Bob Swofford, 54, former resident of Clyde, was killed sometime Thursday when his horse threw him on the Ward Steen Ranch at Ringold.

Mr. Swofford's body was found about 7 a. m. Friday after an all-night search. A physician said he had been dead about 18 hours. He was foreman on the Steen ranch.

Born Feb. 26, 1906, in Eastland County, Mr. Swofford married LeNora Maul in 1933. He moved to Abilene in 1920 and was a bus driver for Southwest Coaches from 1930 until 1942. He lived in Clyde one year during World War II.

Funeral was held at 2:30 p. m. Sunday at the Ringold Methodist Church. Burial was in the Ringold Cemetery.

Demo Leaders Plan For Johnson Dinner

Attorney Randall C. Jackson was among the 35 Democratic leaders from the 17th Congressional District who met at the Windsor Hotel in Abilene Tuesday noon, at a dinner sponsored by Ed Connally, State Democratic Chairman.

Purpose of the meeting was to make reports concerning the sale of tickets for a Lyndon B. Johnson Appreciation dinner, which is to be staged in Abilene Sept. 17. The \$50-a-plate dinner is to be given at Rose Field House, Hardin-Simmons University.

The goal for the dinner is the sale of 600 tickets, and reports made indicated all would be sold, Connally said.

The state chairman told the Democratic leaders that "national newspaper people" will be there for the event and went on to urge that a large and enthusiastic crowd be on hand to welcome Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson, House Speaker Sam Rayburn, Gov. Price Daniel, State Attorney Gen. Will Wilson and probably a delegation from Congress. "Savings Bonds sales for the first 7 months of 1960 totaled \$119,020.00," Howard E. Farmer, chairman of Callahan County's Bond Committee reported today. "Our county has now reached 56.7% of its goal of \$210,000. July sales were \$14,042.00.

Sales in Texas for July were \$12,204,662, which was 6% greater than the same period in 1959.

Museum Receives Interesting Article

Mrs. L. L. Blackburn, chairman of the committee for the Callahan County Museum, announces that an article on the life of the late Andrew Jackson Berry of Baird, has been presented to the museum by his daughter, Mrs. Wiley Gaines of Abilene.

The article, prepared for the West Texas Genealogical Society by Mr. Berry's nephew, Marshall Jackson of Ovalo, traces the life story of the veteran of San Jacinto, who also fought in numerous campaigns against the Indians and in the War between the States.

Moving to Callahan County in 1881, Mr. Berry ranched near Baird until 1899. Still leading an active life, he was thrown from his horse during a runaway and was fatally injured.

In 1938, Mrs. Berry was honored at the Texas Centennial in Dallas as the widow of the veteran of San Jacinto. The gun made by Mr. Berry and used by him in the battle, has been presented to the museum, along with a number of other articles of historic value.

Ode and Grover Berry of Baird are surviving sons of Andrew Jackson Berry and Mrs. Berry, who died in 1943.
