Throughout medieval England the honest worker was respected and afforded the dignity which his calling inspired. Individuals were identified with a short job description to separate them from others with the same personal name.

Over the years the job description became a surname for families. Thus did John the Shoemaker become John Shoemaker. Family name was a mark of honor for those skilled in elite and humane occupations. It was a form of highly personalized advertising.

After an industrial revolution, industry became organized on a largescale, impersonal basis. The individual surnames no longer were used to denote skill or honesty of profession. Instead, another name became more important — the business or corporate name.

For that reason the business itself now must have a good name, or reputation.

Customers are no longer content to trade with a man because of his family name.

Owners of local shops are often disappointed when their customers of many years begin shopping in a newly opened store which offers a few cents' discount of various items.

Most small retailers, however, can retain their share of the market by resourceful advertising.

A reputation of honesty, skill and innovation is not easily gained, and consumers know it.

For this reason, when a business is sold, the buyer often pays as much for the reputation or tangible "good will" as he pays for physical assets themselves.

However, in the fluid business world of today, even in the smallest city, the prestige of a firm's name can be built and maintained only through consistent advertising which reaches the whole community.

## Paving Project Planned Here

The City of Baird and Baird Chamber of Commerce has plans under way for a Paving Project, if sufficient interest is shown by property owners to secure 8 or 10 blocks needed to bring a contractor. Coltharp Construction Co. has made the best offer to include necessary base work and materials, along with paving to meet Farm-to-Market Construction Standards of the Texas Highway Department.

If possible, paving should be connected to presently paved areas and only full blocks will be paved, no skips or open areas can be worked. The City will pave intersections and alleys where the 20 ft. alley fronts the street being paved. They

will also consider an arrangement for monthly payments on paving where property owners show need for this assistance.

Several streets have been proposed by residents on the street, who have agreed to work up their block. Forms, per front foot costs and other information has been prepared by the Chamber of Commerce and is available for interested property owners.

It is suggested that those interested in paving in their block contact the City Hall or the Chamber of Commerce for information and assistance in working their block. Committee from the Chamber will be available for this work.

Belt Buckles for all first place winners. Second and third place prizes will be awarded by the Rodeo Association.

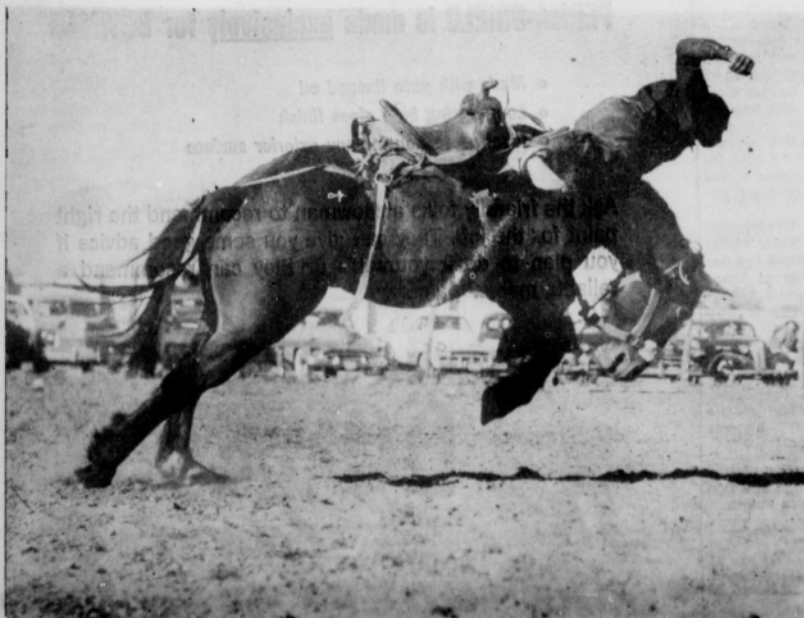
A special feature during this first annual event will be a Match Roping with two skilled cowboys, Joey Ranne of Brady and Jackie Cannon of Clyde,

**AUSTIN** — State Supreme Court has ruled that the constitutional amendment requiring annual voter registration in Texas is valid.

**AFL-CIO** challenged the amendment. They contended that voters did not get "fair notice" that the amendment provided for annual registration.

State labor officials pledged to take the issue to the highest federal court.

State Supreme Court agreed with ruling of the Third Court of Civil Appeals that the amendment - approved by Texans last year - to abolish the poll tax as a requirement for voting and substitute annual sign-up should stand. There was no opinion. Appellate judges had reversed the trial court findings.

Austin District Judge Herman Jones agreed that the full purpose of the amendment was not adequately described in the proposition on the ballot. It stated only that the poll tax would be knocked out as a voting requirement. Last April the Court of Civil Appeals said it was unlikely any voter in view of widespread publicity given the issue, failed to understand what he was voting on.

Roy Evans, Secretary-Treasurer of the Texas AFL-CIO, said the State Supreme Court will be asked for a rehearing. If that is rejected, a hearing will be requested before the U. S. Supreme Court.

Meanwhile, Texas election machinery and voter registration for the big 1968 election year will proceed under annual

sign-up law as amended this year. All voters, including those who live in cities under 10,000 population, must register between October and January.

In other cases, the State Supreme Court: Left standing lower court decisions refusing cash judgments to two parties to the collapse of Billie Sol Estes' fortunes. Case originated in Pecos District Court.

Reversed Amarillo Court of Civil Appeals and sustaining district court in holding that 49 strikers against the Shamrock Oil and Gas Corporation in 1964 could draw unemployment benefits due to circumstances of their joblessness. (Strikers had offered to return to work).

Upheld Third Court of Civil Appeals' ruling that State Savings and Loan Commissioner was justified in denying a branch office application for downtown Houston of the Gibraltar Savings Association.

**ATTY. GENERAL RULES** — Oil and gas produced on federal land at Corpus Christi Naval Air Station are subject to state production and pipeline taxes (except for 16-2.3 per cent payable as royalty to the U.C.), Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin has held.

In other opinions, Martin has concluded that: A \$1,500,000 appropriation to construct protective devices at railroad grade crossings is constitutional.

If a county commissioner is a director or stockholder in a bank desiring to receive bond issue funds, the county commissioners court does not have authority to designate that bank

as a county depository.

**HIGHWAYS** — As July began, the State Highway Department had \$618,899,810 worth of highway construction under contract. During June, contractors were paid \$35,802,146 for work completed.

In 1919, only \$273,000 was spent for road construction.

**WELFARE** — An audit of the State Department of Public Welfare reveals that \$461,000,000 in federal and state money was used in Texas during the two years ending last August 31 on welfare programs.

Rate was \$120,000,000 last year, of which \$168,620,302 was in direct grants to the needy aged, blind, children and disabled, plus \$41,431,797 for medical care for the needy aged. While aid to dependent children and those who are permanently disabled continues to rise, training programs are reducing the amount of aid needed by blind persons.

Distribution of surplus commodities also is handled by this department. In two years, 45,000,000 pounds of flour, \$19,000,000 pounds of corn meal and 17,000,000 pounds of dry milk were distributed to needy families from federal surpluses. However, the amount distributed is declining as the government stockpiles are used up and high employment is reducing the number of needy families.

Payroll and other administrative costs for giving away \$215,000,000 came to \$12,708,278.

**SCREWORM REPORT** — Between May 28 and July 1, some 19 cases of screwworms were confirmed in Texas.

To prevent spread of the disease, Screwworm Eradication Program planes recently released 757,780,000 sterile screwworm flies in Texas. Some 106,144,000 were dropped over Trans-Pecos and the Valley portions of Texas.

**HIGHER RATES AUTHORIZED** — Texas Railroad Commission has authorized higher rates for shipments of household goods by specialized carriers. No increase was allowed

**COLEMAN PARK GRANT APPROVED** — City of Coleman will receive a \$124,810 federal grant to help develop a 139-acre park site at Coleman Lake, 14 miles north of the city. Grant is under the federal land and water conservation fund program.

City will put up an equal amount to landscape the area and provide boat ramps, picnic units, camping sites, trailer units, playground, swimming beach, fishing piers, concession building, bath house, restroom and necessary utilities.

**SHORT SNORTS**

Secretary of State John L. Hill, who becomes chief election officer of Texas under a new law effective August 28, has called a statewide conference on recent election law changes for October 27.

State Water Pollution Control Board approved application of Orange for a permit to replace Simmons Drive Sewage treatment plant with another and increase amount of treated sewage discharge into the Sabine River.

Texas Banking Commissioner announced applications for Duncannonville (Dallas County) State Bank and Valley Bank of El Paso charters.

Construction men, landscape architects, and State Board of Control gardeners have started the big job of tearing up the lawn and parking pavillion of the Governor's Mansion to transform it into a \$150,000 formal garden - a real coup for Mrs. Connally and the 38,000 members of Texas Garden Clubs who are making the Mansion Garden their major project.

Values of building permits issued in Texas during June fell four per cent according to the UT's Bureau of Business Research.

Texas Water Development Board and Texas Water Rights Commission authorized the Sabine River Authority of Texas to issue an additional \$4,000,000 in revenue bonds to help pay for the Texas half of the Toledo Bend Reservoir.

Texas is the 33rd state to ratify an agreement with Interstate Commerce Commission to help each other enforce state and federal highway transportation laws.

## "WEEKLY MEDITATIONS"

**"Paul's Concept of God"**  
Acts 17: 21-31  
For as I passed by and beheld your devotions I found an altar with this inscription, "TO AN UNKNOWN GOD." Whom therefore you ignorantly worship, HIM declare I unto you.

Paul's concept of God is set forth in this great discourse. He had been taken to Athens by friends. At that time it was the capital of Attica, now the capital of Greece. It was then the center of Literature, art, science, and religion. It has been called the school-mistress of Europe.

It was an idolatrous city. His soul was irritated when he saw idols everywhere. In the Synagogue he discussed religion with the Jews and the proselytes. He addressed people in the market place. Every day he found an audience of interested people. Some of the philosophers became interested in Paul. The Epicurians were atheists and pleasure lovers. The Stoics were pantheists and fatalists. They were all prone to ask: "What ever does this fellow mean with his scraps of learning?" "He looks like a herald of foreign dieties." Taking him to the Areopagus, a hill on which the Supreme Court held its sessions, they asked him, "What is this novel teaching of yours?" In response, Paul gave his famous sermon. He recognized the religious spirit of the Athenians. He said, "I observe that at every turn you are a religious people. As I passed by, I came upon an altar with the inscription, To An Unknown God. Well, I proclaim to you what you ignorantly worship." Then he gives his glorious concepts of God.

1. God is the Creator of the universe. He made the world and all things in it He is the Lord of heaven and earth. He gives life and breath to all men. St. John Herschel, English Astronomer and able Scientist, said, "Science will teach man how God deals with him physically in this world; and as he learns both the wisdom and love of such dealings, man cannot but know and love his Maker better."

2. God is the Director of the universe. He created all nations from a common origin. He fixed their allotted periods and the boundaries of their abode. He meant for them to seek Him on the chance of finding Him. Many believe that God directs the Universe, and order their lives accordingly. There is a unique place of worship in Wales, near the town of Swansea. It is called the Miner's Sanctuary. 750 feet below the

surface, in a coal mine, there is a crude desk on a lump of coal for a pulpit. Rough-hewn planks for pews. A strange place to worship, but here the miners gather every Monday morning, to ask God's blessings on the week of work. There is a Mot-to inscribed over the pulpit which reads, "IF IT IS A NIGHT WITHOUT STARS, IT IS NOT NIGHT WITHOUT GOD. FOR HE REIGNETH UNDER THE FOUNDATIONS OF THE MOUNTAINS."

3. God is the life of the Universe. He is close to each one of us. God made man from the dust of the earth, and breathed into his nostrils the breath of life and man became a living soul. Tennyson had this in mind when he wrote:

"Closer is He than breathing,  
Nearer than hands and feet."  
There is mystery here, of course, but it says that we are indissolubly linked with God, and that because He lives, we shall live also. We are immortal.

4. God is the Judge of the Universe. We ought not to imagine that the Divine nature resembles gold, silver, or stone, the product of man's device or art. Times of ignorance God over-looked, but now He calls upon all men to repent; inasmuch as He has fixed a day on which He will judge the world justly, by One whom He has destined for this.

When one comes to this faith as Paul had, then he can believe that all things work together for good to them that love God. Man can live upon it every day.

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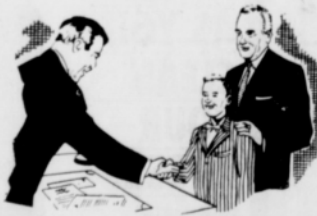

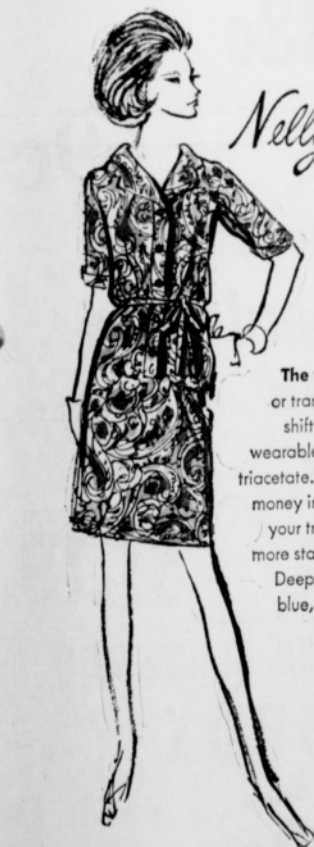
