The belated economic boom could be called another victory for advertising -- especially advertising in local newspapers. It is a credit to the insight of retailers throughout the United States.

Even to the surprise of newspaper publishers throughout the country -- and in the smallest cities -- local retail advertising has been increasing in spite of an apparent indifferent public.

The retailers, without the aid of sophisticated computers, seemed to sense that consumer buying power was not being fully tapped. And newspaper advertising was boosted.

"WEEKLY MEDITATIONS"

"BE STILL AND KNOW"

Psalm 46:10

It is, I suppose a truism to say we are living in a day of speed. Never before in the history of mankind has life been for everyone, whether they will or no, such an endless rush as it is today. The speed of travel has been increased so much. A man can eat breakfast in London, breakfast again in New York, breakfast again in Los Angeles.

In the industrial world the keynote tends more and more to speed. When you walk into a large modern factory not only the whirr of machinery, but the whole effort of the factory seems to be concentrated on rapidity of production. Often a psychologist is brought in to see if a person standing right or left can pack a box more in an hour. Everything that makes for the smooth running of machinery raises our standard of living, but it makes us conscious of the vital need to abstain from the rush of things, to cease from bustle and hustle and be still.

This is necessary because of the danger of breakdown. You can walk about a great mill on Sunday afternoon, and there will be something almost uncanny about the great silent looms, each like some giant asleep. It is not only the machinery, but the mill workers that need rest. When machinery is run day after day without pause, little maladjustments appear and become greater, and sometimes the great giants have a "nervous breakdown," which a timely pause would have averted. If this is true of

machinery, it's even more true of the human body and mind. It cannot continue at a rapid pace under nervous tension without danger.

The same principle is followed by the musical composer. Any lover of good music will have noticed how often an orchestral selection will begin very softly, only a small part of the orchestra coming into play; then volume is gradually increased until the whole orchestra sends forth a crescendo of sound, a great pageant of harmony. The audience will listen in delight and strained attention until the pleased is almost touched with pain in the volume of sound. Then suddenly the music stops, and begins again with softly played instruments, giving a chance for tired nerves to recover.

It is not only in industry, music and drama that these principles apply. Surely the whole of life, "like music, has its rhythm of silence and sound." If only to relieve the nerve strains which the rush of life brings, we need more than ever in these days to learn to be still. Not only rest, but time for thought. We cannot live from hand to mouth without pausing and asking where one is going and why. It is so easy on the freeways to take the wrong turn and get lost. It is so easy to take the wrong path, or make the wrong decision, and find ourselves in a dilemma.

If we would live adequately and not be guilty of the folly of being too busy with details to see life as a whole, then

somehow we must discover how to be still and to think.

If an architect is going to do anything more than routine work, if he is to put permanent value into his job, he must sit at the feet of the great masters and study them. If a man would write a treatise, he must first sit at the feet of the great master of his subject.

Living is a skilled job, and the building of great character is not to be slovenly or unskilled. I am certain that if this generation is to make anything of its job of character building, without which no world problems can be solved, we have got to learn to be still, to give adequate time to thinking, to sit at the feet of the great masters of life, and above all, at the feet of Jesus Christ, the true Master of Life.
