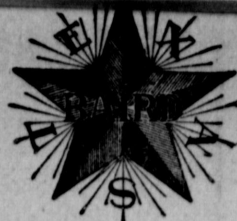

QUESTION OF MONEY AND ITS ANSWER.

men are asking this question: "All these western banks are perfectly sound, as they claim to be, and it is that they cannot pay their depositors all they ask and not return them to \$100?"

The reason is this. No bank can call its deposits in cash. If it did, this it would not be long in the banking business for it would make interest upon this large amount of money.

Banks are run to make money for owners and stockholders. To take care of the accounts of depositors requires a large force of clerks and cashiers. To pay these expenses money must be loaned. It is loaned in varying sums and for varying periods of time from thirty days to three years.

It would be manifestly impossible for any bank to convert all these loans and mortgages into cash, over and over. They are time loans and cannot be called until they are due.

Almost all of the western banks keep at least 25 per cent of their deposits in money, that is, in their own vaults and with other banks. The banks carry as high as 40 per cent of their deposit in this form. The national bank law requires 25 per cent.

Each bank carries a considerable deposit in other cities. The Colorado banks carry deposits in New York, Chicago, Denver, Pueblo and elsewhere. They do this because they frequently draw drafts on these particular cities. If a customer comes to pay for a bill of goods in New York for example, the bank, instead of sending the money to New York, writes a New York draft, and this draft is charged against their deposit in a New York bank. It saves sending money back forth by express every day and every expense.

And now as to the currency or cash. Banks hold a certain percentage of their money in actual "backs," in gold and in silver. They hold what they think will be able to meet their requirements, then some more for a margin. When they run short of this cash, through payments, they draw on the other cities for more, they draw on the banks where they have deposits. The center of this distribution of cash is the New York banks. But, through the New York banks, through stringency and fear that they will have a run, will not send out cash until things have eased up. Chicago cannot get the currency in New York, Denver cannot get it in Chicago, and Colorado Springs cannot get it from Denver. And so the banks, in order to prevent a drain on their cash, are obliged to return in this \$100 rule.

If this were not done there would be a drain upon the cash resources of the West for the benefit of New York; for a man with a New York Chicago draft could cash it here and the local bank would be merely debited with the amount, but would have no cash in return. No bank, not even the Bank of England, could stand a constant drain of this sort, unless it could replenish its cash resources.

Nine-tenths of the business of the world is done on "paper," that is to say, by means of checks, drafts, bills of exchange and so on. It is simply efficient except on occasions like these when people get nervous. It is better than cash because money may be lost, destroyed or stolen and that the end of it, but checks, drafts and so forth may be replaced.

And thus it is that the local banks are acted with wisdom and prudence in putting in the rule adopted elsewhere until conditions once more are normal and the ebb and flow of currency begins again. There is not

the slightest question of solvency, but merely a shortage of actual currency. The banks are wise in protecting their reserves for their own behalf, and that of their depositors, from any drain for the benefit of outsiders.—Colorado Springs Telegraph.

Editor Johnston of the Houston Post can't understand how a man can be a prohibitionist and a democrat at the same time. He should apply to Joe Bailey, who is an out-and-out, dyed-in-the-wool prohibitionist, so much so that he contributes money to the cause.—Waco Times-Herald.

It looks like the war is over when a Republican president can pay a decent compliment to the worth as a citizen and soldier like Jeff Davis, as President Roosevelt did at Vicksburg the other day. The time has been not so long ago that no president could have done this without raising a howl in the north that would have scared an average politician out of his boots.

Callahan County took the prize at the State Fair for the best agricultural exhibit. While this fact may not show that Callahan has the best agricultural lands in the State, it goes a long way toward showing that Callahan County is filled with a most energetic and wise people in endeavoring to show the world her wealth and the opportunities within her borders for industrious farmers.—Dallas News.

THE STAR is in receipt of the Dallas Fair Souvenir Edition of the West Texas Journal published at Barstow, Jas. S. Carter, editor. This is a fine illustrated edition of the Journal printed on book paper, neatly gotten up with quite a number of illustrations of scenes around Barstow. Irrigation is making the Pecos Valley the garden spot of West Texas.

The idea of San Antonio being dry on Sunday seems to cause no end of amusement to the press gang all over Texas. Most of them have been to San Antonio and none of them we suppose ever thought of San Antonio as a dry town—even for one day hence the fun. A local paper says it don't see anything funny about it, and that is what makes it amusing. It certainly is a serious matter to San Antonians, but it might be worse. Just suppose they had seven dry days in a week in place of one.

A gentleman who accompanied President Roosevelt on his Southern trip, after witnessing the enthusiasm with which President Roosevelt was greeted everywhere in the South, expressed the opinion that Roosevelt as a presidential candidate would sweep the South like wild-fire. This gentleman was from the North and does not understand the Southern people. President Roosevelt was the guest of several Southern cities and they treated him royally as they should have done, but this does not mean that he could capture the democratic party of the South by any means. Roosevelt as a guest, and Roosevelt as a republican nominee are not one by any means. The South is still Bourbon to the core.

Is it wrong to sell goods on Sunday? In response to the demands of the church people rigid Sunday laws have been enacted, but like most of such laws they are wholly onesided. The law punishes the seller if caught, but the buyer, who is equally guilty if there is any moral wrong in the transaction, goes free. It takes at least two persons to make a trade; if there were no buyers there could be no sellers, hence no violation of the Sunday law. If the buyer as well as the seller was punished we would hear of few Sunday violations.

The word has gone out that under the lash of Bailey Davidson is to prosecute the Standard Oil Trust, now said to be doing business in Texas. How decidedly refreshing is this news, especially as Bailey showed so much enthusiasm over the prosecution of the Waters-Pierce oil Company, which is and has been for twenty years perhaps or more, part of the Standard Oil Trust. The way the Bailey press has lauded (?) Attorney General Davidson for his efforts in convicting the W. P. O. C. is evidence that they, with Bailey, himself will go wild with delight when suits are brought against other branches of the Standard, including we suppose the company at Beaumont that Bailey received five thousand dollars for a fifty dollar job in drawing up a charter.

Quite a number of country papers have announced an increase in subscription rates from one dollar to one dollar and fifty cents. THE STAR does not at this time intend to increase the subscription rate, but the increase in the price of blank paper and type and all printing material is so great that we are going to kill old King Credit dead, dead as Achilles killed Hector, under the walls of Troy, King Priam's town. While "Dig 'Er Deep Through Dixie" is good dope, lets get closer to home. What's the matter with Texas municipalities starting something for "Pave 'Er Wide Through Town." Fort Worth has that chorus down fine.—Fort Worth Star.

Wish we could say so much for Baird. Our streets are fine—in dry weather, side-walks ditto, but some of the latter are hard to locate in wet muddy weather. Baird undoubtedly has fewer improved side-walks than any town of its size in Texas. Most of our sidewalks in the residence districts are just as created, unmarred by the hand of man since the dawn of time, and from all appearances will remain that way until time shall end on earth. Here and there some enterprising citizen will build a good side-walk but his neighbors do not take any notice of it or try to have anything else but a cow trail for a side-walk along side of his property. Ten dollars spent on each fifty foot residence lot in building side-walks would not be felt by anyone and people could go to town in wet weather without wading through mud and water as most of them now have to do.

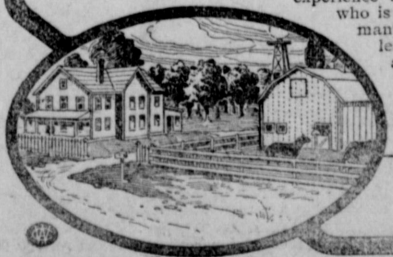

THE FACTS IN THE CASE.

Some things that the farmer should know, and that is, when the State Union was in session at Fort Worth Texas, in August, there appeared a committee from the Southern Cotton Association and a committee from the Bankers Association of this State, and asked for a conference with the farmers Union of the State. Mr. Calvin, who was then President of the State Union, then in executive session, appointed a committee of three delegates to go out and confer with these visiting committees, and I was one of that committee appointed by President Calvin.

After talking to these gentlemen awhile we understood their desires to be to co-operate with the Farmer's Union of the State in any good that might accrue, by each co-operating to the masses of the people of the State, and especially to the agricultural class, economically speaking. We frankly told them our plans, which were to build warehouses throughout the State and store our cotton and such other products as we desire to store, and have a central office somewhere in the State to which we would report the amount of product stored, and from which central office we would get quotations prices etc. These gentlemen approved this plan fully and wrote a resolution in our presence that was unanimously agreed to by them, said resolution agreeing to give the Farmer's Union their moral and financial support so far as it was possible and practical for them to do and this resolution was given out to the press at the time.

Now then it is a well known fact that the banks have fully complied with that agreement, having advanced money on cotton whenever wanted at a low rate to enable farmers to

hold cotton for better prices. There is not a point in Texas that they have not done this and are still willing to extend to them such help as can be made. I write this for the reason that there are some who say that the banks desire to force them, the farmers, to sell their cotton in a very low market, and is the reason for the great money panic. This, in my humble opinion, is not true. The cause of the panic is local and in Wall Street, N. Y., and not in the South or Southwest but at the great headquarters where most of the millionaire robbers live. And yet the price of our cotton is 15c and if the government issues 2 or 3 million new money to satisfy Wall Street gamblers cotton will go to 17c before another bale is grown.

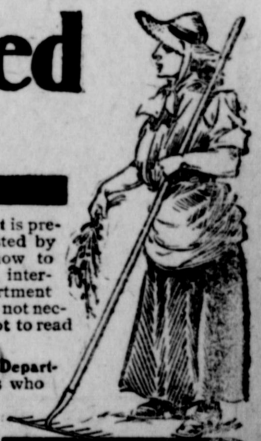

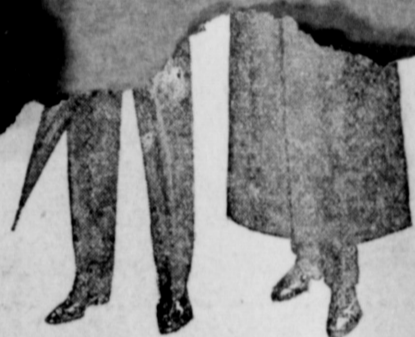
