A poison control center (PCC) is a place which helps family doctors keep patients from becoming statistics.

Each year a hundred or so
Texans -- mostly children -become statistics by virtue of
being accidently poisoned. In
the last four years. State Health
Department record keepers have
added 364 new names to the
grim list of deaths by poisoning. PCC's undoubtedly have kept the list from being much longer

Fifteen PCC's now operate in Texas under local physicians' guidance. The most recent one was set up in San Antonio July 18. Others are located in Abilene Austin, Corpus Christi, Dallas Fort Worth. Galveston. Grand Prairie, Harlingen, Houston, Tyler, Wichita Falls, Odessa, San Angelo and Waco.

Hugh D. McGaw, a State Health Department occupational health engineer who works inti-mately with them, describes a PCC's round - the - clock oper-ation like this:

"A curious youngster eats some of his mother's cosmetics and it makes him sick. His mother calls the doctor, but he does-not know what toxic ingredients the cosmetic had in it. So he
