School Board

Vocational Ag Building Bids Opened

A decision to accept the low bid for construction of the vocational agriculture building was postponed Tuesday night by the Post Independent School District board of trustees, pending inspection of the field house.

Hallmark Builders was the apparent low bidder on the new project, and are also completing work on the field house.

"I think it would be wise to do the final inspection of their current work before we award a new contract," superintendent Bill Shiver said.

An inspection by the board is scheduled in the next two weeks.

The board approved the returning of bonds to nine other bidders, and named the three low bidders to be considered at the next meeting.

The bid included adding an exterior slab, concrete blocks for inside walls and epoxy paint, as well as a paint room and concrete decking.

Hallmark submitted a bid of \$231,521 with Tusha-Euper bidding at \$233,204 and M & S Construction at \$238,774.

The building will adjoin the field house on the east.

The bids were approximately \$18,000 under the estimated budget amount.

In other action, the board agreed with Shiver to postpone the hiring of a full time assistant to the band director, citing the uncertainty of future revenues

for the school.

Shiver recommended, and the board agreed, that graduate students from Texas Tech be used to assist the band director.

The assistant band director position had been approved last year, "and you're not eliminating the position," Shiver said.

He pointed out that if the board hired a full time assistant and then the following year had to take more drastic budget cuts as a result of the drop in oil prices, then the new person would have to be released.

The board approved a mineral leasing agreement, pending approval by the State Commissioner of Education, for eight acres of property just north of U.S. Hwy 380 in East Post.

The lease to J. Roger Allspaugh provides \$200 per acre to the school for its one-quarter interest and one-quarter of 3-16 production.

The land deeded to the school district was originally part of a tract owned by Lorenzo Alexander and had been used for school purposes prior to desegregation.

The board approved the renewal of seven certificates of deposit totalling \$4,711,400.

Career ladder policies were approved in accordance with state mandated procedures.

The board approved the hiring of Mrs Sharla Wells as a teacher, replacing the retiring Mrs Marion

Wheatley.

Mrs Nancy McCowen McDonald was also hired to teach mathematics in the middle school.

Board members discussed attending the State

School Board Association convention in San Antonio Sept. 26-29. "This is a good way to keep current on issues and share ideas with other board members," Shiver pointed out.

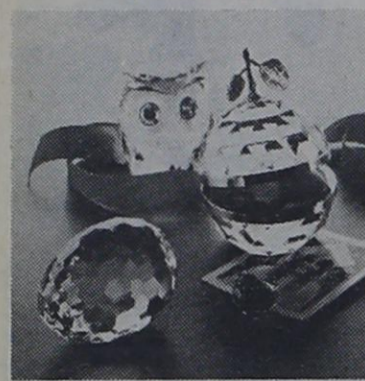

In her book *Stress and the Healthy Family*, researcher Delores Curran says that her studies of stress-effective families show they use four common money management techniques.

First, they learn to control money stresses together.

In two-paycheck families they may pay different bills out of each check, and in other families there may be separate accounts for household expenses and discretionary money.

But in general, money is not considered to belong to one partner or the other, but is theirs as a family.

Second, these families budget, although how tightly they budget varies widely.

The family tends to plan for fixed monthly costs like a home, car and medical and insurance payments and then divide the rest into savings, food, clothing, recreation and miscellaneous.

Setting aside some savings for emergencies is an especially important feature of the budget, because it means that the family doesn't fall apart when something out of the ordinary happens.

Curran also found that when money gets tight, healthy families tend to scale down more effectively than others.

They do this by revising their expectations. So, for example, the family that has taken and expensive vacation each summer may settle for a nearby weekend camping trip when finances are reduced.

Other families who refuse to lower their expectations often depend more on credit, which can add to their financial stress in the long run.

Fourth, stress-effective families develop methods for making major purchases without the need for painful arguments.

Couples tend to respect each other's daily decisions on spending unless there's an unusual reason such as high monthly bills or loss of a job.

But for major purchases, such as a new car, furniture or trips, these

couples share their own feelings, fears and attitudes and take into consideration the different attitudes of their partner.

This makes it possible for them to strike a compromise.

The skills of sharing, budgeting, revising expectations and compromising may not seem like much, but evidently they add up to a family that can handle finances without it becoming a major problem in their lives.

Drilling Report

Showing ability to pump 49 barrels of 38-gravity crude per day along with 141 barrels of waste water, a new producer has been brought on line in the H&L Field, Garza County.

The venture is designated as the No. 1 Post-Montgomery. West Texas Petroleum Inc. is the operator.

The well bottomed at a depth of 3,481 feet.

It will produce from perforations in the Glorieta Formation, ranging from 3,314 to 3,426 feet into the hole.

Wildcat drilling action is slated in Garza County, about five miles southeast of Post, with Kirby Exploration, Inc. of Houston as the operator.

The operation will be an 8,600-ft test in a 320-acre lease block in the GH&H Survey.

It has been designated as the No. 304 Kirkpatrick.

Three Oaks Corp. has posted first production figures for a newly completed producer in the Post Field.

It is the No. 3 Roy, located about 15 miles east of Post.

The well showed ability to pump 22 barrels of 38-gravity oil daily plus 35 barrels of waste water.

The venture probed to total depth of 2,690 feet and was perforated to produce from the Glorieta Formation, 2,546 to 2,554 feet into the wellbore.

Garza County's WTG Field gained a new producer when the No. 16 Post-Montgomery was brought online 10 miles northeast of Post.

The well showed it can pump 37-gravity oil at the rate of 11 barrels per day.

It also made 16 barrels of salt water daily.

WTG Exploration Inc. is the operator.

The company bottomed the well at a depth of 3,325 feet and perforated the Glorieta Formation for production at 3,102 to 3,210 feet into the hole.

The No. 1 Bartlett has been branded as a dry hole and was

plugged and abandoned at a location in the PHD Field, 10 miles northwest of Post.

The well had been spudded last Jan. 6, with Three Oaks Inc. as the operator.

It bottomed dry at total depth of 4,237 feet.

Showing ability to flow 162 barrels of 40-gravity oil per day on a 14-64 choke, the No. 4 Maralo-Connell has been brought on line in the North Polar Field, Garza County, by Maralo Inc.

Location is about 9.2 miles northeast of Justiceburg.

Maralo took the hole to total depth of 7,825 feet and perforated the Ellenburger Formation for production at 7,788 to 7,802 feet into the hole.

Flow pressure was not available.

At a drillsite about seven miles southeast of Justiceburg, Majestic Enterprises is preparing to make hole for a 3,000-ft. developmental well in Garza County's Dorward Field.

The location is in a 20-acre lease in the H&TC Survey.

Majestic operates out of Dallas.

Indian Wells Oil Inc has posted first production data for the No. 1 Parks "744," a successful developmental try in the Red Loflin Field, Garza County.

Located 13 miles southeast of Post, the well flowed 97 barrels of oil per day plus 94 barrels of water on an open choke.

The oil tested at 40-gravity.

Indian Wells took the hole to an 8,356-ft bottom and perforated the Strawn Formation for production 8,040 to 8,044 feet into the wellbore.

Pumping 36-gravity crude at the rate of 134 barrels per day, the No. 16 K. Stoker and Wife "C" has been finaled in the Rocker "A" Field, Garza County, five miles northwest of Justiceburg.

Union Oil of California is the operator. Union bottomed the hole at 3,200 feet and perforated the Glorieta Formation for production at 2,804 to 3,104 feet into the wellbore.

Along with the oil, the well made 24 barrels of salt water.

First production figures have been filed for the No. 1 Ben Altman "A," a developmental venture in Garza County's PHD Field.

Drillsite was about eight miles northwest of Post.

With Brothers Producing as the operator, the well probed to a total depth of 4,300 feet.

It potentialed at 28 barrels of 39-gravity oil per day plus about 200 barrels of waste water.

The well bottomed at 4,300 feet and was perforated to produce from the San Andres Formation at 3,758 to 3,767 feet into the wellbore.

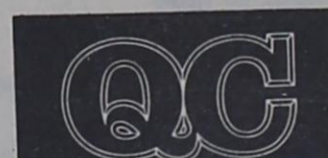

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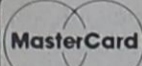
