The smallest of cities are beginning to spread to such an extent that "downtown" shopping does not offer a complete picture of goods and services available.

Retailers who once paid premium rents for locations of maximum traffic in the downtown area have moved to locations more accessible to automobiles, with spacious parking areas.

In a town of 8,000 the housewife may travel twenty miles to visit the major food stores or various gift shops in her community. There is probably no store she automatically passes once a week.

The dispersment of retail firms has made it more convenient to shop by automobile. But because of distances and expense involved, the change has restricted comparative shopping.

Consequently, the merchant, to remain competitive, is forced to find a substitute for his location of high traffic.

In larger cities, the answer became apparent long ago, increased advertising. Suburban merchants in lower rent areas realized that rental savings could best be spent for promotion. At the same time, downtown merchants increased advertising in an effort to preserve their high traffic positions.

Even before the trend toward the spread of retailing to the city limits and beyond, the local newspaper was already the place of maximum shopping traffic. It was already the biggest rent saving device in retailing.

But since foot-shopping has become unnecessary, and in some cities impossible, the need for convenient shopping information in the local newspaper has become more important to both retailer and buyer.

3.6 MILES OF FARM-TO-MARKET ROAD APPROVED FOR COUNTY

The Texas Highway Commission approved development of 3.6 miles of Farm to Market Roads in Callahan County as part of the 1967 Texas Farm to Market program.

District Engineer J. C. Roberts of the Texas Highway Department said estimated cost of the work is \$81,000.

The work will be under the supervision of Mr. Elmer L. Harris, Resident Engineer, Abilene.

The work authorized for this county is part of 949.3 miles of Texas Farm and Ranch to Market Roads earmarked for development in the new program.

The program lists 228 projects

in 166 counties. Estimated cost at \$24.6 million.

New mileage included in the program totals 623 miles. Other mileage was previously designated or is being constructed in stages.

The additional mileage brings designated Farm to Market Roads in Texas to 38.7 thousand miles. This is greater than the entire State-maintained highway mileage of many other States.

BAIRD CHAMBER OF COMMERCE MOVES OFFICE TO 427 MARKET

The Baird Chamber of Commerce office moved to a new location, Friday, June 2. This move, from 320 Market Street to the Chamber's medical building at 427 Market Street, was authorized in a meeting of the board held in May.

Claud Holley, Chamber manager, explained that this move did not mean the board had given up trying to locate a doctor for Baird. If a doctor should be secured, Holley said, the chamber office would relocate immediately.

The move was for economic purposes, Holley said, as the chamber was paying rent at

their previous location, plus making payments on the medical building.

Recent improvements have been made to the medical building including replacing the roof, as reported by Mr. Holley.

Demolished By Fire Mon.

A flash gasoline fire demolished the interior and rear half of a pickup truck, owned by Pete Barbian, Rt. 1, Baird, at an Abilene service station Monday at 7:45 a. m.

Fire Capt. W. B. Johnson of Abilene said gasoline was being pumped into the truck when the fumes flashed, possibly from a cigarette.

Johnson quoted Barbian as saying he wasn't certain whether or not he was smoking at the time. He said Barbian told him the vapors ignited as he opened the door of the truck.

Barbian received singed hair on the head and arms, but did not require hospitalization.

Baird Man Injured Near Anson Tuesday

Travis Hunt was seriously injured at noon Tuesday, on a construction job between Anson and Stamford.

A water truck rolled back and upon the left side of Hunt's body. He is in the intensive care unit at Hendrick Memorial Hospital in Abilene.

The accident happened during the noon hour, as the crew was having lunch. He is employed by Austin Construction Co. Hunt received bruises to the left side and serious injury to the pelvis area.

The Hunts live at 640 W. 5th Street, in Baird.

A low bid of \$128,890.00 for construction of 12 low-rent housing units has been approved by the board of the local Housing Authority. Bids were opened and considered by the board Thursday, June 1.

This bid, submitted by Herman Bennett Construction Co. of Brownwood, is \$1,555.00 above the architects estimate of \$127,335.00 made some five months ago.

The local-board is allowed a 2 1/2% contingency above the architect's estimate, which in this project could have amounted to much more than the \$1,555.00.

Before actual construction begins, the low bid must be approved by the HUD office in Fort Worth. The bid has been submitted to that office and approval is expected soon, after which contracts will be signed. The local board is hopeful that construction will begin by July 1st.

The project, which the contractor is allowed 270 calendar days to complete, includes 10 units for elderly people to be located at Arch and 2nd Streets and 2 units at the Housing Authority's present location on Girard Street.

Development on the Authority's present location consists of 16 units, which were completed in 1963 and first occupied in May of that year.

Since that time, the Authority has supplied numerous low-income families and senior citizens with modern, tastefully constructed homes.

Application may be made now for rental of one of the new units to be constructed by contacting Claud Holley, Executive Secretary of the local Authority.

Taylor County Deputy Sheriff Ray Trammell said a 22 pistol lay near the body, and estimated the time of death to be Saturday afternoon or evening. Justice of the Peace Silas Clark ruled death was due to self-inflicted gunshot wounds.

Coppinger was born Jan. 6, 1946, in Abilene. He attended Valley View and Lamar Elementary Schools, Franklin Junior High and Abilene High School. He had just completed his junior year at Texas Tech.

He was a leader in youth activities at Central Presbyterian, a tennis letterman at AHS, an Eagle Scout and a member of the Order of the Arrow.

Geographical Names Mystery

Residents of Callahan County were asked this week to help solve the mystery of the origins of several geographical names found on county maps.

The information is needed for a dictionary of Texas place names, including Callahan and the other 253 counties, to be published soon by the East Texas State University Press. Before Dr. Fred Tarpley professor of English at the university, submits his final manuscript, he is appealing to county residents for assistance in contributing information about several names with unexplained origins.

With the following exceptions, the reasons for the choice of approximately 200 names found on detailed maps of the county have already been determined: Burnt Branch, Dressy, East and West Caddo Peak, Eula, Herd Branch, Jenkins Creek, Lytle Creek, Pueblo Community, Rainy Creek, Seaton and Spring Creek.

Dr. Tarpley, who started his research on Texas geographical names five years ago, has exhausted material available to him in history books, newspaper files, student research, and interviews with county leaders. He is hoping that the story behind the naming of the communities, creeks, and other geographical sites listed above can be explained before his book goes to press.

Information will be welcomed by Dr. Fred Tarpley, Department of English, East Texas State University, Commerce, Texas 75428.

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"WEEKLY MEDITATIONS"

TRUE GREATNESS

"There arose an argument amongst them as to which of them should be the greatest. But when Jesus knew the thoughts of their hearts he took a child and set him beside him. Whosoever, he said to them, receives this child in my name, receives me; and whosoever receives me, receives Him that sent me. He who is least among you, he it is who is the greatest."

Luke 9:46-48.

So long as the Twelve thought of Jesus' Kingdom as an earthly kingdom it was quite inevitable that they should be in competition between each other for the highest place in it.

Jesus knew what was going on in their minds concerning their personal ambitions. He took a child and placed him beside Himself; that seat would be the seat of highest honor. He went on to say that whoever received a little child, received Him; and whoever received Him, received God. What did He mean? The child was quite unimportant. The Twelve were the chosen helpers of Jesus; but this child held no place of honor and held no official position. So Jesus said, "If you are prepared to spend your lives serving people, helping people, loving people, who in the eyes of the world do not matter at all, you are serving me and you are serving God." Jesus is saying that if you are prepared to spend your life doing apparently unimportant things and never trying to be what the world calls great, then you will be great in the eyes of God.

Jesus was directing the attention of His chosen helpers to the fact that there are so many wrong motives for service. The Christian is to be found working not for a place of prestige among men, but for God. And when the Christian works as God directs him, prestige will be the last thing that enters into his mind for we know that our best is not good enough for God.

Jesus is emphasizing that if

a man is given a task or a position or an office in the Church, he should regard it not as an honor but as a responsibility. There are those who serve within the Church, not thinking really of those they serve, but thinking of themselves. To be chosen for an office is to be set apart for service, not elevated to honor in the eyes of men.

Jesus foresaw the problem that many would serve or give so long as his service and his generosity are known, so long as he is thanked and praised. Therefore, if we give, only to gain something out of our giving for ourselves, we have undone all the good we might have done.

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
