Callahan County has shown oil gains during the past few years.

The U. S. Bureau of Mines in 1965 show that 2,222,200 barrels of oil were produced, at a market value of \$6,577,400. Natural gas produced in the county was valued at \$199,400.

Royalty payments from the gas and oil was \$847,100. Drilling for 1966 took \$2,702,221 with \$1,462,595 spent on dry holes.

Ranking 110 among the oil and gas producing counties in the state, it was 74 persons working, for a payroll of \$233,764.

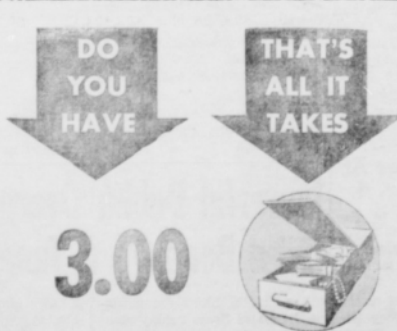

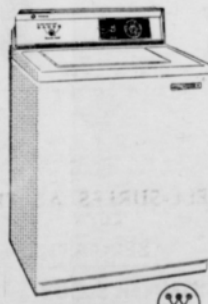

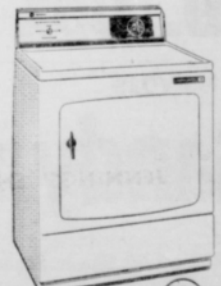
