

Dispatch Returns to Thursday Delivery


Beginning next week, The Post Dispatch returns to a Thursday publication date. The change has been debated for the past several months, and following

Tom Bouchier, who has been an active Post civic and community leader and worker since its earliest days, was honored last Friday night as Citizen of the Year at the annual Chamber of Commerce banquet. Master of Ceremonies Earl Chapman read a long list of Bouchier's contributions to the community. Chapman and Bob Palmer presented the special award to Ronnie Bouchier, who accepted on behalf of his father. The elder Bouchier was unable to attend the banquet. Chapman reminded the capacity audience at the Post Community Center that Bouchier was instrumental in developing the White River Lake, and until his retirement from Higginbotham-Bartlett in 1975, was active in a wide variety of civic efforts.

Glenda Shobe received the first annual Post Merchant's Association Business of the Year award for Post Insurance. She was cited for her volunteer work with senior citizens. The highlight of the evening was keynote speaker Jerry Clower, who kept the audience laughing throughout his presentation. Clower, a former fertilizer salesman, gave credit to "Big" Ed Wilks, formerly of KFYO radio in Lubbock, for setting the comedian on a course vastly different than he had ever considered. Clower pointed to "Big Ed", asking him to stand, then told the story of Wilks' insistence in 1970 that Jerry's stories be recorded. Shortly after Wilks' recording of a speech Jerry had given to area farmers, the tape was aired and

requests began pouring in to Lubbock. From there he signed a

contract with a recording company... "and you know the rest."



Colleen's Comments

You can carefully avoid the salt shaker and still be getting significant amounts of sodium from the condiments and sauces you use to flavor food.

A sodium intake of 1,100 to 3,300 milligrams daily is considered safe and adequate for a healthy adult. One teaspoon of salt contains 1,938 milligrams of sodium or almost two-

thirds of this daily amount.

While the specific amount will vary somewhat according to brand, recent figures from the U.S. Department of Agriculture illustrate the sodium content of many popular seasonings, condiments and relishes.

Among the sauces, soy sauce contains the most sodium with about 1,029 milligrams per tablespoon. One tablespoon of Teriyaki sauce contains 690 milligrams, chili sauce 227, Worcestershire Sauce 206, and barbecue sauce 130 milligrams.

Some favorite condiments add smaller amounts of sodium to the diet. A tablespoon of ketchup has 156 milligrams while the same amount of sweet relish contains 124 milligrams.

Brined relishes like pickles and olives are another significant source of sodium.

For example, one 2-ounce dill pickle add 928 milligrams of sodium to the diet and four green

olives increase the sodium count by 323 milligrams.

Condiments used in cooking will also add sodium.

For example, one teaspoon of garlic salt contains 1,850 milligrams of sodium, onion salt 1,620 milligrams, meat tenderizer 1,750 milligrams and MSG, or monosodium glutamate, 492 milligrams.

If your doctor has prescribed a low-sodium diet of 1,000 to 2,000 milligrams per day, it will take careful selection of seasonings and condiments to avoid exceeding your sodium allotment.

For flavor without extra sodium, she suggests sticking to garlic or onion powders, which contain only 1 gram of sodium per teaspoon.

To avoid hidden sources of sodium in your diet, it's especially important to read the nutrition labels on any commercially prepared condiments and seasonings.

Using a home-made mixture of various herbs and spices or flavorings with lemon juice can keep even

"County officials will have to be more resourceful in the future to make ends meet without putting the burden on local tax-

The state conference is one of the educational programs of the V.G. Young Institute of County Government, a part of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.



It features the Promise by which three million young girls, teenagers, women and men pledge themselves to serve God and country and to help people at all times.

The Promise has an inspirational message: "Everyone wants a better world. As you and others care more and more about the people in the world, it will improve."

Girl Scouting is open to all girls ages five through 17.

It is part of a worldwide family of girls and adults in 108 countries through its membership in the World Association of Girl Guides and Girl Scouts.

The mainstay of this huge volunteer organization is still the homemaker and mother, but it is interesting to note that this same homemaker-mother is many times the professional...lawyer, fashion designer, teacher or secretary.

Banker, businessman, minister, fireman and professor daddies go troop

camping and day camping, help with troop meetings and provide support for their daughter's activities.

In addition parents and non-parent friends of Girl Scouting serve as leaders and on boards and committees to help things keep running smoothly, adding their skills and expertise when needed.

Girl Scouts learn to be more responsible citizens through activities, service projects, badge requirements and the God and Country Program.

Girl Scouts will attend the church of their choice on Girl Scout Sunday and will celebrate the week with projects of service and citizenship in their communities.
