In the first game they won over Grandview 63-36 with the second unit playing the major portion of the last half. Paula Corn led the scoring with 43 points. Elaine Hass made nine and Karen Bearden made seven. Vickie Jones and Sally Green accounted for two points each.

Born June 29, 1881, in Knoxville, Tenn., Mr. Knott moved to Callahan County in 1889, and lived here until 20 years ago when he moved to Tarrant County. He was a retired employee of the Texas and Pacific Railway. He was a member of the Baptist Church and the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen.

Sgt. Smith was at the airport checking weather conditions and raced to the crash scene.

Fearing an explosion, he grabbed an ax and began chopping at a cockpit window. "It was like a brick wall," he said.

Smith ran around the plane, searching for another exit for the pilot. McKee managed to open a window. Smith climbed up on the burning section and pulled the pilot to safety.

The patrolman's pants were ignited during the rescue and he rolled in the icy mud to extinguish the flames. He then placed his coat around McKee and rushed him to a Midland hospital.

The Union Oil Company official aboard the plane declared that Smith "ought to have a medal." Another company official told Smith in a letter, "Words cannot express the bravery that you displayed in the face of frightening circumstances . . ."

Sgt. Smith, father of three children, has been with the highway patrol for 16 years, serving in Kermit, Abilene and Midland.

He served with the Marine Corps during World War II and saw action on Okinawa where he was severely injured in an ambulance crash.

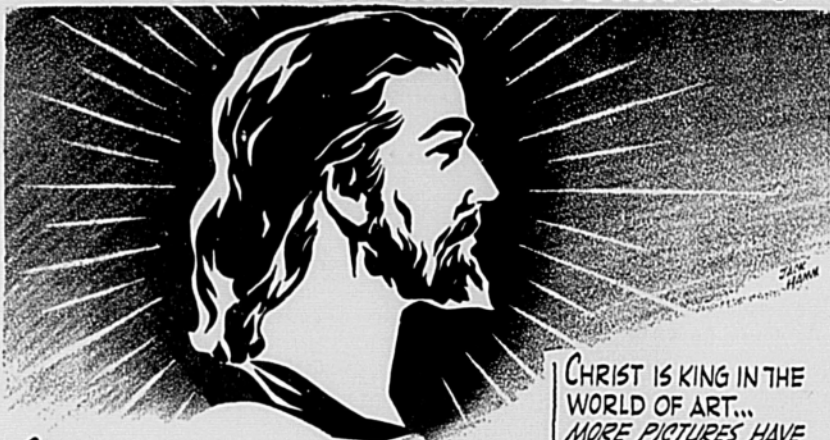
