Mr. Dawkins was wanting to know if his tree was the largest Oak in Callahan County or even in Texas. Now Earl Millorn comes in from the Eula section to announce that he has a tree, growing on G. T. Dunn's farm at Eula, is of greater size than the Dawkins tree. The Millorn tree measures 16 feet 8 inches at the base. It has a 76-foot spread and is 44 feet tall.

Mr. Dawkins was Mr. Millorn's school teacher once upon a time, and used to down him in classes, but now Millorn thinks he is getting even by coming up with a bigger tree than his former teacher can boast about. Mr. Millorn invites all who are interested in seeing the tree to come over and take a look. It is located a half-mile north of the Eula cemetery and two and one-half miles south of Mr. Millorn's new home. And while you are looking, you might take a peak at his new 7-room ranch home. It is said to be a dream with all the conveniences of a city home covering 2200 square feet of floor space.

Dear Sir:
I subscribed for the Baird Star about a month ago. I can hardly wait each week for my paper.

My father and mother are Mr. and Mrs. W. F. Jones. They've taken the Star as long as I can remember. I read Mr. Dawkins' letter and the list of schools that have been built in Callahan. I found he left out two, Oak Lawn where I went to school for ten years. It was about 5 miles north of Rowden and Hillside, where my husband went about ten years. It was about 3 miles south of Rowden.

Hillside, Rowden, Oak Lawn, and Bayou were all consolidated in 1936 or 37 and made the big school called Bayou. All the schools I named were two room schools except Oak Lawn. Miss Symaria Faye Grimes, sister of the Miss Grimes now teaching in Baird was my first and second grade teacher. Mrs. John Bowius who was then Ruth Simmons was my last teacher. Mrs. Carol McGowen was my third or fourth grade teacher.

If you wish you may print my letter in the next issue of the Star.

May I add a supplemental list of ten schools to the list submitted by our friend Will Dawkins in last week's issue of the Star.

The Child's school was named for Henry Childs, and as I recall, Ben Pillains taught the last term at this school, riding a bicycle to and from his home at Atwell.

The Hittson district, one of the oldest in the county, is now part of the Baird and Putnam districts.

Lone Pecan, located a few miles east of Putnam, and possibly deriving its name from the same pecan tree from which the Burkett pecan was propagated, was one of the oldest schools in the county. It was originally located about three hundred feet from the west bank of the creek and two or three hundred yards south of where the new highway crosses the creek. Later it was moved to a new location north of the railroad.

The original school south of the present highway, was probably in operation at the time of the organization of the county, at any rate, a school was

maintained at Lone Pecan in the late 1870s and prior to the coming of the Texas & Pacific Railroad and the beginning of Putnam as a town.

Mat. C. Jobe, one of the earliest settlers in that part of the county, had moved with his family from Comanche county and built his home on the banks of Battle Creek near the "Lone Pecan Tree" in 1876. His three children, Will H. Sam D. and Lon were among the first to attend school at Lone Pecan.

Children from the following families attended school at Lone Pecan before the coming of the railroad: Dr. J. M. Foy, Bert Climmer, E. H. Tabor, the Pitts family, F. P. Shackelford, the Ormsby family, the Tovers and the Whitesides family.

The Ormsbys had no children of their own, but raised Gus Tip-ton, who attended the Lone Pecan school.

It is possible that the Plott family also patronized the Lone Pecan school.

The wives of F. T. Shackelford and Tom Burkes were from the Pitts family.

Mr. Dawkin's list, with the above supplement, comprise as far as I know, all schools that have operated as public schools in the county. If this incorrect, I shall appreciate further information.

The other schools on the above list operated until recent years.

HEALTH FACTS

AUSTIN — The Texas State Board of Health has elected Dr. George W. Cox of Austin to his eighth consecutive two-year term as state health officer.

The vote of the nine member board was unanimous in favor of keeping Dr. Cox in the post he has held since 1936, the longest tenure in the 70-odd year history of the State Department of Health.

Dr. O. B. Kiel of Wichita Falls, chairman of the board, called Dr. Cox, "outstanding among the health officers in the nation." "The job he has done in his capacity is remarkable," Dr. Kiel said. "I speak for the whole board when I say Texas is fortunate to have such a man as Dr. Cox heading its public health activities."

In addition to Dr. Kiel, present board members are Dr. S. D. Coleman, Navasota; Pat J. Cavenaugh, a San Antonio pharmacist; Dr. John H. Mitchell, Dallas; Dr. A. W. Rogers, Corsicana; J. P. Burden, San Angelo; Dr. T. C. Terrell, Fort Worth; Dr. E. B. Pickett, Carrizo Springs and Dr. L. S. Gates, Center.

Dr. Cox has aligned himself with the public health movement in Texas throughout his professional career. He is a for-

mer member of the State Board of Health. His medical degree was conferred at Tulane University. Some of the highlights of his tenure as the leader of State public health activities are:

A reduction of typhoid fever death rates of 97 per cent, 96 per cent cut in malaria mortality, 43 per cent reduction in syphilis death tolls.

The common diseases of childhood — scarlet fever, whooping cough, diphtheria and measles — have been so sharply curtailed that last year the combined death rate from these four causes was less than one-third that of diphtheria alone 15 years ago. Influenza and pneumonia deaths have also fallen off sharply since 1937.

A 500 per cent increase in the number of local health units has occurred under the administration of the veteran health chief who strongly advocates decentralization of the state health facilities "so people can get to them."

He is a past president of the United States-Mexico Border Public Health Conference, a diplomate of the American Board of Preventative Medicine and Public Health, and a member of the American Public Health Association, American Medical Association, and Texas State Medical Association. He is also director of the Division of Emergency Medical Services and Public Health within the framework of the State's civil defense organization.

HORS D'OEUVRES FOR HOLIDAY FESTIVITIES

Mrs. Marguerite Mickelsen As promised, here are some more Hors D'Oeuvres for holiday festivities:

Braunschweiger Appetizers Form thin patties of Braunschweiger about two inches across. Place a stuffed olive in the center and bring braunschweiger up around olive to form a ball. Roll in finely chopped parsley and serve on a pick.

Dried Beef Wheels Spread cream cheese or braunschweiger on a slice of dried beef. Roll up, cut in 1/2 inch sections and serve each on a pick.

Pineapple Delights In a divided dish, serve pineapple chunks, on picks, and shredded cocoanut which has been chopped so it is not in long strings but will adhere to pineapple pieces when dipped in it. If you have a dish divided in three sections, serve pineapple chunks in one, grated cocoanut in one, and grated cheese in the third so that pineapple can be dipped in either.

POLIO CARE PROSPECTS PROMPT TEXAS THANKS

AUSTIN - Texans, noted for their traditional ability to make their own way, got a new challenge this week along with their Thanksgiving greetings.

A Texas woman brought home word from an Eastern meeting, stating, in effect, that hope for finding means of avoiding polio and for curing victims hinges on public support of current research.

The woman, Mrs. R. O. Pearson of Abilene, also relayed the cheering news from a March of Dimes organization meeting in New York City, that better diagnosis and treatment of polio has cut down distortions so that "terrific wreck of children" rarely are seen today.

Mrs. Pearson, who is State Advisor on Women's Activities for the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, said the most promising development in polio research is the possibility of a preventive vaccine.

"Such a vaccine has been used successfully on experimental animals," said Mrs. Pearson. "but it remains to be discovered just how many types of polio virus there are and which persons are not already immune and need to be immunized."

The Texas woman predicted the answer would be found "in the long run," but emphasized the outcome depends in part on the willingness of Texans to face their research financing obligations. Texas, one of the hard hit states from a polio viewpoint, has had to depend greatly on National Foundation funds and equipment because of a poor state financial showing.

The great need for support of patient care and research projects will be emphasized first hand when the 1951 March of Dimes Drive, headed by Basil O'Connor, president of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, addresses a state conference in Austin. The rally will emphasize the 1951 March of Dimes January 15 to 31.

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becoming a permanent citizen of the United States; that in the year of 1931 defendant married a Lebanese National and now has six children, all born and residing in Lebanon, the births of which were not reported and have not been registered as citizens of the United States; that the defendant has resided in Lebanon without interruption since his arrival there; that the defendant has a business of a permanent character at Juret Tourmes, Kesserwan, Lebanon; that the defendant owns property in Lebanon; that the defendant, before returning to Lebanon, sold his business holdings in the United States and took with him all of his savings amounting to approximately \$4,000.00; that defendant pays no taxes in the United States, does not hold himself out as a citizen of the United States and has no ties of family, business or property with the United States.
