

A TIMELY VISIT TO BAIRD

The meeting of the Central West Texas Water and Sewer Works Association in Baird Monday night was timely and appropriate. Coming as they did, in the face of a combination rain and dust storm, the watermen were keyed up to a high pitch in their discourse on water problems in this area.

The water meeting was indeed timely because Baird people were elated over winning the State Department of Health award for having accomplished the greatest improvements of any town in Texas in purification and filteration of municipal water during the past year.

Speakers at the meeting offered much praise for Baird's success in obtaining a new lake and water works system. The successful operation of the Baird filteration plant came about to a large degree from the group there assembled. Few people credit this association with having had a vital part in the success of our filter plant, but here's how it happened: Baird's water superintendent, Arthur Burleson, is a member of the water and sewer works association. While the filter plant was still under construction and after it was placed into service, Mr. Burleson would go to these meetings and explain his problems and listen to other members tell their experiences along the same route. He took advantage of the combined experiences of the other men who had already gone over the road. Coming back from each water meeting, he would explain what he had learned to Supt. Conley Pruitt and other men operating the new water system. As a result, Baird now has a completely automatic and efficient filteration plant. Information coming out of discussions, such as were had at the meeting Monday night, had a great part in the honors bestowed upon Baird by the Department of Health.

WE PAY SOCIAL SECURITY, BUT DON'T LIKE IT

On the last day, just before the deadline, The Star editor dropped his income tax return in the mail. In a spot reserved on the blank for social security-so called- we set down the amount of 23/4% of our earnings and enclosed a check in that amount.

We can't stomach social security, it makes us want to puke. We were taught from childhood that people should work while they are young and accumulate savings for their old age. We read in the Bible that people are supposed to work or go hungry.

In our way of looking at social security for the selfemployed is that it is unconstitutional. It is an encroachment on private insurance. It is immoral and unAmerican. And besides that it is communistic.

ONE DAY'S MEAT

Today you and your fellow citizens will eat 60,000,000 pounds of meat. You'll do the same thing tomorrow and the next day and all the days of the year. That's enough meat to fill 15,000 two-ton trucks, and every 24 hours it disappears across America's dining tables.

You don't have to know anything about the meat industry to realize how big a job it has on its hands. Most of our meat is produced west of the Mississippi, while most of it is eaten east of that river. The meat industry has to see to it that the meat is moved in an orderly fashion from the far-flung centers of production to all the centers of consumption. It has to get it where we want it and when we want it-and in every one of its many forms.

The meat industry, all the way from the livestock grower through the packing house to the butcher shop, is a basic, essential enterprise. That it is highly efficient goes without saying-meat is a perishable commodity and waste can't be tolerated. And it serves us far more cheaply than most of us realize. As an example, the packing concerns commonly earn, as profit, only a fraction of a cent a pound on the meat they handle. That is one of the good results of competition-there are more than 4,000 packers in the country, all looking for business.

The meat industry's job is getting bigger all the time. Our population is increasing at the rate of about 2,500,000 a year. This is due to two developments-first, there has been a bumper crop of babies in each of the past 10 years; second, more people are living longer. And practically everyone is a meat eater.

DIESEL HIGHWAY TRACTORS INCREASE HAULING BUSINESS

PONTIAC, MICH - The Saginaw Transfer Company of Saginaw. Mich. increased its hauling business 63 per cent while keeping its total truck fuel costs approximately the same, as a result of changing over to GMC Diesel highway tractors, a case history of the company's operation disclosures

In June of 1959, before Saginaw Transfer operated Diesel equipment, its gross business was \$152,000 for the month of June, of which \$9.534 went for gasoline. Two years later when its overthe-road operation was 100 per cent GMC Diesel, Saginaw Transfer in the month of June grossed \$239,000 while spending \$,-747 for fuel.

Saginaw Transfer, which hauls general merchandise throughout the lower part of Michigan, going as far west at Chicago, employs 18 mechanics to service its entire fleet of 175 trucks of which 72 are GMC Diesels for the overthe-road work. Of the 19 mechanics, 10 are employed in Saginaw and the others are in the Chicago terminal.

The GMC Diesels include 12 750 models and 60 HDCR-640 650 models. They travel 6,300,000 miles annually and require about 50 per cent less maintenance than the gasoline models previously used. The territory which Saginaw Transfer operates over is, for general purposes, a short haul operation





Deer Trapping And Stocking Reduced

AUSTIN - Sharp reduction in the number of white-tailed deer trapped in Texas this season was reported by the Assistant Director of Wildlife Restoration for the Game & Fish Commission.

He said about half the deer needed for re-stocking sommitments were taken during the period which began late last October and has just ended.

The Assistant Director said the total trapped was slightly more than 300. The schedule called for 600 whitetails.

He explained the principal reason for the trapping slowdown was a wild winter on the Aransas National Wildlife Re-

fuge where the trapping is done "The natural food was so plentiful," he said, "that the deer were not interested in the cottonseed cake used to bait the traps. In ordinary winters the animals relish this food. This winter, however, because of the mild conditions and plentiful food on the range, the deer kept robust and amply nourished.

"It all goes to point up the problem of planning scientific aids to wildlife and the problems that occur when Nature takes

The Assistant Director said one result of the trapping de-crease was disappointment in areas where restocking committments had been made.

He added that one conspicuous setback concerned the new wildmanagement area near Crocket in Houston County. Whereas several loads of whitetails had been scheduled for release in that area, only a part of one load was delivered. The remaining deer will be obtained through priority arrangements next season, he said.






