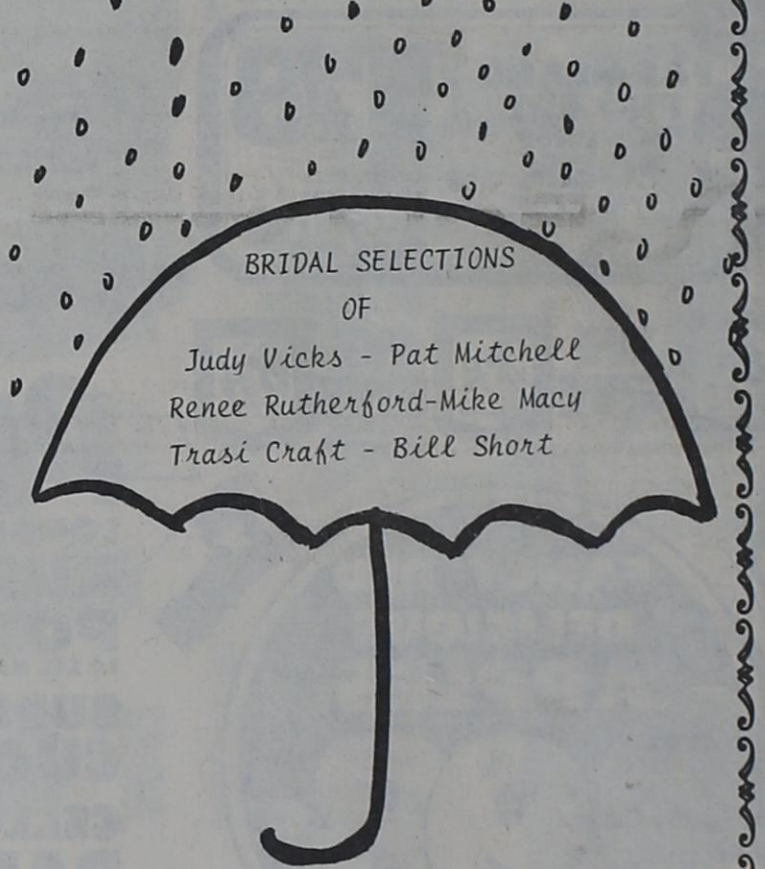

had to be rescued a third time.

"After that, Jones went to the shallow end of the pool," Voyles said.

When Jones and Kirkpatrick square off at Idalou next October 10 in the district football match-up...the rescue will be on the minds of more than one on the field.

CO-CO Oil Inc. of Lubbock has driven stake for a 3,550-ft developmental try in Garza County's H&L Field seven miles northeast of Post.  
It will be known as the No. 2 Post-Montgomery with drillsite in a 40-acre drilling unit in the K. Aycock Survey.  
It is aimed to pay in the Gloria Formation.

BTA Oil Producers Inc. has given up on efforts to make a producer out of the No. 8412 JV Huntley in the East Huntley Field, Garza County.  
With drillsite located about 10 miles northwest of Post, the well probed to total depth of 3,702 with no indicated commercial shows.  
It will be plugged and abandoned.

Maralo Inc. is preparing to conduct a re-entry operation at its No. 2 Maralo-Connell Field in Garza County's Ida Sue East Field.  
The well was completed in the summer of 1985 with production from the Ellenburger Formation including 165 barrels of oil and 187 barrels of waste water.  
Additional Mississippian Era production will be sought.  
The location is about 9.2 miles northeast of Justiceburg.

Meager production potential was indicated when Kerr-McGee re-completed a 12-year-old well in The Barron Ranch Field, Garza County, 15.3 miles northeast of Post.  
The well is designated as the No. 2 Swenson "C".  
It was completed in 1974 as an Ellenburger Formation producer from an open hole interval 7,662 to 7,677 feet into the wellbore.  
Kerr-McGee plugged back for shallower pay in the Strawn at 7,068 to 7,168 feet.  
The well showed it can pump two barrels of 41-gravity crude with 20 barrels of waste water daily.

A wildcat oil completion is indicated at the No. 1 Justice located about seven miles northwest of Post.  
The well is swabbing oil and

water after being perforated 8,758 to 8,788 feet into the wellbore.

Bottomhole is at 8,885 with Marshall and Winston Inc. as the operator.  
Testing will continue for potential.

Exxon is testing at a developmental location in Garza County's Dorward Field four miles south-east of Justiceburg.

Spudded last Feb 2, the well is designated as the No 4 Fee "R". It is bottomed at 2,580 feet and was plugged back.

It has been perforated for production in the San Andres Formation, 1,817 to 2,003 feet into the wellbore.

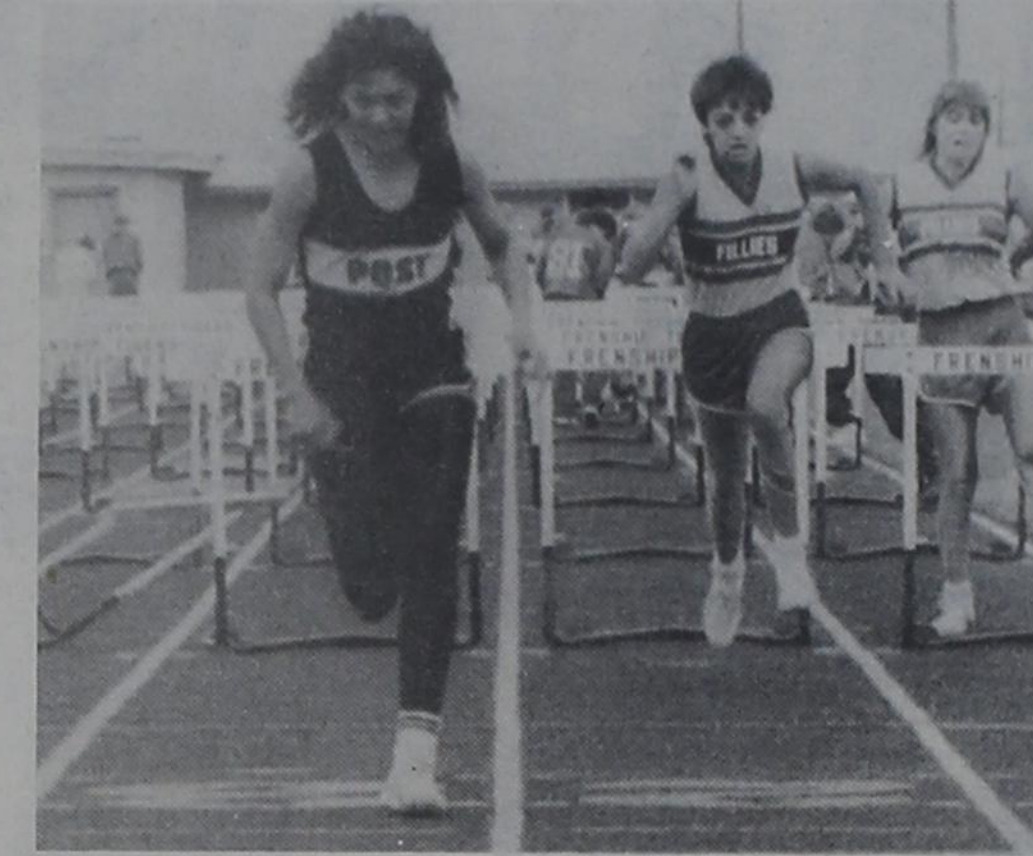
