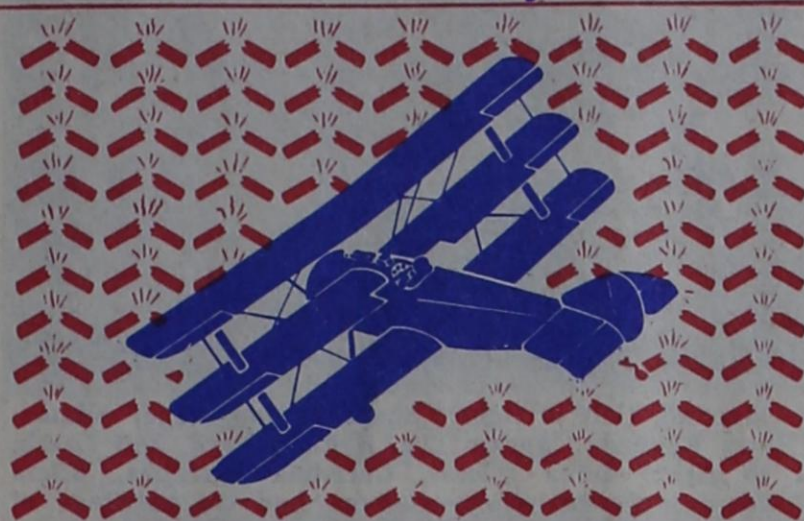

The \$60 per person packaged trip to Granbury includes:

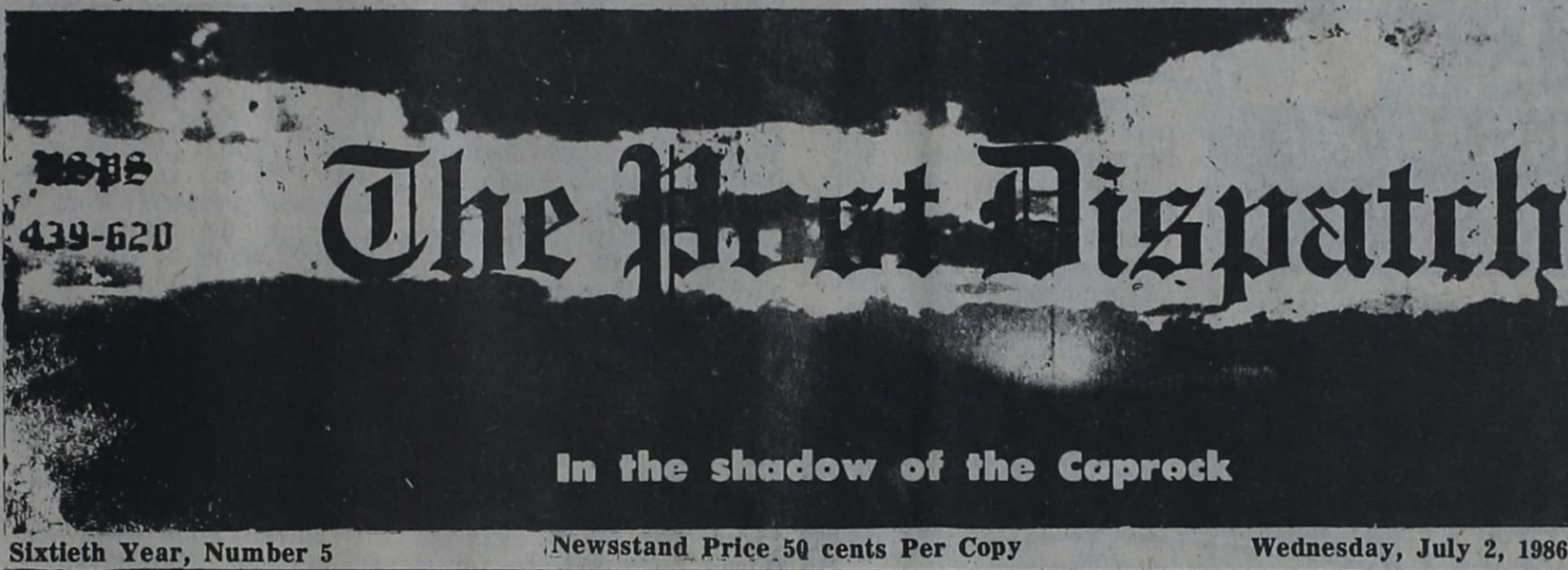
Roundtrip bus fare.

# Citizens Get 'Main St.' Answers

An interested group of citizens met Tuesday, June 24 at the Post Community Center to find out more about the Texas Main Street Project.

Sponsored by the Post Chamber of Commerce and the Post Main Street Committee, the public forum featured a slide presentation by Pampa's Main Street Project Manager Lynn Moulton.

Following the slide presentation, Moulton answered specific questions from a wide variety of citizens.

Moulton emphasized that the Main Street program is a community-wide effort, aimed at improving the quality of life for the participating cities.

She is the first Main Street manager in Pampa.

Moulton explained that by being selected as an official Main Street city,

Post would benefit with the expertise of the professional staff in Austin.

Marketing, architectural, promotional and organizational planning are just a few of the support areas offered to participating cities.

This year only five cities are expected to be named in the highly competitive selection process.

Applications are due in Austin in August, and staff members make unannounced visits to applicant cities during the decision-making process.

The Post application is being prepared under the direction of the Post Chamber of Commerce.

"Your tremendous opportunities in tourism, especially with the main highways here and the new lakes to be built, puts you in such a great position for

taking advantage of the Main Street program," Moulton said.

A caller to the office

Monday morning raises an important question...why is East 15th Street in such bad repair and when will it get the attention it so badly needs?

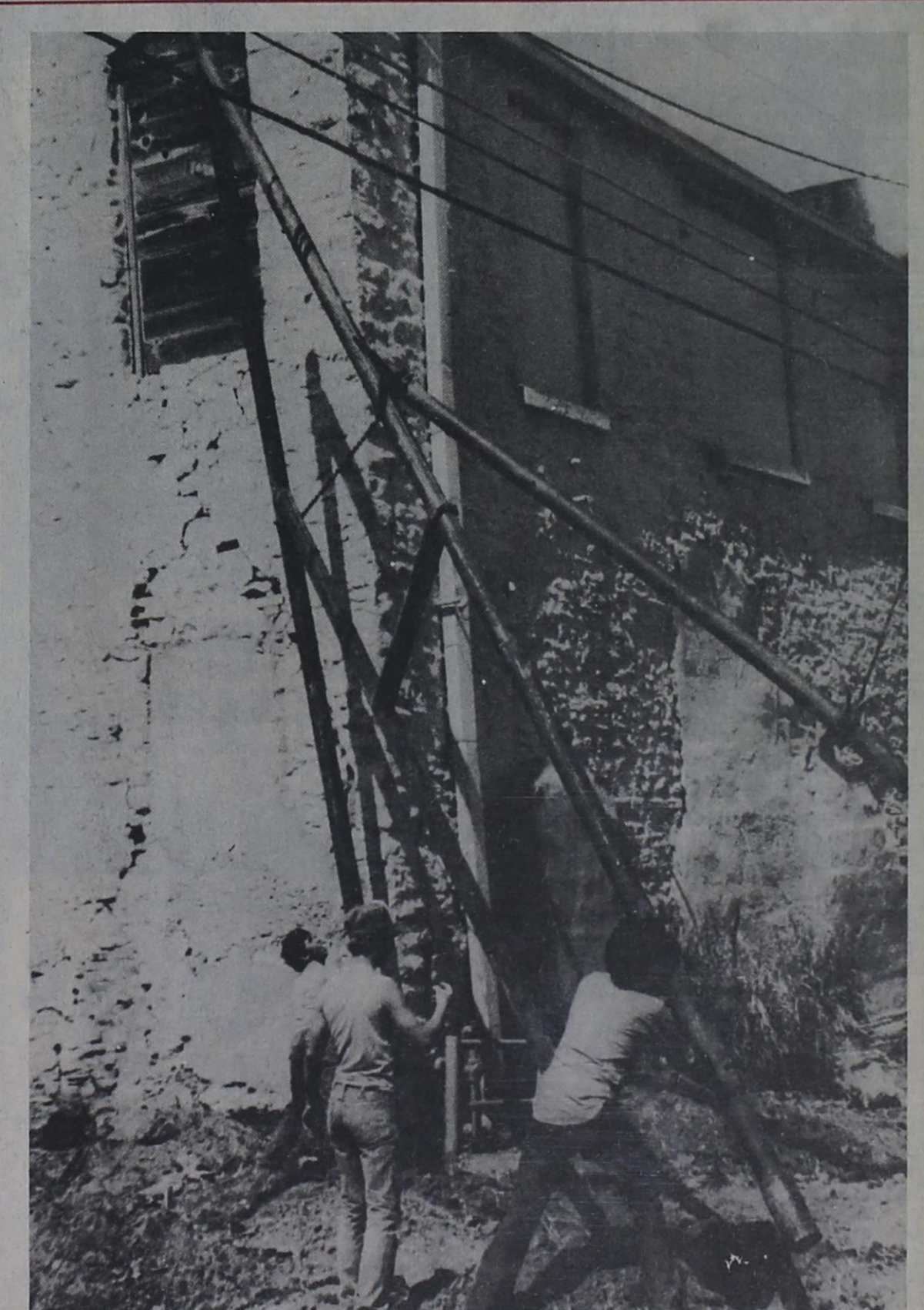
The problem, as anyone who has tried to use the street to cut across from U.S. Highway 84 to Texas 207 knows, is the poor condition of the street up to the railroad tracks and then across the tracks and onto the other side.

In previous questions about this issue to city hall, I have learned that maintenance on the street is difficult due to a seepage of water underneath the road bed.

Another problem is an ongoing conflict between the city of Post and the Texas Highway Department.

The city claims, with some good reason, that the street is really a major by-pass from U.S. Highway 84 to Texas 207 and that most of the traffic is from

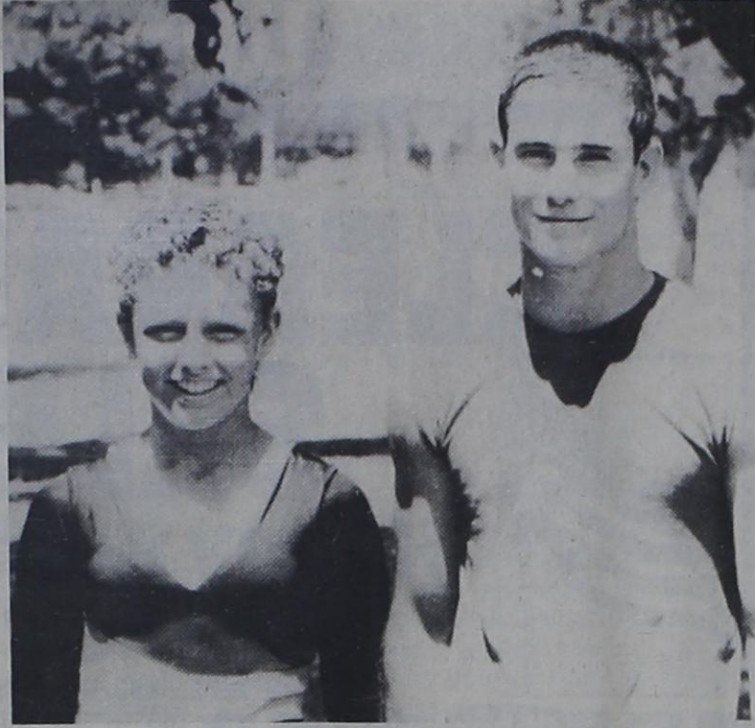
**'Top of Texas' to perform at Park**

the main highway and should be maintained by the state.

How tragic that even after the drug induced death of a young person, people can, and will, continue to deny that there is a PROBLEM in schools throughout our nation.

No school or community, no matter how large or small, is immune from drugs and alcohol abuse today.

The PROBLEM is in denying that drugs are available to, and used by, a large population of young people from every walk of life.

Directly below the Washington caption and story were articles headed, "ADDED EDUCATION SOUGHT ON PERILS OF DRUG USE," Orlando, Fla. (AP) and Associated Press release, "Bias WAS AMONG SEVERAL DRAFTS MINUS DIPLOMAS."

How ironic it is that here in Texas the infamous No Pass No Play HB 72 stresses the importance of academics in order to participate in sports, but

allows no time for alcohol-drug education in our school system.

Educational programs on alcohol and drugs must become a top priority in our schools, beginning as early as kindergarten on through high school. Classroom teachers cannot be expected to take on the added responsibility of alcohol-drug education, they are professionals hired to teach our children the academics of education.

To provide alcohol-drug education for their students many schools are rearranging their tight academic schedules to include programs provided by agencies and volunteers in their area.

Garza County and the City of Post have worked hard to provide a resource for alcohol-drug education-awareness programs in our community through the City County Drug and Alcohol Abuse program. However if time is not allotted in our schools for the education of drugs and alcohol, programs cannot be implemented into our school system. One hour a week allotted to the purpose of arming our youth with information about the perils of drug use could mean the difference between a lifetime of addiction, and or death by overdose, or graduating from high school with a record of accomplishments in both academics and sports.

Parents and concerned citizens are the only voices that can be heard over HB 72 in order to see that time is allotted for their children's education of alcohol and drug abuse.

The City County Drug and Alcohol Abuse program

can and will be available to provide an educational program in cooperation with our schools.

If you support the belief that your child deserves the benefit of alcohol-drug education during his or her formative years, please let your voice be heard. Call your neighbors, contact the school board, teachers, administrators and counselors. Write letters to Governor Mark White, Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby and letters to

the editor and express your interest to our city and county elected officials.

Education is not the only answer to drugs but with a concentrated effort by the citizens of Post, we may SOMEDAY be able to say in all assurance that there is NO DRUG PROBLEM IN POST.

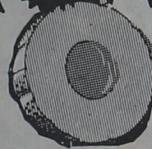

## Wheat Producers Get Survey

Wheat producers will soon be receiving ballots to determine whether they would favor imposing mandatory limits on wheat production.

The balloting is for a poll required by the food security act of 1985.

Victor Ashley, director

of the Garza County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, said that producers will be asked if they favor imposition of mandatory limits on production of wheat which will result in wheat prices that are not lower than 125 percent of their

cost of production. "Response from wheat producers is voluntary," Ashley said, "and the polls non-binding upon the Secretary of Agriculture. The results of the poll won't require the secretary to take a particular action."

"It's not a referendum, but it is a way for wheat producers to express their desires about a farm program," Ashley adds.

Wheat poll ballots will be mailed to each producer June 25 and responses must be postmarked by July 14.

## FHA Participates in 'Operation Assist'

The Farmers Home Administration office in Lynn County will begin immediately to participate in "Operation Assist", Curtis Barlow, County Supervisor, announced today.

Operation Assist is a new effort by FmHA to help farmers obtain guaranteed operating loans.

County Supervisors for FmHA will take completed farm credit applications to local banks or other lenders, along with the farmer wishing to apply for a guaranteed loan.

"We will handcarry the applications, and personally introduce the applicants to our local lenders", said Mr Barlow.

"We will present a com-

plete loan package, including cash flows, financial statements, and appraisals. If necessary, we will make a commitment to work with the lender to do an interest buydown. We will do everything we can to help the lender, and the borrower, by committing to guarantee the loan at our maximum 90 percent".

While direct operating loan funds are used up in some areas, there is still nearly \$800 million available for the guarantee program.

County FmHA officials hope other lenders will make operating credit available under the guarantee, with most of the paperwork done beforehand by FmHA.

## Senior Citizens Urged to Review Earnings

Many beneficiaries who work apparently feel that when they make their annual earnings report by April 15 to the Social Security Administration, they have met their obligation to report earnings for the year.

This is not true and often leads to overpayment of benefits.

Now is a good time to review your 1986 earnings in the light of your present work and make sure your earnings estimate has not changed.

Remember, the benefit you receive reflects your estimate of earnings.

The annual earnings test permits retirees to have some earnings and still receive Social Security benefits.

Earnings above the exempt amount reduce the benefit by \$1 for each \$2 of earnings above the exempt amount.

The earnings limit for 1986 is \$7,800 for people

65-70 and \$5,760 for people under age 65.

Beneficiaries age 70 during the entire year are exempt from the earnings test.

An annual earnings report is required from people who work or expect to work and earn over the exempt amount who receive some benefits for the year.

It requires the person to report earnings from the past year and to estimate earnings for the present year.

However, recent studies indicate that many people fail to report changes in the estimates and incur overpayments--the payment of benefits to which they are not entitled.

This is generally done by withholding all or portions of future checks, but may be repaid in a lump sum.

As part of a program to reduce its debt load Social Security has been sending a mid-year reminder to working beneficiaries.

The notice, which generally goes out by August, alerts them to the need to correct their earnings re-

port as soon as possible to avoid accumulation of debt.

But waiting for the reminder is just as bad as waiting for next year to the extent that the longer one waits to adjust benefits, the more money he or she may have to repay.

A change in earnings may be reported to Social Security by phone, mail, or in person.

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# DPS Cautions July 4th Drivers

Major Cawthon warned,

"Motorists also need to be on the lookout for people that are using the back road areas to discharge fireworks, especially the smaller children. The people that drive out into the country to discharge fireworks need to be especially cautious and watch out for fires and

protect other peoples' property."

So whether you plan a trip across town or maybe across the state, by observing all traffic laws,

not drinking and driving and driving as if your life depends on it, you can make this July 4th holiday safe and more enjoyable for everyone.

## Ag Lenders Put More Emphasis on Collateral

Agricultural lenders are putting increased emphasis on the repayment ability of farmers and ranchers.

"Because collateral based lending has several major weaknesses, lenders are starting to give more consideration to the borrower's ability to repay the loan," points out Dr. Danny Klinefelter, economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

Collateral based lending considers only the protection of the lender and does not address whether or not the loan will benefit the borrower, notes Klinefelter. This type of lending also focuses on the expected value of collateral at the due date of the note or at the date of the next scheduled payment.

Therefore, there is a tendency for lenders to be more liberal and for borrowers to borrow excessively when asset values are appreciating.

"With lending based on repayment ability, collateral is viewed in its proper role as providing insurance and control, not as the justification for borrowing or lending," Klinefelter points out.

The problem is that many lenders and farmers are only going half-way in analyzing repayment ability by only evaluating annual cash flow projections, says the economist.

Cash flow analysis is an important element of repayment ability, but on an annual basis, it is a short-run concept.

A firm can be going broke and still be generating a positive cash flow by reamortizing debts, selling off assets (including inventories) and not replacing capital assets on a regular basis (living off of depreciation).

"The frequently neglected half of repayment analysis is profitability," says Klinefelter.

"Without sufficient inheritances, non-farm income or asset appreciation to offset losses, a business has to be profitable to survive in the long run."

Even in those cases where profitability is evaluated, it is usually on the borrower's cash-basis of tax returns.

This is fine for tax management purposes, but it can significantly misrepresent business performance, Klinefelter points out.

True profitability has to be analyzed on an accrual basis.

Accrual income can be estimated fairly accurately by a series of adjustments to the cash basis data to account for changes in inventories, accounts payable and accrued expenses.

These adjustments are relatively simple, notes the economist, but they are critical because cash basis accounting can frequently cover up developing profitability problems for as much as two years.

That can be critical to both the borrower and the lender.

"By considering both cash flow projections and profitability, repayment based lending is a step in the right directions," says Klinefelter.



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
