COLORFUL TITLES

Texas has been noted for colorful names applied to her citizens. In the earliest days formal introductions were not in voque. Polite settlers often found it more considerate to rename an immigrant than to pry into the intimate matter of his real one Even after the days when nearly Veterinary Medical Association's all "foreigners" traveled under

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
